Clothing Is Searched.

When the body reached the undertaking parlors a search was made of the clothing to see if there was not something which would lead to identification. In one of his pockets was an identification card, which read: "This is to identify George E. Smith, Ingraham's Hill, Rockland, Me., father Captain Richard F. Smith of Rockland, Me." There was also an envelope in his pocket bearing the name of The Rockland and Rockport Line Corporation. A number of papers were also found which were nearly all blank bills with the name of M. T. Jameson & Company, provision merchants, of Owl's Head, Me. On the back of one the name of George E. Smith appeared. There was another envelope with the name James A. Collins of Owl's Head written on it. There was also a post-card addressed to James A. Collins, but apparently had not been finished by the sender, as the address alone was on it.

The body of the man had no tattoo marks, is five feet five inches in height, weight about 145 pounds. Four teeth are missing on his upper jaw. He is smooth shaven, red hair, partly bald, and has blue eyes. He was wearing a dark grey reefer, khaki overalls, gumrubber boots with canvas tops lacing up to the knees, a heavy grey sweater and a vest with a herringbone stripe. In addition to the papers found on the body, was a time check, which was attached to a key-ring. It bore the number 441. There was also an empty pay envelope, with No. 441 printed on it.

The body was viewed this afternoon and from reports received prior to going to press it was announced that there would be no inquest.

### Siegel, Once Merchant King, Now Keeps Little Hackensack Shop

Hackensack, N. J., April 4-A little haberdashery shop here provides a setting for one of the most pathetic tragedles of American business life. The proprietor of the most pathetic tragedies of American business life.

The proprietor of the shop, from which he gets a bare living, enough to pay the living the five room apartment at \$60 a month, in which he lives with his second wife, is Henry Siegel, once the great department store king of America.

Once Henry Siegel had hopes of "coming back." Now, at 65 years, he sadly says good-by to his ambitions and only waits for death to end his

It is only a few short years ago that Henry Siegel was making so many millions he hardly knew what to do with his money. He founded the great Chicago business of Siegel, Cooper & Co.; built the extensive Siegel store on Sixth avenue in New York; expanded to Boston to occupy the huge structure built for him at Washington and Essex streets. At the height of his prosperity he married a widow prominent in New York society and settled a fortune on her. His step-daughter married an Italian prince and Mr. Siegel gave her a huge dowry. He had a beautiful town house at Madison avenue and 82d street and an elaborate country estate, now occupied by Nathan Straus, which cost him \$500,000. He belonged to prominent clubs and had a stable full of horses.

When the crash came in his business in New York it carried down all his other enterprises. He turned over all his assets to his creditors and

When the crash came in his business in New York it carried down all his other enterprises. He turned over all his assets to his creditors and stripped himself clean. Some irregularities in the banking business which he conducted in connection with his stores caused his arrest. He was sentenced to ten months in jail, which he served. He came out of jail, in 1914, a rulned, penniless man. Since then he has been engaged in a constant struggle to get on his feet.

"I started business life with just three dollars and a half and made millions," he said. "But you can't do it over again at 65. Of course I am not contented, but still life is not too hard for me. I keep my personal expenses within \$10 a week. I like to go to the movies once in a while, but aside from that I'm only waitin g for the end."

They have made

Breslau, March 16.—(By mail.)—
Paul Spaethe, executioner, who recently shot himself in this city, left a considerabale estate. Before the war 500 marks, or \$125, and traveling expenses was the fee paid for each execution, and it has now returned to about the same amount.

Spaethe has guillotined 45 persons. That was emphasized by his lighting 45 candles, one to each of his victims, before he shot himself. He invested his earnings in a restaurant and in real estate which enhanced in value, so his heirs are well provided for.







Years to Quit.

Buenos Aires, April 3 .- Nobody laid lown his tools to take advantage of everyone who has toiled 25 years. The new pensions law became officially effective, but all indications were that it didn't operate.

Everyone in the Argentine who had worked a quarter century or more was entitled to quit and draw a pension from the Government for the rest of

his life.

As no provision for raising in advance the huge fund required had been made, however, no one took a chance and stopped work.

Commercial labor organizations are holding aloof to see how the Utopian proposition works and whether the government is going to be able to enforce the measure.

proposition works and whether the government is going to be able to enforce the measure.

Whereas everyone who had labored 25 years was entitled to stop and draw their pay, anyone who had not was supposed to pay five per cent. of his salary to the pension fund.

Talk of Strike

Opponents of the measure hope to cause it to fail and are talking of a strike due to the dissatisfaction of labor with the provision requiring that the dues be paid in today.

The government is endeavoring to persuade municipalities throughout the Argentine to rally to support of the new law. Business houses and a considerable portion of organized labor have started "passive resistance." Opponents of the law hope that the initial confusion will end in complete chaos and abandonment of the whole scheme. It is estimated that should the law become fully effective for two years, 15 per cent. of the salaried men of the Argentine, numbering about 150,000, would cease work and draw full salaries forever after, which would mean expenditure of 300,000 pesos annually, which would be considerably more than the receipts plus the cost of operation.

Such topics as immigration and a policy necessary for the future of New Brunswick, prohibition, as well as the activities of his own department, were all dealt with compre-



Hon. Dr. Roberts did not fail to point out that in his admin-

istration of the Health Act he had been met by much opposition of a political character. He dwelt at some length upon the propaganda of the Opposition against his Department and then spoke with telling effect of what had been accomplished by the health regulations towards conserving life in this province.

His speech was long, perhaps too long to be fully effective, but it was complete, interesting and full of that vigor and force of which Dr. Roberts is capable.


Hon. Dr. Roberts next referred to the newly launched policy of supplying insulin free to the indigent of our people, and paid a tribute to Dr. Banting. He also thanked Dr., H. L. Abramson and Dr. W. E. Rowley for their splendid work, and made reference to the recent clinic held in St. John by Dr. Hipwell, who is Dr. Banting's associate. He then announced that a campaign would be instituted to immunize the child population of the province against diphtheria, by means of toxin-antitoxin. The death rate from diphtheria in 1922 was 60 and last year over 40, and it should be quite nil. He invited all physicians in the province to request of their families that their children be immunized, and report from time to time to the department. "I invite," he said, "the medical profession of New Brunswick to join with the department in trying to save the lives of the forty children per year whose lives are being sacrificed."

Health Centre and Clinics. After a reference to the 22 serum

After a reference to the 22 serum depots in the province, to provide remedies used for certain emergencies which might otherwise prove fatal, Dr. Roberts spoke in the highest terms of the Health Centre in St. John and its work, under the direction of Miss Meikeljohn. From Nov., 1922, to Oct. 31, 1923, some 12,000 visits had been made there by those unable to employ a physician. As to the traveling clinics, at Norton, Caraquet, Plaster Rock, Havelock, Riley Brook and Greenwich, practically a thousand children had been successfully treated for the care of tonsils, adenoids and teeth. This was made possible by the Red Cross. The speaker next referred to the Junior Red Cross, and to the splendid work of Mrs. M. Lawrence and Miss Jessie Lawson. He strongly urged that all school trustees add Junior Red Cross work to their programme. As to the Red Cross and its great work, Dr. Roberts made a powerful appeal for financial support by the people at large. The people must get behind it and enable it to continue, for the need is as great today. tinue, for the need is as great today, possibly greater, than at the close of the war. 



Reply to Criticisms. In conclusion Dr. Roberts replied to criticisms that had been offered.
