MR. CASEY'S BAD BILL.

West Elgin's member, says the Ridgetown Dominion, is showing his regard for farmers by fathering a bill at Ottawa that has been condemned by the municipal representatives of Essex, Kent and Lambton assembled at Chatham. P., is one of the most iniquitous pieces of class legislation ever introduced, and if passed will be the means of depriving muni cipalities and individuals of their few remaining rights under the present railway drainage act. The municipal delegates in Chatham on Monday did

well to condemn the measure."

IS OUR BY-LAW SIMILARLY DE-FECTIVE !

In view of the fact that Chatham possesses a transient traders' by-law recent decision in Toronto may b interest. Last year, when Applebe & Co. opened a dry goods business in Windsor, an information was laid against the firm before. Magistrate Bartlet, under the by-law dealing with transient traders. The magistrate de-cided against the firm and a motion was made at Toronto to quash the conriction. The following judgment has

"Held, that the by-law was defective and invalid because directed mainly against persons not entered upon the assessment roll, and who have not resided continuously for three months in the municipality, and is quite silent as to those persons being in the occupation of premises—'occupation' being a main ground of distinction between the transient trader and the peddler or hawker of wares, according to the scheme of the municipal act. CHARM OF BITTEN BY A SHARK.

EXCITING EXPERIENCE OF A FISHER MAN IN NEW YORK WATERS.

venture Seems to Be, Do Not Catch a Shark by Its Tail; It's a Highly

Bangerous Experiment.

Have you ever been bitten by a shark? Of course not, but I have, and I can assure the reader that it is an extremely interesting and entertaining experience. It happened to me at the beginning of last September, when the unbearable heat drove thousands of people from the city. A friend and I sought the cooling breezes of the seashore—Brant's point, in Jamaica bay, being our place of refuge—and we went out on the water as soon as we arrived from the city-proper.

We caught a number of porgles before sunset and laid for weakfish in the evening, but were disappointed by strikes from

sunset and laid for weakfish in the evening, but were disappointed by strikes from
sharks, from whose ravages the ocean
trout field. Angered by the depredations
of these hyenas of the sen, we determined
to rig up especially for shark fishing the
next day, saving our pergies for batt and
"chumming." There are two methods of
eatching sharks in the waters about here.
One is with rod and reed, by which specimens up to 6 feet—in length and 50
pounds in weight can be landed. The
other one is by brute force with a drop
line or rope.

Reports have been printed from time to time that monsters weighing 300 to 500 pounds and from 10 to 12 feet long have been taken in the waters of Great South bay, outer New York harbor, Shrewsburg river and the Kills and Newark bay. To kill such a giant fish undoubtedly requi

kill such a giant fish undoubtedly requires judgment and nerve, but not much skill, for if the line is strong enough the big fish will finally exhaust itself and can then be gradually drawn into the boat.

We started the next morning in a rowboat from Brant's point for the grounds generally frequented by sharks. After coming to anchor we chummed with our porgies and soon had a number of sharks around us who gave unmistable evi-

coming to anchor we chummed with our porgies and soon had a number of sharks around us who gave unmistakable evidence of their presence by showing their dorsal fins and making a great commotion. We baited our hooks, cast out our lines, and in a few minutes I had a strike, and a battle royal ensued. As soon as the brute felt the sharp hook imbedded in its flesh it made a wild dash for liberty. My companion at once recled in his line to keep it from becoming entangled with my own. With lightning speed my line played off, and, though click, brake and thumb tried to slow its motion, the wheel turned around with alarming rapidity, making that peculiar plaintive noise so well known to fishermen. Ten. 20, 50, 100 yards were quickly recled off, and I began to wonder if he should ever step. He hesitated, and then the recling in began. But the minute the fish was brought closer to the boat he dashed off again in another direction.

This play continued until the fisherman
was almost exhausted, and finally the
shark himself tried, through rest, to gain
fresh strength for another attempt to break
the line and regain his freedom. The last
run of the fish was toward the boat, compelling me to wind up the line so quickly
as to make my wrist and fingers ache.
He then allowed himself to be slowly pulled alongside, and he turned out to be a

was at last found, but the wounds could not be sewed up on account of the inflammation which had set in.

With my uninjured hand I cut the jaws out of the shark and now discovered for the first time that there were six rows of teeth, sharper than needles, each tooth having at its root two barbed prongs. I then realized what a narrow escape I had had from losing my whole hand and congratulated myself upon having got off with only a dozen wounds and scratches, more or less painful and serious. I have kept the teeth as a memento of my adventure and have also two big scars as convenirs of the day.

The lesson to be drawn from my experience is, do not catch sharks by the tail; it is dangerous. But with the dexterous use of the gaff there is little risk in this passions.



FREE FROM TAXES

A Village in the Old World Which has no Rate.

t Owns a Large Forest Which Yields Enough Revenue to Pay all Hunicipal Expenses.

More village Arcadias! The Dalcearlian village of Orso is not, says a correspondent, the only Continental community which rejoices in freedom from rates
and taxes. Staufenberg owns a large
tract of forest land, which yields enough
revenue to pay all the municipal expenses, and besides to allow a "dividend" to every citizen of about £1 a
year, also a certain amount of free fuel.
The Town Hall, water supply, schools,
municipal backbouse, etc., are all maintained in a state of high efficiency out of
the revenue of the public estate. Klingenberg-on-the-Main pays its rates and
taxes, and gives an annual bonus to its
inhabitants, out of the royalizes on its
rich beds of fireclay. Communal meadows
and forests pay all the rates of Langenselbold, in Ranau, and each citizen gets
besides two cords of firewood and 30
marks a year in money. Freudenstadt,
in Baden—thanks to the possession of
5,000 acres of land—supplies its inhabitants with free wood for firing and building, with free pasture for their cacite,
and with roads, schools, churches, fountains, hospital. communal music, etc.,
without levying any rates, and gives each
family a "Christmas box" of £2 is or
£8. Kamppen, on the Zuider Zee, derives
its income from the letting of municipal
lands, and the rate-collector is unknown
—London Chronicle.




