GODERICH, Feb. 13.—The Reform convention held at Dungannon yesterday to nominate a candidate to contest the West Ridding of Huron was the largest ever held in this county, the large auditorium of the Agricultural Hall being crowded to its utmost capacity. Precident Manning asked to be relieved temporarily of the duties of chairman, so that he might be able to move a resolution. On the chair being taken by Mr. Wm. The speeches were worthy of the occasion and of the vast audience. That of Minister of Agriculture Drury was filled with facts and figures which every farmer will understand and take to heart. Sir Richard Cartwright's was a masterly reply to the speeches of the Ministers delivered in the same place a week ago, pointed with the terrible sarcasm of which he is a master. The Hon. S. H. Blake struck the right note exactly. His withering denunciation of the boodlers and monopolists who are trailing the "old flag" in the dirt, and his eloquent desciption of the benefits which would flow from the adoption of the Liberal policy, were received with thunders of applause. Mr. Hardy spoke very briefly, but long enough to tell the audience that Mr. Mowat and his colleagues are heart and soul with the Liberals in this fight for freedom. At on standard-nearer, Mr. M. C. It is all very well to wave the "old flag"
—to yell out undying loyalty to England, and to proclaim that the country is prosperous. What though a flag floats from every schoolhouse—will that pay the mortgages on our farms, or even a portion of the interest? Not one cent. But we do know that if farmers have free admission for their produce to the markets of the United States it will give them more money than they are getting to-day; and this, while adding to the profits of the farm, will also add at once to its selling value, if the farmer wishes to sell.

A Tory canvasser it endeavoring to make farmers hereabouts believe that if we had reciprocity with the States, the value of wheat in this market would decline. He gives a Conservative miller as authority for the statement that millers would not care anything about local supply; that they would bring in their wheat from Detroit in car load lots. The story won't bear investigation. The market price of wheat in Chatham on Saturday was 95 cents. In Detroit the same day No. 2 red was quoted at \$1 003. Add 3 cents for freight, and leave commission and handling out of the calculation altogether, and the Catham miller would

THIRD DAY—THURSDAY.

Mr. Manning, the representative of the Wholesale Supply Company, of Toronto, addressed the grange respecting the operations of that company and solicited their co-operation. No action was taken.

The report of the Committee on Legislation was presented by the chairman, Mr. Jabel Robinson. It recommended that a bylaw be submitted to the people respecting the reduction in the number of representatives to the County Council to one for each municipality, the reeves to hold the votes that the deputies formerly held. That in spectors be appointed by the Government to carry out the act respecting noxions weeds, with the understanding that where land owners have honestly tried to comply with the law they should not be fined for what might be an oversight; that those who co-cupy the land should be made liable under the law. The abolition of tolls and market fees was recommended. That the Ditching and Water Course Act be amended so that all lands within 150 rods from the commencing of the ditch shall be liable to assessment if benefited by the ditch. That chapter 225, section 117, sub-section 1, of the revised statutes of Ontario, be amended by changing the seventh word from "may" to "shall," with a view of securing a more convenient common school education in the rural districts. That our assessment laws be amended so that everyone shall pay taxes according to his ability to pay.

Mr. Larke affects to believe that reciprocity would not improve the condition of the manufacturers. Could he be in a worse hole under reciprocity, admitting for the sake of argument that he reasons correctly, than he is now. 



Uncle Sam's Lake Marine.

Washington, Feb. 13.—The census office has issued a bulletin in regard to the change in floating equipments on the great lakes since 1886: In 1886 the net tonnage of vessels used for transportation on the great lakes was 634,632; in 1890 it had reached 826,330—an increase of \$191,708 tons. The estimated value of these vessels in 1886 was \$30,597,450, and in 1890 \$58,128,500; increase, \$27,531,060. During the four years there has been a decrease of schooners and barges together of 14.91 per cent. in number, 2.29 per cent. in tonnage and 13.33 per cent in value. In 1886 there were but 21 propellers of 11,000 tons. In 1890 there were 110 propellers of this class. In 1886 there were but six steel vessels on the lakes whose aggregate tonnage was 6,459 tons, value \$694,000. There are now 68 steel vessels on the lakes with an aggregate tonnage of 99,457 tons and an aggregate value of \$11,964,000.

"One of the most curious and widespread of all popular delusions is that which relates to the supposed steady extermination of the Indians of North America before the march of civilization." It was an officer of the Bureau of Ethnology who made the remark, and he added: "As a matter of fact the Indians are probably more numerous on this continent to-day than they have ever teen in the past, and they are steadily increasing in numbers from year to year. There are now in the United States 265,000 Indians. When Columbus landed they were almost undouttedly of less number. The Indians of the time lived altogether by the chase. Under such conditions an enormous extent of territory is necessary to supply a tribe with food. Each tribe, as things were then, ranged over a great expanse appropriated to its own use in the pursuit of game and fish. Between one tribe's hunting ground and that of another was always an extensive dividing strip. The whole country mapped out on this plan could not possibly sustain more than a small population. There is the best possible reason for believing that two centuries and a half ago the Indians in what is now the United States east of the Mississippi did not altogether exceed 180,000.

The World's Greatest Cataract.

The World's Greatest Cataract.

The interior of Labrador undoubtedly is the largest unexplored area on this continent. Up the Grand River, which empties into the Atlantic Ocean at Hamilton inlet, are the Grand Falls, which, if everything is true about them that is reported, are the most stupendous falls in the world. They are only about 160 miles up the river, but only two white men have ever seen them. Mr. R. F. Holine three years ago went from England to visit the Grand Falls. He organized a little party to accompany him inland, and arrived within about 50 miles of the falls, when he was compelled to return on account of the failure of his provisions. The Labrador Indians say these falls are haunted, and they carefully avoid them, believing they will die if they look upon them. The two white men who have seen them are Mr. Maclean, who, as he was ascending the river in 1839, was stopped by the falls, and Mr. Kennedy, who over 30 years ago had charge of the Hudson Bay post in Labrador. Mr. Holme says the height of the falls is not certainly known, but, in some respects, there is little doubt that they are the greatest in the world. Though inner Labrador is so inadequately known, we are aware that it is a vast tableland whose limits are quite clearly defined. In the southeast the descent from the tableland is quite sudden, and almost immediately after leaving the plateau a level is reached that is very little above that of the sea. The Grand Falls are the place where the Grand River tumbles over the edge of this tableland, and almost the whole of the great drop is effected in this one descent. Professor Hind gives the height of this plateau as 2,240 feet. It has been estimated that the region at the foot of the falls is only 200 feet above sea level, and that, therefore, the waters of Grand River has exprendicular descent of about 2,000 feet.

Walter Besant describes in a London journal his visit to the recently discovered remains of a Roman city at Silchester, in Kent, England. The Antiquaries' Society is excavating the place in sections, which, after being studied and sketched, are covered again for preservation.

"You might look across the flat land to right and left," says Mr. Besant, "and never dream that a foot or two below the surface lie the foundations and floors and tesselated pavements of a great city, of which not a tradition or memory survives."





Mr. Foster, the Dominion Minister of Finance, had a nice little trip to the West dadia Islands. He told the islanders that the took it for pleasure as well as for official Investigation, and no doubt a substantial sum will be drawn out of the public funds to defray the expenses of the tour. We regret to find, however, that there is little, L'any, chance of his offer of reciprocity to Lae islands being accepted by the southern colonies. This is the view of the leading newspaper in Jamaica; it is the conclusion by Sir N. Lubbock, chairman of the West India Committee, who, a day or two ago, sent the following letter to the London Times:

"With reference to the negotiations now pending between Canada and the West In-dies for reciprocal trade arrangements, would you allow me to make the position of the West Indies in the matter quite clear

to your readers?

"It is quite true, as you have stated in your leading article, that the Canadian proposition is to reduce the duties upon sugar coming from the West Indies to the Dominion by 25 per cent.. such reduction Sugar coming from the West Indies to the Dominion by 25 per cent, sach reduction to apply exclusively to the West Indian augar. This, upon the face of it, would appear to be a very important concession to the West Indies, but when it is remembered that the consumption of sugar in Canada is about 120,000 tons, and the pro-duction of our West Indian colonies about 800,000 tons, it is obvious that the con-cession of duty will be of no benefit to the

cession of duty will be of no benefit to the West Indies.
"On the other hand, the United States propose to abolish the whole of the present duty on all sugars up to No. 16 Dutch standduty on all sugars up to No. 16 Dutch standard—that is to say, on all such sugars as are produced by our West Indian colonies. This abolition, as we understand it, is not dependent upon any exceptionally favorable treatment of the United States. All that is stipulated is that the President of the United States shall be satisfied that the duties imposed on the products of the United States are not reciprocially unequal or unreasonable. It is not likely that the existing tariffs of our West Indian colonies would be looked upon in any sense as unreasonable or reciprocially unequal.

"If, however, the West Indies were to make a reciprocal arrangement with Can-

"If, however, the West Indies were to make a reciprocal arrangement with Canada, such as that proposed by Mr. Foster, it is almost certain that they would no donger be enabled to send their sugars duty free into the United States. Their position then would be that, whilst Canada would supply them with a market for one-third of their sugar, they would have the United States market practically closed to them for the other two-thirds, and they are seriously hampered in sending sugar to the English market in consequence of the continued free admission of bounty-fed sugars from the continuent.

tinued free admission of bounty-fed sugars from the continent.

"So long as England admits bounty-fed sugars on the same terms as sugar receiving no bounty, so long are our colonies placed in an unequal and unfair position in English markets to the advantage of the foreigner. Were it not for the existence of these European bounties, there would be nothing to prevent a reciprocal arrangement between our West Indian colonies and Canada, inasmuch as the surplus West Indian sugar beyond the requirements of Canada would find a satisfactory market in England.

once more proved abortive, is it not about time that a government were placed in power that would re-establish intimate, meled, profitable trade between the States and Canada? An easy way to get cheap sugar is to reduce the enormous high tax at present imposed upon it by the Dominion Government. But we need the near market for our lumber, minerals, barley, beans, peas, horses, sheep, eggs and other products, besides many kinds of manufactures. Reciprocity with the States would bring us that. When a horses' shoe is to be taken off it must not be violently wrenched at the risk of splitting off a large piece of hoof with it. Let the clinched end of each nail be first turned back. Then the shoe may be carefully raised with the pincers far enough to withdraw the nails, so that their heads may be taken hold of by the pincers and each nail separately drawn out. The nails may also be drawn out one at a time, so as not to alter the position of the tip of the shoe, and a fast nail made to exactly fit the countersink in the shoe, and to pass through the same hole in the hoof, may be driven in its place.—[Southern Cultivator.
