The case given to the Supreme Court at Ottawa to decide as to whether the Dominion License Act is or is not constitutional, commenced on Tuesday last week. From various sources we gather information in relation to the proceedings, which will be interesting to the great majority of our readers. The counsel engaged were—For the Dominion, Mr. James Bethune, Q. C., and Mr. Bridge; for Ontario, S. H. Blake and Mr. Beaulieu Irving, Q. C.; and for the Province of Quebec, Mr. L. R. Church, Q. C., and Mr. J. S. Archibald; for New Brunswick, Mr. G. F. Gregory, Q. C., and for British Columbia, Atty-General Davis.

Mr. Irving opened the argument for Ontario, contending that the decision of the Privy Council in the Hodge case showed that the power to regulate the liquor traffic was exclusively vested in the provincial legislatures. Provincial legislatures deal with the subject not only as being vested in them by virtue of the words of the B. N. A. Act delegating to them the power to legislate respecting shop, saloon and tavern licenses, but also by virtue of their general powers to make municipal and police laws. The terms "trade and commerce" could not apply to liquor selling. A trader was one engaged in buying and selling, while the law took no cognizance of the liquor dealer's buying. He cited a number of authorities in support of his argument. Mr. Blake followed, on the same side, arguing at great length that the liquor traffic was within the jurisdiction of the local legislatures, the Dominion Parliament could not seize it by passing a license act for the whole Dominion.

On Wednesday the Court was engaged hearing the conclusion of Mr. Blake's argument, the presentation of the case on behalf of Quebec Province by Messrs. L. R. Church, Q. C., and J. S. Archibald, and the beginning of the case for New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, represented by Mr. Gregory. The factum presented to the Court by the Counsel for Quebec Province is a most elaborate one, and speaks volumes in favor of Mr. Archibald, who had the task of preparing it. It is said that on the previous day the Court leaned strongly in favor of the view that the power to legislate upon the subject was vested in the Dominion Parliament, but that on Wednesday a change was observable, there seeming to be a strong leaning on the part of the learned Judges towards the contention contained in Mr. Archibald's factum, which clearly presented the case of the Province with a fitness of argument and research that left Mr. Blake nothing to do but to reiterate in a long speech what has been put in a small space by the Quebec factum, the conclusions of which are—First, that the Dominion Parliament can prohibit the importation of liquor into Canada. Second, that the Dominion Parliament can prohibit its manufacture within the country. Third, that the Dominion Parliament can exercise legislative control over the wholesale trade in liquor so far as the second section of article 91 of the Union Act of 1867 would regard it as a matter of trade and commerce. Fourth, that the local legislatures and the municipal organizations of the several Provinces have exclusive control of those who are to deal in it after it passes from the hands of those who have imported it or manufactured it, and consequently the exclusive right to license individuals to deal in it, the charging of a license fee for such permit, the prescribing what qualification they shall possess as individuals, or what local sanction they shall obtain. Fifth, that the right to prohibit in any particular municipal corporation the sale of liquor by retail is neither existing valid legislation nor a matter of trade and commerce, and that the municipal corporations and of the people comprising the municipal corporations, by value of the authority conferred upon them by the legislation anterior to Confederation, or passed by the local legislatures since that period. Sixth, that, per contra, the Dominion Parliament has not the authority to deal with the question and local prohibition, or to revoke or supplement provincial legislation on the subject. Seventh the sale of liquors on vessels when on waters under the control of the Dominion, and on questions of fraud and bribery, are the only parts of the Liquor License Act of 1883 respecting which any strong grounds can be urged as showing that they are within Dominion parliamentary control, but the counsel for Quebec submit that in the distribution of the Acts are under the Union Act of 1867 it was not intended to make any distinction as to the exercise of police power in regard to the liquor traffic upon the rivers of the Dominion as contradistinguished from its regulation on land, nor to confer the power upon the Dominion Parliament to declare an act done in violation of an act over which they had no legislative authority a misdemeanor. But considering that over these two matters there is more or less ground for regarding the Act as ultra vires, the Quebec Province cannot submit that upon all other matters the Acts are wholly ultra vires. The authority of the Dominion Parliament and unconstitutional.

On Thursday Mr. Gregory on behalf of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia presented arguments against the constitutionality of the Dominion License Act, based chiefly upon the ground that the subject matter had always been under control of these Provinces before Confederation, and had been handed over to the quarter sessions, and subsequently to the municipalities, and that there was nothing in the Union Act to take the power out of the municipalities or of the Provinces.

Attorney General Davis, of British Columbia, argued against the Dominion Parliament possessing power to deal with the regulation of the liquor traffic, and pointed out very elaborately that the regulation of the liquor traffic was a matter of policy to be dealt with in various ways as the diverse circumstances of various municipalities required. On Friday morning (Sun) Mr. Justice Beaulieu, Q. C., opened the argument on behalf of the Parliament of Canada, and was speaking when the time for the adjournment of the court came. He began by referring to the various confederations the world is known to see in what way the words "Regulation of trade and commerce" has been interpreted. He pointed out the difference existing between the Dominion Parliament and the provincial legislatures, and contended that the words "trade and commerce" meant more as applied in our Act of Union than they did in the American Act of Union. With us the words included international trade as well as external, and that there was not any difference between the wholesale and retail trade as to their regulation. The wholesale trade in liquor, he contended, is clearly within the Dominion Parliament, and the retail is so internationally identified with the wholesale, that when the Dominion Parliament thinks fit to interfere and enact laws respecting the whole trade, retail or wholesale, it cannot be successfully argued that parliament has not the power to do so. Russell versus The Queen and the City of Fredericton against the Queen settled the whole question as to the power of the Queen the Privy Council affirmed the decision in the City of Fredericton case. He contended in Russell vs. The Queen that so long as parliament did not legislate in relation to the regulation of the liquor traffic, and in so far as parliament did not so legislate, the provincial legislature might make police regulations for the government of licensed houses, which should be in force until parliament did legislate upon the subject. He dwelt at great length upon this point, to show that as parliament had power over the wholesale trade so it must have power over the retail. After discussing that point he turned to the subject of the relation between the Municipal Council and the liquor traffic, laying down the proposition that a municipal council has no power to regulate the trade in liquor in Jamaica, in the confederation, and the Premier has declined to take initial action on the subject. He then discussed the fact that the Canadian government would consider the matter if the British government consented to regulate the trade in liquor, but that otherwise Sir John Macdonald had refused to do so. He further submitted that parliament had under it general power to make laws for the peace, order and good government of Canada, and had the power to regulate the trade in liquor, and to enact every portion of the liquor license act. In Russell vs. The Queen drunkenness spoken of as a national vice, which grew out of the liquor traffic. Parliament decided to enact laws to regulate the trade in liquor, and to regulate this traffic, so as to restrain this national vice. All Canada is interested in this subject, as it extends to every part of the Dominion. He contended that as much as it had been settled that the prohibitory liquor law must be passed by the parliament of Canada, any law restraining the liquor traffic in any degree must also be passed by the parliament of Canada. Summing up the position so far as Mr. Bethune has gone (for he finishes tomorrow), it seems to your correspondent that it may be stated as follows:—

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The British Association. In the Mechanical Science section, a paper was read by W. H. Smith, Deputy Minister of Marine. The reason of this policy is that Canada is deeply interested in securing as large a share as possible of the carrying trade between Europe and America, and in taking away as much as possible of that trade from New York and other ports in the United States; and the light house system in the United States is free, it is necessary that our ships should be free also. During the last fiscal year ending 30th June, 1884, the total cost of maintaining our light houses, light ships,

steam fog signals, automatic buoys, bell buoys, ordinary buoys, buoys, buoys, lighting apparatus, and all other materials necessary to keep them up in an efficient state, was \$2,500,000. This does not include the cost of construction of new lights.

Another peculiarity of the system is that the geographical position of Canada compels her, in the interests of her own trade, to build and maintain light houses and fog signals on the territories of her neighbor, notably on Newfoundland, and free expenses to erect light houses in Canada have reached \$1,000,000. At Cape Ray, Cape Barr, Point Rich and Cape Norman, it has been estimated that the cost of erecting a light house at Cape Ray was \$1,400,000; but rather than impose such a raise this amount, the Imperial Government direct to the Imperial Government direct from the treasury.
