EVERY PRECAUTION TAKEN FOR SAFETY OF PRINCE ON TRAIN

Lines Cleared of All Other Traffic.

ROADBED IS EXAMINED

Pilot Engine Precedes Royal Train and Switches Are Spiked.

As the Prince of Wales on his tour throughout the Dominion visits various cities and town's traveling via specia train, very few Canadian citizens who act as his hosts en route are aware of the elaborate precautions taken by the railway companies of Canada for the safety of the future sovereign. Practically the same precautionary measures are followed as were observed when King George the Fifth toured Canada some years ago when Prince of Wales. The royal train has the right of way over all other traffic, and regular trains, the running time of which conflicts with that of the prince's entourage, are held 30 minutes in order to eliminate all possibility of accident from this source. That is to say the royal train has a 30-minute clearance of all trains on the road.

Track Examined. Preceding the prince's retinue there is a pilot engine which goes over all portions of track included on the itinerary of the royal visitor. The usual intervening distance is from one to two stations and in this way any faulty roadbed or rails which have been tampered with become known in ample time to prevent a mishap to the prince. Before this pilot engine starts on the route all other trains, including yard engines, are side-





ALLIES TO SEND TO RUMANIA

Will Be Couched in Drastic Terms and Include Time Limit.

RELATIONS SEVER

If Demands Are Not Met-Text Not Yet Given

PARIS, Sept. 3.-The supreme council today decided to send an ultimatum to the Rumanian Government regarding her course in Hungary.

The ultimatum, couched in drastic terms and with a time limit, will be delivered by an envoy of the council. Should Rumania refuse to comply with the terms within a given time, diplomatic relations will cease and Allied envoy will bring away with him from Bucharest the Allied diplomatic representatives there. Must Pay For Goods.

The text of the ultimatum will not be given out until it is delivered to Rumania. It is understood, however, that if will deal mainly with the sub-ject of reparation and the evacuation of Hungary by the Rumanian army. With regard to reparation the Allies, it is indicated, will insist that Rumania indicated, will insist that Rumania recognize that all goods, rolling stock, etc., requisitioned by the Rumanian army in Hungary must be handed over to the Allies to be distributed among the states having claims against Hungary in a proportion to be assigned by the peace conference. 
Hundred Picked Men on Way To California For This Purpose.




