DESPATCHING SOON BY TELEPHONE

System to be Installed Here Shortly—Will Handle Larger Division.

Despatching trains by telephone will soon be the order of the day throughout this division. It is expected that the phone will be installed and the change made shortly.

When this change is made, despatching will handle all the traffic over the entire division from Campbellton to Moncton, including all branch lines from the office here.

The new system is ideal in many respects. One feature worth mentioning is that collection of any train can, between stations call up the despatcher by simply stopping his train and placing a key and wire over the proper wire. Each train is provided with a telephone.

The telephone has been in use between Moncton and St. John for some years.

BOYS' CONFERENCE GREAT SUCCESS

Older Boys' Meet Here Over Week End at Annual Conference.

The Older Boys' of the C. S. E. T. held their annual Conference here on Nov. 7th, 8th and 9th. This was the first North Shore C. S. E. T. Conference held in Campbellton and we are glad to report it as a genuine success.

Besides forty-three town boys who registered for the Conference, twenty-one delegates from outside places attended. This number was constituted as follows: Bathurst, 7; Newcasttle, 7; Chatham, New Carlisle and Lower Derby each 2, and Esquimaux 1.

Mr. Arthur M. Gregg, Executive Secretary of Maritime Boys' Work of the Conference. He was ably assisted by men of such prominence in boys' work as Mr. R. C. Sidanius, traveling secretary of the Maritime Branch of the Y. M. C. A. and the Rev. Messrs. F. M. Milligan and Machum of St. John, as well as our local clergymen.

The opening meeting of the conference was held at 8 o'clock on Friday the 4th in St. Andrew's Church Hall, with the Rev. J. S. Harrington presiding.

After the opening service of worship, Mr. Gregg delivered an address of welcome to the delegates and the of the visiting boys made response. The Conference officers were then elected after which the Rev. Mr. Machum delivered an inspiring address on "The Guest of the Best." The boys then congregated in their separate "squares." After organization of these squares was completed and all attendant business disposed with, the delegates were given an opportunity to become acquainted with their Campbellton fellow-members.

While this session of the boys' conference was in progress a Boys' Leaders Conference was held in another part of the hall. Mr. A. M. Gregg spoke instructively on the "Possibilities of Four-fold Development as connected with the C. S. E. T. programme," and Mr. R. C. Sidanius lectured on the "Relationships of the Tuxis Boys' programme to the Sunday School, and also of its practical application to the activities of a boys' daily life."

The next session of the conference opened at 9 o'clock Saturday morning. Rev. Mr. Boothroyd opened the meeting and gave the boys an enlightening morning talk packed full of humor and good advice, which dispensed all possibility of a draggy forenoon session. Other features of this session were: The Year's Programme and How to Operate a Tuxis Square, lectures by Mr. Gregg and Mr. Sidanius, respectively. Rev. Mr. Machum's lecture on the Sunday Programme was followed by one on Catechism by Mr. Sidanius. Meanwhile arrangements had been made with the photographer and before dispersing for dinner, boys and leaders gathered on the front steps of the church where the Conference picture was taken.

The Saturday afternoon session opened at 2.15 with Mr. Gregg in the chair. The feature of this session was a most impressive address by the Rev. F. M. Milligan, entitled "Comrades All." Then followed lectures by Messrs. Gregg and Sidanius on various subjects of interest in C. S. E. T. Work, after which the boys separated to their different squares.

The Conference banquet, served at 6.15 p.m. was the next event on the programme and the skill and carefulness of the ladies in charge resulted in making it one of the most enjoyable. The boys and leaders of the C. S. E. T. take this opportunity of thanking those who participated in making it a success.

The banquet was followed by enthusiastic singing which was led by Mr. Gregg. The various Squares then vociferously rendered their yells, the enthusiasm of which betraying the fact that the boys had thoroughly enjoyed their supper. Several toasts followed and also an instructive recreation, Mr. R. B. Keith.

Mr. Sidanius then lined up the squares and referred a series of competitive games. The boys manifested their enjoyment of this part of the programme by energetic participation in the sport, but order was preserved

OPPORTUNITIES FOR SETTLERS

Gaspe Has Excellent Area With Fine Possibilities For Farming.

Quebec, Nov. 7.—An extensive area with excellent possibilities as a farming country is lying untouched as a national past in centre of the Gaspé Peninsula, according to J. C. Beidelman, general manager of the Federal Zinc and Land Company, Limited, owners of a mine on the Grand Caspé Peninsula.

In spite of several recommendations forwarded to it by Emile Normandin, engineer of the Department of Colonization, Fisheries and Mines, the Provincial Government, he said, has failed to realize the importance of this section as an area for colonization, Mr. Beidelman says, and as a consequence there is not a settler in an area measuring roughly 2,000 square miles. The Federal Zinc and Land Company cleared a large area of this land three years ago, he said, and has since raised surprisingly bountiful crops of potatoes, lettuce, radishes, turnips, cabbages, and hay.

The land is excellently suited for wheat production, the company claims. The area which is said to have been neglected by the Government lies at the foothills of the Notre Dame Mountains on the uplands of the Gaspé Peninsula stretching from the Little Caspé Peninsula on the north-east to the famous Matapédia valley on the south-west. The land is said to be particularly fertile in the valley of the Grand Caspé, which runs inland from the Chaleur Bay, between the Peninsula and New Brunswick.

Intending settlers would profit not only by the wonderful crops which would follow conscientious work on the land, but by the very timber with which it is covered, Mr. Beidelman stated.

There are many fine, though small harbours on both coasts of the peninsula which could be used by settlers in the interior as outlets for their produce, and so large mountain ranges barrier the district from the sea and the large cities of the province.

A regular train service through the Matapédia Valley already offers service for the lands surrounding the valley, and little difficulty should be experienced, he said, for settlers in establishing paying and comfortable homesteads in the districts further north.

A POLITICAL BOMBSHELL.

Nothing less than a political bombshell has been exploded in the ministerial camp by Mr. James Murdoch, who threw up eight thousand dollars a year and resigned his position as a member of the Board of Commerce because of government interference with the performance of the duties of his office and because he was too honest to be prepared to subordinate duty to those whose interests he was supposed to protect, to the exigencies of party politics. He is now the liberal candidate in South Toronto. He was a member of the Board of Commerce, that board which, the Toronto Star says, was ostensibly created to combat the high cost of living and pay the knuckles of the profiteers in food. When he found, as he did find, that he was expected to draw his \$5,000 a year for looking as busy as possible, while really doing nothing at all, he suddenly resigned. But although he resigned suddenly he did not do so silently. He published his reasons, and he wrote with the indignation of a man who having zealously undertaken an important work for the nation found that he was expected to sell himself for a salary and hoax the public with a sham performance. He was not that kind of man, and resented the use the government sought to make of him. He resigned and gave his reasons with a vigor that is characteristic of him. The idea was that the board of commerce should only feign a usefulness. It must not make trouble for the government by offending influential profiteers. Mr. Murdoch found there was in force an edict of commandment: "Thou shalt not prevent our friends from profiting by the government's mismanagement." It will be recalled that the Board of Commerce had sent out certain questionnaires to manufacturers, but which many of them refused to answer. The Board was not to be bluffed, and decided to take action compelling certain firms to give information, but here, evidently, the restraining hand of the Cabinet intervened. On this matter Mr. Murdoch says: "But we might as well have thrown a snowball in the lake; for it had been ordained that we should not be permitted to take action against these people, whom the Dominion Cabinet regarded as their friends." This is straight from the shoulder, and will require some answering. Nor will it do to attempt to dodge the issue with generalities. The Government

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BETTER OUTLOOK FOR LUMBERING

Local Operators Will Cut About the Same As Last Year.

(Observer, Hartland, Can. Co.)
Among local lumber operators the prospect for the coming season has up to a recent date been rather uncertain, but of late things have been clearing up so that plans for restricted operations are now being pushed and camps are being organized. The Sayre concern will cut about three million, all under contract. Chute's have a contract with the Nashua people. The Juniper Company will cut from three to five million on their permits in the Miramichi territory. Adair Bros. will put in by the thousand, under contract with these people. Hill Bros. also have a fair winter's operation under contract. Improvement in the freight situation and the adjustment of the wage problem with the American railway employees may have a tendency to a readjustment and improvement in the operating plans of the big lumber interests in New Brunswick.

IMPORTANT TO GASPE.
While intense interest is being taken
in a survey of the scallop beds about
the shores of Nova Scotia, New Brun-
swick and Prince Edward Island, which
is in progress this season under the
direction of Andrew Halkett, Nature-
list of the Fisheries Department, word
comes of evidence that this valuable
fishery may extend to the shores of
the Gaspé Peninsula. The Canadian
Fishermen states that a fishery officer
who recently visited Gaspé found a
considerable number of live scallops
washed ashore at the Corner of the
Beach. He discovered that the natives
of the place have often found scallops
washed ashore, but had never identi-
fied them as such nor been aware of
their commercial value. It is of in-
terest to note that the scallop catch
last year, amounting to 8,124 gallons,
was disposed of for \$28,848. This
branch of the fishing industry is ex-
ceedingly remunerative and there is
always a ready demand for the com-
modity. The Gaspé coast has for years
been specializing largely in dried fish
and the discovery of the scallop there
should make it worth while for fisher-
men to look into the possibilities of
this side line.—Quebec Telegraph.

this country, and Mr. Meighen and his
followers are doing an evil thing in
trying to undermine those policies for
the sake of winning votes. Somebody
said earlier in the campaign that
hysterics were confined to the govern-
ment press and the government orators,
and that the best sedative would be
a decisive defeat at the polls after
which the Conservative party would
accept the inevitable and settle down
to work, the rank and file of the party
being sensible men and women.

It is apparent that the return of the
Meighen government is at once impos-
sible and undesirable. It is weary
and stale, and it has lost ground
steadily in the by-elections. That
was the only thing which caused it to
appeal to the country before another
session. It was not the unrest and dis-
content which influences Mr. Meighen
so much as the knowledge that his ad-
ministration was losing strength daily.
In the face of that it is ridiculous for
him to tell the people of Canada that
their property and their industrial
stability rest upon the retention of his
weak and discredited administration.

THE FAIR VIEW.
Day by day it is becoming more
clearly apparent that the Conservative
effort to rouse the country on the
tariff issue is a hopeless failure. The
people refuse to believe that one Cana-
dian party desires to wreck Canadian
industry. They refuse to believe that
Canadian industry is in the slightest
danger as the result of the election
outcome. They accept as true the de-
claration of Liberals that the party
has no free trade intentions. In fact
they know without being told that our
vast war debts guarantee protection
to the Canadian manufacturer for
years to come. The frank admission
of this condition is confessed by the
Toronto Financial Post, Canada's great
financial journal, in an editorial in a
recent issue.

Referring to the tariff issue, the
Toronto Globe declares that there is
"not the slightest chance of free
trade under any government." Which
emphasizes what the Financial Post
has been saying that Canadians are
solid for protection—even though they
may not be unanimously friendly to all
those who are protected, including
these few manufacturers who seem to
think that the tariff is something to
benefit their private pockets rather
than the community as a whole.

It is a coincidence that a Vancouver
writer in the same issue makes ex-
actly the same point, declaring the na-
tional war debts "make some sort of a
tariff of a revenue-producing nature
necessary, and all thinking people in
the east and the west realize the need
of a tariff." Compare this attitude
of a responsible Canadian journal, of
strongly Conservative in its tenden-
cies, with the political twaddle which
seeks to represent one-half the Cana-
dian people as unfriendly to Cana-
dian industry and determined to deny
invested capital reasonable and fair
protection.

A BROAD POLICY.
"It is not a class policy that we
advocate, it is not a sectional policy.
This policy we advocate is a policy
based on the needs of this Dominion,
and if that policy is followed, if we
lessen tariff imports as rapidly as we
can consistently without injuring the
industry of this country; if we reduce

tariffs in Canada, and reduce the cost
of living in Canada, we are not en-
courage of natural wealth in Canada in
the way which is going to benefit more
than the manufacturer of this coun-
try."

entry of goods, would prove the more
efficient revenue producer?"

failed to stampede the people. Nobody
but those who want the tariff advanced
to give them higher prices for already
high priced goods pays attention to
that bogey. It is thoroughly well
understood that the Meighen plan
means more from the wage earner
for the food he eats and the clothes
he wears.

pression on every side and thousands
of men out of work the people have
