**** A Strange Find. A Man's THIGH-BONE IMBEDDED IN A

SOLID TREE-A MYSTERY THAT IS UNEXPECTED.

(Belletontaine O.; Despatch Cincinnati Enquirer.)

"Truth is stranger than fiction Who can gainsay it? Of all the strange happenings of this busy world, or of all the fantastic stories emanating from the brain of man, there is nothing that cannot be matched by the accidental the brain of man, there is nothing that cannot be matched by the accidental discoveries of every-day life. The oddest place of sepulture for the bones of a human being probably ever conceived has just been discovered near Spring Hills, in Campaign County, near the line of this county. near the line of this county.
