CLEVER FIGHTS AT THE GRAND

The Mixing Was Good in All the Events — The Winners.

Before a large crowd of boxing and wrestling enthusiasts last night in the Grand Opera House, a number of splendid bouts were staged, both boxing and wrestling. The bouts were all well fought and the men very evenly matched. The main bout of the night was between Harry Ireland of this city and Sam Zeller of Hamilton. It was for the best two falls out of three with no limit. Zeller weighed in at 162 pounds and Ireland 166 pounds. The first fall went to Zeller on a 7 minutes 25 sec. of the hardest kind of wrestling. Both men wriggled out of some pretty small holds but Zeller got a toe hold on Ireland and forced him on his shoulders. The second fall was disputed by Zeller, after sparring for about 10 minutes, both men went down and Ireland got a full Nelson on Zeller but could not hold it. They wriggled and rolled around until Ireland got an arm- lock on Zeller and from appearances to the audience he forced Zeller's shoulders down. Referee Fred Minnes also thought the same and awarded Ireland with a fall in 25:37. Zeller raised a kick and said Ireland had greased him, and again he didn't have him down, and altogether showed himself a mighty poor loser. After three minutes time, Referee Minnes awarded the "go" to Harry Ireland, which was a popular decision.

The preliminary wrestling bout between Banty Lang of Hamilton and Runt Myers, Brantford, went to Lang, the first fall being made in 5:22, and the second in 4:45. Lang was much heavier than Myers, but the youngster put up a game scrap nevertheless. Lesson VIII.—First Quarter, For Feb. 22, 1914.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, Luke xii, 1-12. Memory Verses, 8, 9—Golden Text, Luke xii, 8—Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

He had in our last lesson spoken of the Pharisees as not only having a mere outward religion, but also of being one with their ancestors in persecuting and killing the prophets.

There is more need than ever before of false teachers and teaching for formalism and ritualism and worldliness are ever increasing. The Pharisee was all for form and outward show, even though professing to believe some things.

There is no place in the Bible where heaven ever signifies anything good. In Lev. vii, 13; xiii, 17, where heaven was commanded to be offered, it referred to the corruption of the food given in the churches in this age of "the mysteries of the kingdom."

But such as see the true light of God's Word as it stands in the Redeemer's price, the call of the Church to be joint-heirs in Messiah's Kingdom, and the eventual Reign of Righteousness, have a great joy and blessing, as for others who undergo them no whatever joy or peace they can get out of any theory that will liberate from the horrible nightmare of the Dark Ages.

But we may judge ourselves and consider well if our faith in Christ is real and our life corresponding in any measure thereto. That there is a possibility of being saved and yet unrewarded is plainly taught in I Cor. iii, 11-15.

The last verse of our lesson is a great comfort to those who are willing to confess with their mouth, as well as to such as may suddenly be placed in a difficult position. Nothing can take the place of reliance upon the Holy Spirit both as our teacher and our utterance. I have in my mind along with verse 12 the comfort of Ex. iv, 12; Jer. i, 9; Prov. xiii, 18, and have proved the reality of this comfort times without number.

As to the sin against the Holy Spirit which hath no forgiveness, I understand it to be the persistent rejection of the voice of the Spirit until the heart becomes so hardened and the ears so dull of hearing that His voice is heard no more.

Those who have committed this sin are so hardened and rebellious that they cannot be approached on the matter of their souls' welfare. They will not listen to it.

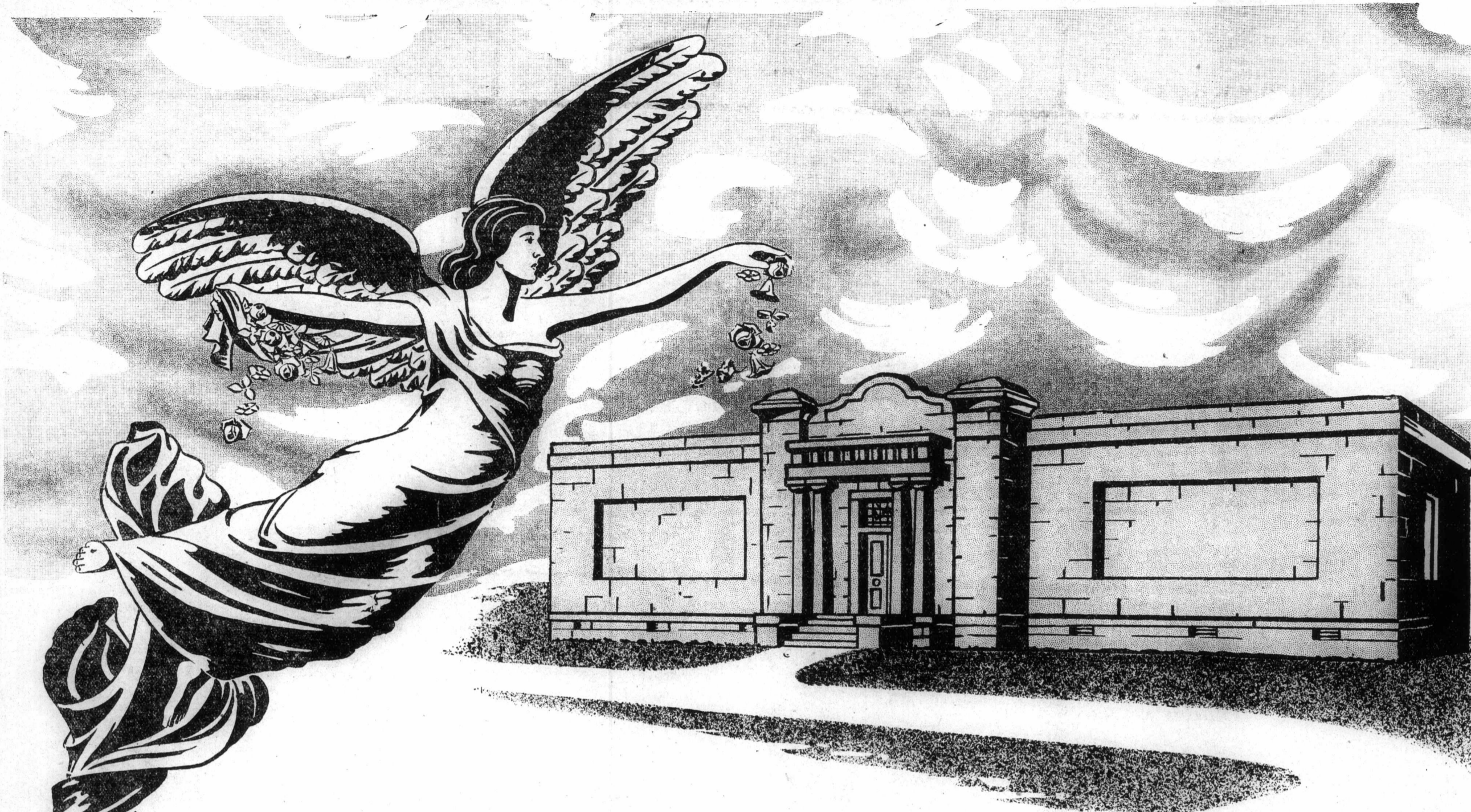
