That the people of the maritime provinces would object to the sale of the Intercolonial by the government, is the opinion of Mr. Thomas Malcolm, who built and operates the International Rail-

The International runs from Campbellton, in the extreme north of New Brunswick, to the Maine border and will be part of the complete system giving connection with Bangor in Southern Maine. The line is 113 miles in length. The building of a bridge is the only connection lacking between the two roads.

Mr. Malcolm, who left for home yesterday, after visiting Ottawa, thinks that the people are getting a good service from the I. C. R., and that, considering it is a paying proposition, they would not be willing to see it become one of the greater railway systems.
