



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PRESIDENT HARDING DIES SUDDENLY AT SAN FRANCISCO

Tragic Termination to Fatiguing Trip to Alaska—Apoplexy Ascribed as Cause of Death — Vice-President Coolidge Takes Up the Reins of Government.

A despatch from San Francisco CHIEF EVENTS OF HARDING'S

says:-The President died without warning to those about him. He had BORN-Nov. 2, 1865, on a farm warning to those about him. He had been particularly comfortable and Mrs. Harding was reading to him, as has been her habit, before he went to sleep. She and the two nurses were the only persons with him at the time. Doctors Sawyer and Boone were in the adjoining apartment. The local physicians were out of the hotel. The doctors heard Mrs. Harding call and ran in. It was just 7.50 when a secretary ran out of the Fresident's apartments and handed the formal notice of his death. It read:

It read: "The President died at 7.30 p.m. Mrs. Harding and the two nurses, Miss Ruth Fowderly and Miss Sue the United States, who automatically Miss Ruth Fowderly and Miss Sue Dauser, were in the room at the time, Mrs. Harding was reading to the President, when utterly without warn-ing, a light shudder passed through his frame. He collapsed and all recognized that the end had come. Stroke of apoplexy was the cause of his death." Within a few moments all of the President's official party had been summoned.







CANADA'S AUTO-MOBILES

If a country's elaborate purchases of automobiles is to be taken as an expression of economic well-being, as is frequently accepted, the outlook last year was optimistic in Canada, and the indications those of prosperity. The number of automobiles in Canada The number of automobiles in Canada in 1922 increased over the previous year by 9.6 per cent. In 1921 theres were 470.852 automobiles owned by Canadians and in the following year Life.307, an increase for the twelve months of 45.445.

The Province of Ontario led in the poseession of cars with a total of 238,-600, followed by Quebec with 69,324. Saskatchewan was third with 60,648, followed by Manitoba with 41,885 and Alberta with 40,368. British Columbia occupied fifth place with 33,880, the Maritime Provinces following, with Nova Scotia 16,029, New Brunswick 13,419, and Prince Edward Island 2.154.

There is approximately one automo bile for every sixteen persons in Canada. The Province of Saskatchewan leads in the per capita ownership of automobiles with one car to every nine persons. Ontario is second with a car to every 12, and Manitoba and Alberta are bracketed equal with a car to every 14 of the population. British Columbia has a car to every 15 of its people, New Brunswick one to every 29, Nova Scotia one to every 32, Quebec one to every 33, and Prince Edward Island one to every 41.

Increase Over 1921 Figures.

The possession of automobiles is i creasing in Canada, as indicated in the fact that in 1921 there was approxim. fact that in 1921 there was approxim-ately one car throughout the country to every eighteen persons. Saskatchewan has reduced her figure from berta from 17, and Manitoba from 18. 




Ball, Says Scientist.



The hundredth child was born be

The hundredin chied was born be-fore the first death occurred in the colony. The island is now under the "governorship" of Glass' eldest son, and the population is nearly one hun-dred and fifty.




