# **BULGARIANS IN CLASH** WITH SERBIAN TROOPS ALONG THE FRONTIER

Bulgarian Irregulars Invade Serbian Territory at Strumitsa, Capture Two Cannon and Bombard Station—Raiders Driven Off After Brief but Sharp Contest-Incident May Indicate Bulgaria's Intention to Join With Germany Against Allies.

Paris, April 3, 1.15 p. ....-Hostilities between Serbian troops and Bulgarian irregulars have broken out along the border. An official statement issued at Nish, Serbia, as forwarded to the Havas Agency, says that the Bulgarians overwhelmed the Serbian fron-tier guards and occupied Serbian territory. The statement follows:

"Last night Bulgarian irregulars, wearing military uniforms attack-, in large numbers, our outposts at Valandovo. Our frontier guards, erwhelmed by superior numbers, were forced to give ground, and re-sated in the direction of the railway station at Strumitsa.

Skimmed milk or buttermilk may be sold, nevertheless, if kept in con-tainers marked conspicuously with the appropriate name, but no person shall sell milk of either of these qualities unless such quality of milk is specifically asked for by the purchaser. The foregoins regulations with re-spect to the production, distribution, storage and sale of milk and cream shall apply with equal force to skimmed milk and buttermilk. (7) Each person, whether producer, vendor, or keeper of shop or dairy, affected by these Regulations, shall permit his herd, barns, premi-ses, general dairy 'plant, his methods of operating, his transportation and distributing vehicles and utensils, his place of storage and his place and methods of cleaning and sterilization, in short, all his places and operations concerned in the production, distribution and sale of milk or cream to be inspected by the health officer appointed by or attached to the board, at all reasonable hours and whenever such officer may desire to do so.
