Fearful Disaster in a Washington Coal Mine.

Caused by an Explosion of Gas or Firedamp.

Fifty Men Believed to Have Met a Almost Instantaneous Death.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10 .- It is reporte PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—It is reported to night that a terrible explosion occurred in the coal mines of Roslyn, Washington. Forty-two miners were killed. The men were working on the fourth level. Six bodies have been taken out.

DETAILS OF THE DISASTER.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 10.—A special to the Post-Intelligencer from Roslyn, Wash., says: This afternoon a terrible gas explosion occurred in the slope of mine No. 2 of the Northern Pacific Coal Company at this point, in which the loss of life has ex-

of the Northern Pacific Coal Company at this point, in which the loss of life has exceeded in number that of any other disaster that has ever been chronicled in the Northwest. The exact nature of the explosion or the circumstances that led to it will probably never be known, since it is believed that EVERY MINER

has perished. It is not definitely known
how many men were in the vicinity of the
disaster, but it is believed that between 45
and 50 were on the three levels that were
affected by the gas explosion. Large relief forces are at work, and at this time two
bodies have been recovered. These men
were working nearest to the opening and at
some distance from the point where it is were working nearest to the opening and at some distance from the point where it is supposed the explosion occurred. Most of the men were 1,500 feet farther in the slope and in the immediate vicinity of the accident. There is no doubt either in the minds of the miners or the company officials that EVERY MAN WAS INSTANTLY KILLED.

The Roslyn mine is one of the largest in the State, supplying the western division of the Northern Pacific and Union Pacific roads with coal, and has a capacity of 20,000 tons a day. The explosion occurred just as two gangs were shifting at 1:30 o'clock. The cause of it was not known. Two boys who were in the tunnel escaped, but they are the only ones from either gangs so far recovered. Reports so far received indicate that the explosion has closed up the shaft, that

It is not essential to co-operation that the participants be extremists in regeneration, or idealists as to human perfection. One need not be a crank to become a cooperator. On the contrary, the wonderful power of co-operation lies in its adaptaoility.

operation accepts human nature as it Co-operation accepts human nature as it exists in everyday life. This is why co-operation is so eminently practical. Co-operation takes men and women as they are, and through the exercise of mutual interest, tact and forbearance, unites them in effective work for a common object.

The progress of such union is in no small measure marked by the degree in which the members educate themselves in the morals and principles that underlie co-

the members educate themselves in the morals and principles that underlie cooperation. But such education need not
largely precede co-operative effort—the
two go hand in hand. The best progress is
made by combining the PRACTICK of co-operaation with the SCIENCE of co-operation.
They are one and inseparable. But the real
way to co-operate is to CO-OPERATE.

CO-OPERATION NOT A MONOPOLY.

The fact should be emphasized that co The fact should be emphasized that cooperation is in no sense a trust or syndicate as these words are popularly understood. There is just as much difference between true co-operation and the trust or syndicate as there is between black and white. In co-operation people hire capital, pay expenses of the business and divide the profits in dividends on labor, that is, on goods handled or produced. The capital may be furnished by the co-operators or hired outside. Profits and economics effected by co-operation are divided among the producers and consumers, according to their product or labor. The trust is a combination of capitalists which practices extortion upon both producer and consumer in order to pay still bigger dividends on capital. on capital.

The trust aims at extravagant returns The trust aims at extravagant returns on capital at the people's expense. Cooperation aims at equal distribution of the profits of industry among the participants, after paying capital its hire. Both systems reduce expenses, but co-operation pays the profits in dividends on labor, and the trust pays profits in dividends on capital. The trust puts monopoly in the place of conventions of the profits in dividends on capital. trust puts monopoly in the place of compe

The difference between the two is fundamental. The one aims at the interests of the masses; the other at the interests of the capitalists. The trust works to make the people the slave of capital; co-operation would have capital the reasonably-paid servant of the people.

Co-operation stimulates self-help. It renders it easy for people to help themselves; it makes them happier and more prosperous. It builds up the entire community without injury to any interest. It takes the place of competition in a legitimate sense. The difference between the two is funda-

takes the place of competition in a legitimate sense.

Co-operation is in every respect well for the people and the state, whether considered in a moral, social, religious or financial sense, Trust is the opposite of all'this.

CO-OPERATION VS. JOINT STOCK.

CO-OFERATION VS. JOINT STOCK.

The co-operative corporation should not be confounded with the joint stock enterprise. A joint stock company is simply a convenient plan for dividing the ownership of a business among a number of persons. Such a concern, like a partnership or business conducted by an individual, is run wake prefix on cantilla, only. Each share ness conducted by an individual, is run make profits on capital only. Each share in a joint stock corporation is entitled to one vote. Thus capital both controls the management and the profits. In co-operation each member has but one vote, irrespective of the number of shares he owns, and the profits (after paying capital its hire at market rates) are divided in dividends on labor or purchases.

In co-operation, the people rule and divide the profits; in joint stock concerns, capital governs and absorbs the profits.

WHAT CO-OPERATIONS IS NOT.

Co-operation is not a scheme whereby enthusiasts can reform the world. It is not a new plan of transacting business, but rather a different method of dividing the fruits of industry—giving to labor rather than to capital. The same principles that govern success in acquiring profit to the control of the cont

than to capital. The same principles that govern success in acquiring profit on capital apply to the ecquirement of profit to divide on labor. Industry, application, perseverance, good judgment—ail are required in the co-operative as in the existing methods of industry.

The dishonest merchant may thrive; but co-operation must depend largely upon the moral integrity of the co-operators. Indeed, one of the marked distinctions between the new and the old system, is that co-operation is "a new means of comco-operation is "a new means of com

co-operation is "a new means of commercial morality, by which honesty is rendered productive." The standard quality and quantity of co-operative goods are among their chief merits.

Co-operation is not a means to acquire ease and comfort for shiftless persons who will not work, who will not pay for what they buy, and who refuse to pay others for working for them. It is not a means whereby the business of production and distribution will run itself and pour a golden stream into the pockets of the people. It is not proof against the errors of ignorance or mismanagement. Neither is it proof against the knavery of man against fraud or theft.

or mismanagement. Nettner is it proof against the knavery of man against fraud or theft.

In short, co-operative effort is by no means independent of the everyday principles that underlie success in any undertaking or business. It is not philanthropy. It is not a bestowal of alms upon the unfortunate who cannot or will not try to get ahead. On the contrary, co-operators help themselves, earn their profits by their combined thrift and effort, and enjoy the full fruits of competence gained by honorable and independent labor, the process being hastened by the faithful working together of themselves in distributive, productive, or other forms of co-operation. 

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
