DIED FOR HIS KIN

Young New Yorker Plays the Hero in a Tenement Fire.

New York, July 25.-Nathan Newman, 20 years old, lost his life today in a heroic effort to save his mother and sister, who with a score of others were for a time in great peril from fire in a Brooklyn tenement house. Half a dozen families, all Hebrews, were sleeping in the double deck three story building when the fire started. When the alarm was given the fire had reached practically every floor, and the occupants were forced to flee for their lives. Many were too late to get down the stairways before their escape was cut off by flames. These sought escape by the narrow ladder which leads to the roof. Newman got through in safety, but was unable to present throughout the proceedings and find his mother and sister. He went back into the burning building, found the women and assisted them through the opening. When he tried to follow them, however, the ladder was sur-rounded by flames. He made a rush through the fire, but was overcome just as he reached the top and fell back into the flames to his death. All the other occupants of the house escaped. The loss on the building was

Whitman Girl Gives Her Account of Dead Man's Behavior and Death.

Ingersoll, July 24.-Mrs. Robert Kyle must stand trial in the fall on the charge of murdering David McGee on Tresday last. The preliminary hearing today before Magistrate John Morrison was attended by an exceptionally curious crowd, who in two and threes very audibly discussed novel evidence as it was obtained, much to the discomfiture of the court. There was, strange to say, a morbidly inquisitive knot of women present, and from ele room feminine necks were craned from time to time to note the effect of the proceedings upon the prisoner.

Mrs. Kyle, attired in black, and wearing a heavy black veil, was, or course, the center of interest. Her attitude throughout was quite unemo tional and undemonstrative, as if sh tude. The more astonishing was her collapse when at the conclusion of testimony bail was denied her. She leaned forward, her head buried in her hands, and sobbed audibly while the room was tardily cleared. Strengthen Thrones.

Paris, July 24.-Who proposed the onference at sea between the Czar and the Kaiser, what was his motive and what is the significance of the secret sessions at which only the Russian and German rulers were present?

If official France could answer these questions, official France would sleep more soundly than it will tonight. The most reasonable theory propounded here tonight is that the Kaiser wants something, that the Czar wants something, and that they propose to pool interests.

The Czar wants to retain his power and what prestige he had left. The Kaiser wants to extend German in-

fluence in the far east. How are they going to do it? Europe would buy the answer.






