Paris, Nov. 9-The official announcement given out by the French War

"On our left wing the Germans have undertaken again an offensive movement on Dixmude, and in the region of Ypres, particularly to the southeast of

Ypres. Their attacks have been everywhere repulsed.

"At the end of the day, referring to the entire front between Dixmude and the Lys, we have made progress along the major part of the line. Nevertheless, our advance is slow on account of the offensive movements undertaken by the enemy, and because of the strongorganization the enemy already has had the time to effect around his points of support. The reports that the Germans are gathering an important army at Inglemuster, the affirmation that the battle against France must be decided at an early date, the orders given to the German generals to break through before no end of the month, and the various movements of troops observed by aviators in Belgium, all tend to show the purpose of the Germans.

All the military writers here agree that the effort will be of the first importance to the Germans. If unsuccessful, it is contended here, it will be the last the Germans will be able to make, as they will then recognize the necessity of falling back on a line a little more to the rear which will, as is their custom, have been fortified in advance with the greatest possible care. They will therefore strain every nerve and sinew in this battle of Ypres and the fighting is likely to be of a character even more intense than anything that gone before.



Meeting of Government Set For Tomorrow Postponed Until Following Tuesday

Kaiser Must See His Home Land Invaded or Weaken His Force Fighting Against Allies in France and

London, Nov. 9—The Times correspondent in Warsaw says that after spending a fortnight in the Polish field of operations, he has arrived at the conclusion that the Rusisan organization is at least under way in every direction and that within thiry days Germany either will have to submit to an invasion by vast Russian hosts, or withdraw substantial bodies of her best troops from the western frontier.

"Russia's huge army is now moving with a preciseness which is remarkable," he says, "and it is advancing with incredible rapidity and smothering every rear guard action with its numbers. The transport is keeping pace everywhere, moving forward night and day. In many cases, the main bodies accomplish twenty versts (about fourteen miles) daily." RAPID ADVANCE ON CRACOW

Vaudeville Missed Train-Singer Called Away - Good Show Nevertheless





CONDITIONS FOR EXTENSION OF STREET RAILWAY CONTRACT

Montreal, Nov. 9—Mayor Met.or Martin today presented a report to the board of control on the application of the Montreal Tramways Company for an extension of its franchise which has several years yet to run. He recommends an extension of thirty years and this would demand extension of this would demand extension of the street railway system, and a fare not to exceed five cents between morning and midnight. He also urges the establishment of a bus service within fivyears, and refers to subways which may be constructed by the city. Venice, Nov. 9—The Vienna Neue Freie Presse publishes the following statement from its correspondent at the Austrian army headquarters: "Our losses are now much lessened in fixed hattles and storming assaults. Attacks ade between August 12 and September are required much greater sacrifices than has the fighting since then, the later engagements having been fought from protected positions."

Vast numbers of wounded soldiers are now arriving in Vienna daily from the front, and if the early losses were much greater than the present, they must have been tremendous.



The war news is generally more satisfactory than it has been at any time since the conflict began. The French, British and Belgians are described as not only holding their own in the west, but as pressing the Germans back at some points; while in the east the Russians are advancing all slong the line. but as pressing the Germans back at some points; while in the east the Russians are advancing all along the line, and their armies are a more serious menace to Germany than at any time since the war began. The fall of Tsing Tau has released Japanese and British cruisers to join in the search for those German craft which are still at large on the Pacific. There is nothing in the reports from Turkey to cause any alarm, and there is nothing to justify any fear of a holy war. The trouble in South Africa appears to have been almost completely suppressed.

And yet, favorable as the reports are, it would be foolish to assume that there is to be no further bad news or that the war will soon be over. A sentence from last night's London cables is worthy of note. It says: "While the reports of the allies' offensive in the west have given hope in London that the Germans will fall back to a line further removed from they have previously shown wonderful recuperative powers." Today's cables express a belief that the supreme German effort to break through at Ypres to reach Calais is yet to be made, and that an army greater than any hurled against the French and British lines is being assembled for one more desperate attempt, failing which the Germans would necessarily have to fall back, but only to fortified positions. From these they would have to be disloided by hard fighting, and gradually driven out of Belgium and France. It is very fortunate for the allies in the west that the Russians are making such excellent progress in the east. Today's cables tell us that the Russians have brought up their big armies, and with an excellent transport service are pressing forward with unexpected rapidity. The correspondent of the London Times asys that Germany must send much larger forces to the east or submit very soon to an invasion of her territory by these great armies, admirably equipped. 



THE MORNING WAR CABLES

London, Nov. 8, 9.35 p. m.—The German and Austrian armies are now on the defensive both in the east and the west. They have, at least for the present, given up their efforts to break through the allied lines around Ypres, in Belgium, where the British and French have taken the offensive and, ac in Belgium, where the British and French have taken the offensive and, according to the reports from French headquarters, have commenced to advance, and in the east they have fallen back to and over their own frontiers in East Prussia, and in Poland have crossed the border, while the Russian cavalry has penetrated Silesia, to the north of Kalisz, and cut the German railway.

The Russians also are following up their advantage in Galicia, and, it is said, have succeeded in cutting the retreating Austrians off from Gracow, and the German army is retiring through Poland.

In fact, at only one point on the two battle fronts do the Germans claim success. That is to the west of the Argonne region, where the German em-

near Vienne-Le-Chateau.

While the reports of the allies' offensive of the west have given hope in London that Germans will fall back to a line further removed from the sea, all uneasiness has not passed, for they have previously shown wonderful recuperative powers. The presence of the Russians in East Prussia and Silesia, however, although the latter are only cavalry, it is believed here, will prevent the Germans from sending any more troops to the west, if it does not compel them to withdraw some of their troops from that front.

Nothing of first class moment has occurred up to the present, in the near least, but Turks are apparently coming very close to war with Greece, the situation having been aggravated by the sinking of a Greek steamer by the Situation having been aggravated by the sinking of a Greek steamer by the Turks, and the threatening of Greeks in Asia Minor. 

GREATNESS OF NATION DEPENDS UPON BOYS

Age of Youth the Age of Laying the Secure Foundation - Address by John R. Mott

Boys are what really matter to a na-on, said John R. Mott, in an address

Boys are what really matter to a nation, said John R. Mott, in an address on "The Strategic Importance of Work with Boys," in behalf of the Boys' Work Department of the Y. M. C. A. in New York. In a strong presentation of the argument for training boys in idealism, as the future makers of the state, he said in part:

"Any idea or ideal which you wish to have dominate a nation must first lay hold of the thoughtful boys, the ambitious boys, the boys of vision. There is no more direct way to accomplish the solution of the most difficult problems which press upon the nation than to dominate the boys, the hope of the race, with right ideals and visions. The boys, have the power 'to let.' Abounding in physical vitality, having the many unspent years, they constitute incomparably our most valuable asset. Moreover, they are so susceptible to impressions. "The age of youth is the age of laying the secure foundation; the vision-forming age; the age in which ideals are fixed that dominate; the age in which we rivet upon ourselves the habits that make us or undo us; the habits that make us or undo us; the habits that make us or undo us; the habits that make us or the habits that result in disintegration and awful collapse.

"The age of boyhood is the age that determines the future. What is the hope of the greatness of any nation? What is the secret of the greatness of any people? What makes a nation great is the character, the ideals, and the spirit of the people, and history shows that character is determined in youth; that those ideals are placed high then; that that spirit is determined likewise by what happens with the ideals.

"When I see the forces of sin and shame, which are working such frightful havoc on every hand; when I see the magnitude of these forces and note their zealous activity, their fiendish cruelty, and their infinite ingenuity, I do not wonder at what I find in every nation, even in my own country, in the way of the wreckage of the boys. The most visible thing about us in America is our material civilization. I find that men are increasingly intent on what they can see, hear, and handle; and the boys are tremendously impressed by it. This nation must be saved from crass materialism. If we are to do it, we must give the future leaders vision at the time when men receive visions that stay with them. It is our ideals, at last, that determine the other things."

Curiously enough both Reid and Dyde, though representing other provinces at Oxford, are New Brunswickers, the former hailing from Carleton County, and Dyde is a son of Doctor Dyde, once a well known professor at the University of New Brunswick.

Commenting upon the delay in getting to the front, Mr. Carter said everyone had implicit confidence in the minister.
