

The Anniversary Dinner.

The long dining room of the American House presented an interesting appearance last Tuesday evening when about fifty gentlemen assembled around the tastefully-decorated table to celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of the King's County Agricultural Society.

Temperance Column.

Edited by the Members of Wolfville Division The Scott Act elections in Fredericton last week resulted in the act being sustained for the fourth time with a majority of sixty-eight. It had a majority in 1885 of thirteen; in 1882 it had forty-one in its favor. It was first carried there in 1878 by a majority of one hundred and one. The Temperance people are jubilant over the result and held a special Thanksgiving meeting. This is not all of it. They have wisely set to work to enforce it. A fund for that purpose has already reached \$3,000. Fredericton was the first place in Canada to adopt the act, and it looks as if they were going to stand by it till they get something better.

Moncton is also moving. \$500 was collected in Scott Act fines during November. It is strange that fines can be collected in other places with no better law than the old despised Scott Act. The enemy is rather dormant in Wolfville just now, but by no means dead. The staff can be had at the usual rendezvous. Let our temperance people be on the alert for the least symptoms of the old dragon rousing himself up for another onslaught.

Quite an old gentleman, possible sixty years of age or more, treated us to an exhibition of his powers as a prize fighter Saturday evening. The only drawback to what might have been a very interesting show was the fact that there was no one for him to fight with. He repeatedly assured us that his name was D---, that he was a genuine D--- (not devil), one of the old stock, had fought many hard battles, and if the audience doubted his ability, to come into him. No one responded to the invitation, and after a while his whiskey temperature overed enough to allow him to be led away.

There is considerable increase of the consumption of strong liquors by the British people this year over last. Here are some figures. Wine increase, 200,000 gallons, 110,000 gallons spirits, and about 3,500,000 gallons of beer.

This is his own story and abounds in instruction for the young: - I was born in Sherman, and came to Cincinnati on a boy. At first I shut got five dollar a week for five year, and I save money. Next I got in a lather factory, and I get seven dollar a week, and I get married, and mine wife make two dollar a week sewing pants. We have then nine dollar a week and we soon save six hundred dollar. I then start a dairy, and sell milk for four cents a quart, and raise it to ten cents in de war time and make money fast. I buy von acre of land in Avondale, and sell lots and now I have more as thirty thousand dollar, and mine wife and me live nice. I never smoked nor drink beer nor nottings. Dot was de trouble now. Men get more money und buy cheaper as I, but spend all their money in the saloons. De saloons spile it all. I have eight children and they say to me, "We not live as you, you come from de old country." Von of mine boys be run at night und drink beer und he is gone dead. De saloon he spile it all. - Presbyterian Witness.
