Crown Lands Office, 24 July, 1896.
The attention of all holders of Timber Licenses is called to Section 19 of the Timber Regulations, which reads as follows:—
"19. No license shall be cut by any licensee under any license, not even for poles, which will not make a log at least 16 feet in length and ten inches at the small end; and if any licensee shall cut the license he is hereby notified, that for the breach of this provision of this section, he will be liable to the penalties of this section, which will be notified to him by the Registrar of Crown Lands."
