Washington, Dec. 13.—Approval of another three-year naval building program, involving the construction of 88 vessels, if the United States does not enter the league of nations, or a similar world organization, is given by Secretary Daniels in his annual report to-day to President Wilson. The three-year program recommended by the general board to be under way by 1924 includes the construction of 3 batteships, 1 battle cruiser, 30 light cruisers, 8 gunboats, 18 destroyers, 12 mine-laying submarines, 6 cruiser submarines, 4 aeroplane carriers, 3 destroyer tenders and 3 submarine tenders.

"If the United States takes its stand with other countries in an organization to prevent war and promote peace," Mr. Dahiels says, "our present navy, with the addition of some special types, will be adequate for other defence and the prevention of aggression."

"The day will never come," Mr. Daniels says, "when a powerful fleet will not be based in the Pacific, and it is essential that ample provision be made not only for the Pacific feet, but for the whole American fleet in its stated periods of tactical exercises on the west coast." In all, the report declared, projects that ultimately will reach a cost of about \$160,000,000, were urgently needed for the Pacific coast proper.



Andrews was released on ball, and Joseph Smith freed on his own recognizance. The prosecution had not decided whether to proceed with Smith's case. Charged with the same offence as Andrews, Smith's prosecution hinged largely on the result of Andrew's trial. If Andrews was freed, there was some question whether Smith's trial would go on. If Andrews trial would go on. If Andrews thad been convicted. Smith would more likely have been tried at once.

The prosecution nonplussed at the unexpected disagreement of the jury, suggested going on with Smith's trial, but J. M. McEvoy protested strongly that it would be unfair to his second client, and so both cases were transferred over to next June.

About 3 o'clock in the morning he was seen going down the railway tracks.

Bylaw To Increase Jurors' Allowances To \$5 a Day Passed.



William Dowdell Falls Into the Hands of Police.

AFTER CHRISTMAS GIFTS

But Youth Alleges He Saw the Prisoner On Roof of Store.

"I have lived in Detroit so long, your worship, that every time I hear a gun go off 1 start to run," said William Dowdell of 877 Van street of this city and also of Detroit, in police court today when he endeavored to explain why he was arrested in the early hours of Sunday morning. Dowdell was arof Sunday morning. Dowden was arrested on a charge of vagrancy by Constable Walter Pope on Clarence street at six o'clock this morning, because he was alleged to have been seen on the roof of Kent's confectionery store. The prisoner was remanded for one week. Dowdell explained that he had left

Dowdell explained that he had left his home early that morning with an empty grip to go to his father's home also in this city for some Christmas gifts for his family. He carefully traced the course he took in reaching Clarence and Dundas streets.

"Just as I reached the Talbot Printing Company's office I heard a gun go off and I turned into a laneway and started to run for all I was worth. I was just getting over a fence at the bottom of the lane when something hit me over the head," he continued. The prisoner denied that he had been working steadily in Detroit and that he had come home on Friday evening to do some Christmas shopping for his kiddles. When interviewed by the police the prisoner's wife claimed that she did not know that her husband had gone out on Sunday morning. She said that he had been working in Detroit.





He later met Spracklin on the street, and the license inspector declared that he had a right to take the action he did, and refused to apologize.

The younger Fleming said that the yacht was proceeding up the Detroit, River toward Lake St. Clair, and that, when it was between Belle Isle and Peche Island, a motorboat, carrying no lights, approached, and three of the five men in it boarded the yacht. The three men were Spracklin and two Hallams. The writers of this letter think that popular Canadian opinion as distinct from professional opinion has not been engaged on the matter, but point to the fact of the Ontario boards of trade having passed a resolution opposing the abolition of the appeal to the privy council. council.

The writers finally assert that the privilege is most valued in regard to constitutional questions, although cases sometimes reach the council which do not fall under this classification.

D'ANNUNZIO'S CAREER.

The blood and thunder career of Gabriele d'Annunzio seems drawing to an end. Since the opening of the war, not to speak of anterior times, he has been a meteoric figure in Italian life, sailing the night winds in an aeroplane like a real angel Gabriele, riding the Italian oomstick, so to speak, by the pale moonlight, butting into everything from the planet Venus across to Mars, now and then coming to earth, and finally alighting amidst a band of operatic faithfuls on the port of Fiume to dart defiance at the whole world. He has had his fill of alarms and excursions, seems really to have kept Fiume from the Jugo-Slavs in spite of President Wilson, and all the others, and behold him now getting ready, almost, to retire back into the humdrum life of a mero author of prose and verse.

You search the records of history in vain for a parallel to the exploits of d'Annunzio. He is now 56 years of age past, a time of life when most men's adventures would consist of careering around lodges in plumes and purple breeches. NEW YORK, Dec. 12. - The tentative draft of the proposed new baseball agreement, which is to be the government if the sport, was accepted today by the major and minor league committees which have been working on the document the last two days. The agreement, as accepted by the committees was drafted last night by Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis, George Wharton Pepper of Philadelphia, John Conway Toole of New York and J. C. The agreement be-tween the major leagues and the minor league association will be acted upon in a referendum and will be submitted to each of the twentyseven leagues in the association.

It is understood the major leagues are willing to make the price of \$5,000. In order to make progress towards the completion of the new agreement the joint committee accepted a provision that the draft be optional. The clause would permit the drafting of players by the minor leagues only from those lower leagues that favor such operation, but any minor leagues that reject the proposition will not be permitted to draft players from leagues of lower classification. Thus, if the American Association and the International League continue their opposition to Association and the International League continue their opposition to the draft they will be prohibited from drafting players from the leagues of lower classification that adopt the provision, and the two class "AA" circuits then would be restricted to securing players by outright purchases or by developing players not convected with prescripts. players not connected with organized baseball.





President Moore said that employers had brought from England to Montreal on October 18 last 80 textile workers when employers knew that their mills would not provide the employment they had promised. He also charged that a large corporation in Ontario was laying off mechanics whom it had brought from England during a strike last summar, to take on other mechanics whom it had recently brought from England. 
