The Jezreelites.

The Ohio Valley Visited by a Tremendous Storm.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, June 16.—About 8 o'clock yesterday a thunder storm imprisoned people in the churches for an hour. One and a half inches of rain fell in less than an hour. Cellars were flooded, streets on the hillsides were covered with mud and debris, and sidewalks were torn up. One house was struck by lightning without loss of life. The fire bells were kept constantly ringing by the electric batteries. Thirty-seven hundred fire alarms and telephone wires were melted or otherwise "killed." Edward Lennahan was

STARVING TO DEATH.

Newfoundland's Troubles-Sad State of

HALIFAX, June 15.—The steamer Harlöw, which was ordered at Bay St. George, Nfld., not to land any of her cargo there, arrived back here to-day. Captain Farquhar reports that at Bay St. George, the Collector of Customs handed him a written notice to the effect that he would not be permitted to land any goods consigned to people there, on the ground that the people refused to pay customs duties to the Newfoundland Government. Capt. Farquhar says there was no excitement prevalent, but the people were determined not to pay duties on importations. The Harlow consequently continued her voyage up to Newfoundland, getting as far north as Flower's Cove, where the people were found to be in a destitute and deplorable condition for want of food. The Harlow was the first vessel to arrive there this season, and her appearance was hailed with in v. HALIFAX, June 15 .- The steamer Harlow, want of food. The Hallow was the first vessel to arrive there this season, and her appearance was hailed with joy. Fortunately the steamer had on board provisions consigned to Bay St. George, and at the urgent request of the Local Relief Committee landed a portion for distribution amongst the starving people. Some few who were in comparatively comfortable circumstances contributed to comfortable circumstances contributed to the relief of the dying, but even those more fortunate ones were themselves poorly situated. In December a man had to be employed to travel on foot a distance of 150 miles over a barren, sparsely inhabited shore in order to reach a telegraph station to communicate with the authorities at St. to communicate with the authorities at St Johns, urging them to send provisions. This was the second or third appeal, and a steamer was then dispatched from St. Johns, but it was too late in the season, and Johns, but it was too late in the season, and she was unable to get through the ice to Flower's Cove. People were reduced to such extreme want that often they had nothing to appease the pangs of hunger but the rotten carcases of decaying seals. Owing to the exertions of Rev. Mr. Howell no lives were lost, but when the Harlow arrived some were holding on to the breath of life only by a thread arrived some were hold of life only by a thread.

SIXTY years ago there were but six Angli can congregations in the whole of Western Ontario, only two being in this vicinity, one at London and another at St. Thomas Fifty-five years ago the first Episcopal Church was built of frame on the site of the present St. Paul's Cathedral, which was not gun till 1844, when the old structure was burned down. The Church of England, in the West, during the intervening years, has steadily prospered, first as a part of the Diocese of Toronto, and afterwards as the Diocese of Huron. The body has been for-tunate in having at its head during the later period three able bishops. When the diocese was first established in 1857, Rev. Benjamin Cronyn was consecrated its first bishop. He was an able, zealous and hardworking supervisor of the diocese, and did much to establish the early churches on a firm footing. He died in 1871, and was succeeded by Bishop Hellmuth, who devoted his energies and his purse to the work of spreading the Gospel, especially by means of educational institutions. When Dr. Hellmuth retired to England in 1883, Very Rev. Maurice S. Baldwin, dean of Montreal, was Maurice S. Baldwin, dean of Montreal, was consecrated bishop. It has been stated that the general superintendency, introduced at the time of the union of the various Methodist hodies, has not met with the approval of the Church, and that an attempt will be made to abolish it; but we see no indication of such a movement in the transactions of the Conferences. ON THE STUDY OF ENGLISH. In the speech of Chancellor Blake at the University commencement the other day reference was made to the value of a knowledge of that noble English tongue in which it is our privilege to speak. Most students who take a university course appear to think that a sufficient knowledge of English has been gained in the preparatory schools to qualify them for any position which they may be called upon to fill in after life, and that in the university their whole time ought to be devoted to Greek and Latin, or some of the modern European Latin, or some of the modern European languages, or mathematics, the natural sciences, or some special course they pro-pose to take. Their attention is largely if not exclusively devoted to their specialty-chemistry, philosophy, political economy, or whatever it may be—and the knowledge acquired by three or four years of careful study along one particular line is often supposed to fit them out as experts in it. "No man should quit our halls," Mr. Blake said, "without a competent acquaintance with our own language, without learning to appreciate and so to love its literature, and clearly to express in it his thoughts by tongue and pen. Especially should the art of expository composition be cultivated. What you know is of but little use unless you can communicate, and ex-

plain, and enforce your knowledge." And that is precisely what a great many uni-versity graduates cannot do. They know much less of English literature than many others who never spent an hour in a university. We happen to know not a few graduates who are less capable of telling what they know by tongue or pen than scores of others who have had no better advantages Government. There is plenty of time to make the changes during the holiday season, and our friends the enemy knowledge of English letters by the careful knowledge of English letters by the careful reading of one or more of the standard authors and by frequent practice in the art of expression. The man who knows Chaucer, Shakespeare and Tennyson as a standard methods. student would aim to know them is well endowed; and if to these be added the Bible and some good work on English history, such as Macaulay's, Freeman's or Green's, he has models which are hardly to be surpassed in the literature of any language, dead or living. If we were limited to the choice of one book for the any portion of it we would take the New Testament. There is no such fountain of English undefiled as the New Testament, and the university student who would cultivate his English tongue cannot possibly do better than spend a portion of his course in the study of that book. The Wycliffe Version, revised by Purvey, the King James Version and the Revised Version give us almost all that an ordinary student might wish to know in the use of words and phrases at different periods in the history of the language, and while each of these has its merits, it may be said of all as Green has said generally of the earlier translations:
"As a mere literary monument the English version of the Bible remains the noblest example of the English tongue, while its per petual use made it from the instant of its appearance the standard of our language."

The THEORY OF THE ACCIDENT.




