ON THE SOMME LINE Petrograd and Bucharest Report Evacuation of Tchernavoda and a Further Retirement From Transylvania Border— Germans Claim Capture of Vulcan Pass.

Petrograd, Oct. 25-Via London, 2:30 p.m.-The Rumanians and Russians have evacuated the Danube town of Tchernavoda, in Dobrudja, the war office announced

The statement says: "Field Marshal von Mackensen's army is continuing its attack all along the Dobrudja front. The Russo-Rumanian position at Lake Tachaul, near the Black Sea coast, about twelve miles north of Constanza, also has been evacuated.

A FURTHER RETIREMENT.

Bucharest, Oct. 25-Via London, 1:34 p.m.-A further retirement by Rumanian forces on the Transylvanian front is announced by the war office. The Rumanians near Predeal and Kimpolung, the statement says, were forced to fall back a little.

VERDUN SMASH SEVERE BLOW AT HUN PRESTIGE

London, Oct 25 .- Although the French communique announcing the ecapture by the French of the Fort of Douaumont and the Haudremont quarries, and the smashing of the German line over a four and one-third alle front north of Verdun, reached London too late for comment in the early editions, all the morning papers comment exultantly in special late editions. The Times says:

"This breaks a severe blow at German prestige, and shows the German staff the danger of weakening its lines in the west. The victory will disquiet the eremy, hearten the Russo-Rumanian armies, and inspire all the Allies with fresh confidence."

The Daily Telegraph asserts: "The French have dealt a staggering blow, putting a finishing touch to the story of the heavy British blow delivered in the past week, and the victory proves to what point of mastery our troops have attained in the business of grinding Germany in the mill."

JOFFRE HOLDS MEUSE GAIN AGAINST SEVERAL ATTACKS; FOE FAILED AT ALL POINTS

Huns Were Swept Away Like Straw Before the Wind.

GALLANT OPERATION

Trench After Trench Cleared Up By Neville's Superb Dash.

Paris, Oct. 24.-i1:45 p.m.-Delayed.-Verdun, long lost sight of, sprang suddenly and unexpectedly today into the forefront of the public mind, which exclusively had been directed towards the battle on the Somme front. The German front on the right bank of the Meuse literally was swept away for a distance of four and a half miles like straw before the wind. Watchful Nivelle.

Gen. Nivelle for weeks past has been watching the German movements like a lynx, carefully calculating the effect of every withdrawal of troops for transfer to the Somme and eastern fronts. At the same time, he quietly made ermans had thinned their defences to the danger point, he struck like lightning. The result was one of the most brilliant operations of the campaign. Vaux Surrounded.

The Germans, who yesterday were pressing close upon the inner line of defences at Forts Souville and Tavannes, have now been driven beyond the outer defences of the Fort Douaumont-Vaux line. Vaux Fort remains in possession of the Germans, but the French line extends beyond it on the north at Vaux village and Fumin wood, and also on the south of it at Damloup battery and Chenois wood, from both of which positions it can readily attacked.

Swept Trenches Clean. The French artillery preparation was brief but intense, and was over before the German commanders had time to bring up reinforcements even if they were available. The assaulting French waves caught them before the Germans recovered from their surprise, and prisoners in all lines to the rear.
