**COLONIES TO** BE CONSULTED

GT. BRITAIN AND U.S. A.

Deference Will Be Paid to Opinion of Oversea Dominions.

London, April 10.—The arbitration treaty between Great Britain and America, the text of which has been cabled over here, is well received. Politicians, particularly those interested in colonial affairs, welcome clause under which Great Britain reserves the right, before concluding an agreement on any matter concerning a self-governing dominion, to obtain the concurrence therein of the dominion. This clause, it is pointed out by col-cnial officials, is a tardy acknowledgment of the importance of the colonies and a wise departure from the old method of negotiating with respect to colonial affairs without consulting the interests of the colonies, which heretcfore have led to dissatisfaction on the part of the colonies.

There is also favorable comment on the reservation that agreements made under this treaty shall not be binding intil they have been confirmed by the two governments concerned through the exchange of notes. This clause is nsidered necessary in view of the obligation to submit American agreeents to the senate for ratification.




