## Mrs. Bridget Guerin McQuarrie-Mills Wedding

Death came with terrible suddenness on Monday last to Mrs. Bridget Guerin, one of our oldest and most highly respected citizens, after a brief illness. Deceased was in her 80th year at the time of her death and had been in the enjoyment of good health up to just prior to her death when she suffered a paralytic stroke which resulted fatally.

The late Mrs. Guerin was the daughter of John and Maraget Hartwell, and was born July 2nd, 1840, in the town of Glen, County Limerick, Ireland, coming to Canada in 1853 and settling in Quebec where she resided up to 1855, when she moved to Waterdown, and had resided continuously on the same property up to the time of her death.

At the age of 17 years she married the late John Guerin in 1857, nine children blessing the union of which six survive. They are William of Chicago, James of Hamilton and John at home, Mrs. Wm. Organ and Mrs. W. Pirie of Hamilton, and Mrs. Joseph Smiley of Aldershot. She also had 11 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren. Deceased was married by the late Bishop Farrell.

The funeral took place on Wednesday morning last from her late home to St. Thomas church for services, interment being in the Roman Catholic cemetery here. The Rev. Father Becker officiated at the church and grave. The pallbearers were three sons, William, John and James, and three son-in-laws, Joseph Smiley, Aldershot, and W. Pirie and Wm. Organ, Hamilton.

Rev. Father Becker in the course of his address referred feelingly to the upright christian character of deceased, who had been granted a long lease of life, and had always enjoyed the confidence of our people. She was a faithful attendant at the services of her church and lived closely to its teachings.

Her death means a destined loss to the community, and to her sorrowing relatives an unreparable one, and also means the severance of another link in the chain which binds Waterdown's past with the present. Her friends, which are many here, extend to sorrowing relatives their deepest sympathy.



**Aerial Game Laws.**

Modern inventions begot new manners and new laws to govern the changed customs. The man who nets snipe whistles seems about to be outclassed by the airplane operator who gathers in wild birds by means of a net. So, apparently, think the sportsmen in one locality of Canada. As a consequence, an association of them are sponsoring a request to the Government to prohibit the flights of airplanes over marsh lands, and the use of flying machines in pursuit, shooting, or netting of wild fowl. When warned of anything approaching, these birds do not seek cover, but rise immediately into the air and obviously become open at once to the ingenious contrivances of airplane pilots. Rapid-firing guns, and nettings attached beneath the body of the machines, would seem to be easy means of possible extermination of the birds, and this it is sought to avoid.

**Prairie Dogs.**


