A few hours after the discovery of the wreck the life-savers still were awaiting an opportunity to get their boats through the surf. Meanwhile a life preserver bearing the name "Fidington, Boston," drifted ashore, evidently cast overboard by one of the sailors either to carry the name of the stranded vessel to the watchers on the beach or to show the drift of the current. Soon afterwards one of the sailors launched a raft from the vessel apparently for the intention of bringing a line ashore, but the current carried him further from the shore and away to the westward, exposed to seas which swept the raft. The vessel seemed to be resting in the sand and in no immediate danger of breaking up. The masts still were standing, but the crew were unwilling to trust themselves afloat.

The cargo being of wood the vessel floated, but she became thoroughly waterlogged and rolled and wallowed in the seas which raked her fore and aft. The pumps were manned, all hands taking turns for five hours continuously until the valves became choked and refused to work. The vessel then became continually unmanageable and a dead weight in the sea, deprived of all buoyancy and resistance to the waves. The crew had barely time to throw out the ship's boat, which was some 25 feet long, and jump over the stern into the craft, although several had narrow escapes.

Regular drinkers of thard" liquor in New York have suddenly discovered that buttermilk is a beverage which gratifies and satisfies but does not inebriate, and have adopted it to such an extent that it takes all of one man's time in the Waldorf-Astoria to carry jars of buttermilk from the cellars to the bar. Fifty quarts is below the daily average consumption of buttermilk handy for its devotees of the Rialto. Three or four hundred drinks of it is the daily average consumed by the sporting element which frequents the Unifo Cafe, in Broadway, and the Bourse and other saloons in the financial district sell more buttermilk tham malt liquors.

Philip Kennedy, manager of the Waldorf-Astoria bar, explained the popularity of the homely beverage.

"Buttermilk satisfies thirst, has an agreeable after effect and does not make you want another drink, as milk, water, and beer, do," he said. "Doctors tell everybody that it is the most healthful drink one can take. Men, who have an international reputation as consumers of champagne are drinking more buttermilk here this summer than an ordinary farmer's son will consume in a lifetime.

"Eight hundred to a thousand drinks was the average daily sale of buttermilk, here up to the early part of July, when a large proportion of the class which patronizes this bar went away for the summer. They also assert that whiskey and wine drinking go with speculation and mail liquors do not, pointing for proof to the popular saloons in the Wall street district, where consumption of beer and ale is insignificant and whiskey is going across the bars in a steady stream from ten to four o'clock.
