Leader of Opposition Outlines Tory Railway Policy.

EXTENSION INTERCOLONIAL

And Nationalization of a Section of C. P. R. the Main Features-Mr. Fitzpatrick's Reply.

Ottawa, Aug. 18. - The leader of the Opposition today, in a speech of two hours' duration, suggested an alternative to the scheme for a transcontinental railway submitted by the Government. He advocated the purchase of the Canada Atlantic Railway; the nationalization by purchase of the unprofitable section of the C. P. R. between North Bay and Port Arthur; the improvement of one or both the failways between that point and Winnipeg, and the acquisition of running rights over them, and the control of the Government railways by a commission, Hon, Charles Fitzpatrick, who followed, asked what Mr. Borden's proposition would cost, and whether it would furnish any better solution of the problem than that presented by the Government. He quoted Sir John A. Macdonald and Sir Charles Tupper against the alternative proposition. and Lord Strathcon and Hon. Mr. Blair in favor of the Government's position. Mr. Fitzpatrick, in vigorous terms, protested against the insinuations by Hon. Mr. Blair against the motives of his colleagues, and chalenged that gentleman to either make charges or recede from his position.

Mr. Borden said that the carefully thought out attitude of the Govern ment on May 19 was to have the whole transportation question investigated wanted to know what made the Government change that policy early in June. Montreal, Aug. 19. - Here is the famous compromise resoluon which the reciprocal trade debate is being made: It is resolved, that in the opinion of this congress the bonds of the British Empire should be materially strengthened, and a union of the various parts of his majesty's dominion greatly consolidated by the adoption of a commercial treaty based upon the principle of mutual benefit, whereby each component part of the empire would receive a substantial advantage in trade as the result of the national relationship, due consideration being given to the fiscal need of component parts of the empire. That this congress urges upon his majesty's Government the appoint-ment by them of a special commission composed of representatives of Great Britain and her colonies and India to consider the possibilities of thus increasing and strengthening the trade relations between the different parts of the empire, and the trading facilities within the empire and with foreign countries.

TO INCREASE ARMY 30,000 More Men for the Ka'ser's Army Corps.



DEMANDS PRESENTED AT PALACE

Lack of Discipline Amongst Porte's Troops - Ruthless Slaughter of Bulgarian Workmen.

Constantinople, Aug. 19. - The Russian demands on Turkey, growing out of the recent murder of the Russian consul at Monastir, M.Rostkovski, were formally presented at the Yildiz Pal-

ace yesterday. Notwithstanding the warning which Russia addressed to the Bulgarian Government, it is generally believed here that the Russian naval demonstration in Turkish waters will dangerously encourage the Macedonians, who, it is claimed, will interpret Russian action as being the first step towards intervention in their behalf. Insubordination of the Turkish troops is regarded as being one of the greatest dangers of the present Balkan crisis. The lack of discipline among the soldiers is marked. It is found necessary to humor them in order to prevent conflicts between the soldiers and their officers. For instance, a regiment, while on the way from Uskub to Monastir, demanded that the train be stoppel at Salonica for twelve hours, instead of for the scheduled half-hour, so that the soldiers might amuse themselves in the town. After futile endeavors to prevail upon the men to allow the train to proceed, the officers were obliged to

grant their demand. The killing of Bulgarian workmen who were repairing the railroad track near Uskub is another grave instance of the insubordination of the Turkish troops. 



CONGRESS WANTS TARIFF INQUIRY

The Chambers of Commerce Pass Resolutions Calling for an Investigation.

Montreal, Que., Aug. 18.-The seconlay of the congress of Chambers of clock with Lord Brassey, president, n the chair.

The first subject taken up was a esolution from the barristers' chamer of commerce urging that the Imperial Government should resolutely maintain and extend our commercial treaty rights and that the consular service should be reorganized and strengthened on lines calculated to make it more effective for the promotion of the British Empire. The resolution which was introduced

by Mr. Joseph Walton, M. P. of London, seconded by Mr. Elijah Hoem, Manchester, was adopted. A resolution proposed by the Cana-dian Manufacturers' Association re-commending the establishment of inercolonial commercial consuls, and hat the standing of these should be ecognized by the British consuls throughout the empire, was ruled out of order by the president, as being

contrary to the Barneley resolution reviously adopted. The Cardiff Chamber of Commerce esolution, favoring the abolition of ight dues, another resolution by the Chamber of Shipping of the United Kingdom on the same lines being incorporated therein, was adopted. The fiscal question, which is t' burning question before the Congress of Chambers of Commerce of the Empire, was taken up for discussion at this afternoon's meeting of the Congress. Lord Brassey presided, and there was a large attendance of the members, great interest being shown in the proceedings.

Mr. W. J. Cockshut, of Toront Board of Trade, introduced the subject by moving the following resolu-tion: "That in the opinion of this congress the funds of the British Empire would be strengthened and the union of the various parts greaty consolidated by the adoption of commercial policy based upon the principle of mutual benefit, whereby each part of the empire would receive a substantial advantage in trade

the fiscal needs of the component Imperial Government appoint a con nission composed of representative of the United Kingdom, the colonic and India, to study the question. Mr. Cockshut supported the motion in a powerful speech, and it was seconded by Mr. E. W. Cohen, of the London Chamber of Commerce. Speeches in its support were also made by Senator George A. Drummond, Montreal; Sydney Boulton London Chamber of Commence: Robert Meibhan, Montreal, and others. The discussion continued until the hour of adjournment.




