



IRISH BILL > MUST SUIT ALL PARTIES Beisre It Is Introduced in Commons, Premier Asquith Savs. TWO MAIN POINTS HAVE BEEN ACCEPTED

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Redmond Wants to Know if Bill Accepted by Nationalists is to be Changed Without Consulting Them.

London, July 24-Premier Asquith today told John Redmond in the House of Commons that the British government did not propose to intro-duce an Irish bill in regard to which
