FIRST EDITION. LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

WHAT WAS DONE THIS MORNING—SEVERAL IMPORTANT MEASURES AGREED TO IN THE HOUSE YESTERDAY.

SPECIAL TO THE GAZETTE. PRESIDENT, April 6.—After dinner Hon. Mr. Mitchell introduced a bill amending several acts relating to the town of Milltown, Charlotte county.

Mr. McKeown committed the bill establishing lines in favor of mechanics, laborers and others, Dr. Atkinson in the chair. Mr. McKeown argued at length in support of the bill. The measure was intended largely to protect those who worked by the day on the buildings.

Mr. Hamilton thought there was no occasion for a law like that. Mr. Powell thought that if a law bill were framed so as to be inoperative in its working it might be a good thing but the bill before the house was framed for Ontario where the judiciary acts were in force, and utterly inapplicable to our courts.

Mr. Mitchell said the teachers only asked for two things. One was that the teachers be represented by the chief superintendent. The teachers, too, had a voice in the representatives appointed by the Alumni, many teachers being members of that body.

Mr. Blair recommitted the bill respecting railways, Mr. Alward in the chair. Agreed to with amendments. Mr. Hamilton committed the bill authorizing the sale of certain lands and premises in district No. 2, in Dorchester held for school purposes, Mr. Anderson in the chair.

DEAD AND UNKNOWN AND FOUND IN THE RIVER.

Murder Mystery Hanging Over the Head of the Body of an Italian as Andover-Evidence of a Horrible Crime Revealed at the Post-Office Examination.

Lawrence, April 3.—The Andover, murder case is exciting a considerable interest in this city and in Andover, and as to how the unfortunate Italian met his death numerous theories have been advanced.

About 10 o'clock on the morning of Fast day, while John G. Kenlaw of North Andover, accompanied by his son, was enjoying a row upon the Shawheen river, they came across the body of the man referred to.

Mr. Kenlaw immediately proceeded to Fry's Village, where he notified Officer Finkle of his discovery. Word was sent to Andover, and soon several of the town police officers were at the scene.

The body was taken from the water and laid upon the bank, where a brief examination was made. It was found to be that of a man about 40 years of age, five feet eight inches tall, of stout build and dark complexion.

The wearing apparel consisted of a short dark-blue coat, pants and shoes, and a hat. The coat was fastened with buttons, and the shoes were of the Italian make.

The first thing which attracted Dr. Howe's attention was a terrible gash along the left side of the head, which looked like a fracture, where a knife or other sharp instrument had been used.

A search of the clothing revealed but few articles, and no valuable in the dead man's pockets. There were found three handkerchiefs, a key chain, two keys, a pipe and a cent in money.

At 10 o'clock this forenoon Medical Examiner Howe, assisted by Drs. Chamberlain and Chase, held an autopsy over the man's remains at Mr. Gadbois's establishment.

The features were those of an Italian, dark complexioned, black hair and mustache, and full, round cheeks. A large metal ring was found in the Italian language was found in a previously overlooked pocket of his coat.

The death occurred at Annapolis, Saturday of the wife of J. P. Mills, M. P., aged 32 from consumption.
