Insurance on the buildings is \$730,000.

REACHES FOR MANCHURIA?

JAPAN, DEFYING WORLD

Pledge Said to be Ignored—China, it is Claimed, is Forced to Agree to Taking Over Practically **Entire Administration of Country.**

(New York Herald.)

Pekin, Aug. 31—An agreement on the long standing Manchuria issues was reached today and will be signed probably tomorrow. The Japanese demands are a renewed illustration of that nation's determination to place her tentacles on Manchuria and absorb its riches.

Throughout the negotiations Japan's attitude was unyielding and aggressive, and the Chinese negotiators, powerless, were compelled to accede on all material points, realizing the necessity of peace at any price with their belligerent neighbor.

Japan concedes China's nominal sovereignty over Hsiento, but makes conditions absorbing practically all the administrative power.

Must Declare Open Ports.

specific pledge from China not to build a railway from Hsinmintun north without Japan's consent.

Must Borrow from Japan.

Another significant provision is that, should China build the Kirin railway east, she must borrow half the required capital from Japan, thus insuring Japanese control of an important branch from Japan's main line toward Vladivostock.

China is compelled to transfer the Taishichao-Newchwang line to Japan.

Japan's right to work the Fushun and Yentai collieries is conceded. China is forced to agree that all other mines along the South Manchurian and Antung railways be worked conjointly by Japan and China.

In view of the Yalu timber agreement

China is compelled to declare four open ports, where the Japanese are given exclusive jurisdiction over all Coreans and also jurisdiction in criminal cases involving Coreans throughout the rest of the district. The opening of the ports is not warranted by any commercial need. Consular representation by other nations is most improbable. 
