The Vice-Regal Visit.

Wolfville put on gala attire on Friday last to welcome a Governor-General of Canada who is also a member of the Royal family so highly honored by all British subjects and so universally respected by the people of all nations.

The occasion was favored with delightful weather conditions. The sun shone brightly and all nature was at her best. Citizens vied with each other in the tasteful decorations of private places and the town generally displayed flags and bunting in every direction.

At 2.30 p. m. His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught and their Royal Highnesses the Duchess and Princess Patricia arrived by the Duke's special train of eight magnificent coaches, including dining and baggage cars, in charge of Conductor Thomas Holmes and Engineer Arthur Pelmetier.

A large company of citizens and visitors assembled at the station to welcome the Royal party, and as the Duke and Duchess stepped from the train they were cheered most heartily. The Royal party was met by Mayor Chambers and Town Councilors. The Wolfville Boy Scouts formed the guard of honor and performed their part with great credit to themselves.

His Royal Highness stopped and spoke to Scout-Master E. Percy Brown, complimenting him on the appearance and performance of the Scouts.

Autos were in waiting and the party was conducted by Main street, Linden avenue and Acadia street to the College grounds where a handsome platform had been erected on the terrace.

On the platform when the Duke and party arrived were Councillors Hales, Sleep, Haycock, Harris, Regan and Bishop, and ladies, President Cutten, Dean Tufts and daughter, Dean and Mrs. Chute, Dean and Mrs. Haley, Dr. and Mrs. Manning, Town Clerk and Mrs. Caldwell, Rev. and Mrs. Miller, Rev. and Mrs. Kackham. Mayor Chambers read the address and little Misses Bernice Hales and Jean Crighton presented the Duchess and Princess Patricia with hand some bouquets of flowers. Following is the address:

To Field Marshall, His Royal Highness Prince Arthur William Patrick Albert, Duke of Connaught and of Strathearn, Earl of Sussex (in the Peerage of the United Kingdom), Prince of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Duke of Saxony, Prince of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, K.G., K.T., K.P., P.C., G.M.B., G.C.S.I., G.C.M.G., G.C.I.E., G.C.V.O., Personal A.D.C. to H.M. The King, Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion of Canada: May it please your Royal Highness:

We, the citizens of Wolfville, desire at this time to extend to you a most cordial and loyal welcome on this your first visit to our county, so rich in historical associations and agricultural resources.

We appreciate the honor conferred upon us by this Vice-regal visit, and trust that your Royal Highness will carry away with you favorable impressions of the natural scenery and great horticultural possibilities of this valley, which we claim to be the garden of Nova Scotia.

We take this opportunity of expressing our loyal attachment to your person and office and our devotion to His Majesty, whom you represent.

It gives us great pleasure to welcome with you the Duchess and the Princess Patricia, and we trust that their visit to the Land of the Mayflower may be attended by pleasant remembrances.

We have the honour to subscribe ourselves very respectfully yours, on behalf of the Council and citizens.

The World.

A Washington despatch says that Mr. Taft wants the reciprocity Act left upon the Statute for some time in the hope that Canada may reverse its decision of September last. Mr. Taft can turn his feeble optimism in some other direction. Such for instance as his own election. The large and growing larger majority of Canadian people who do not want reciprocity are amused.

Mr. Taft's 'adjunct' letter, in which he stated that the Washington Compact entered into with the Laurier government would draw off Canada's bank reserves and its trade interests to New York and Chicago, has sunk home into every Canadian mind, and the action of the American Congress in refusing to observe the Panama Canal treaty has completed our education. Thousands who voted in 1911 for reciprocity, would not now think of trusting the prosperity of their businesses to the mercies of the Washington Legislature.

The 'New York American,' owned by Mr. Hearst, who a brief year ago was flooding Canada with copies of his newspaper exhorting acceptance of reciprocity as designed to weld two nations in good will and prosperity, finds now no language too immoderate to employ in denouncing those who believe that the United States' pledge, by a treaty, not to discriminate against Great Britain and British interests should be sacredly fulfilled.

This is the way the 'New York American' discusses the Panama bill. Such bargains are respected only by servile and decadent states. Among self respecting nations treaties are always abrogated when they cease to have mutuality of advantage. All of which brings home to Canada the wisdom of its action in rejecting reciprocity and declining to enter into closer trade relations with a nation whose law making body unflinchingly follows the advice of William Randolph Hearst in malignant hostility to Great Britain and her trading interests.

Sir Wilfred Laurier and Sir Fred Borden have still the Hearst bug, and have been for weeks making a plan for a fall campaign. Of course no one cares if these elderly 'has-beens' are amused, but it is certainly not expected that they will cause any converts to reciprocity. In this county reciprocity is as dead as it could be.

A wireless message has been received in Wolfville from our popular young M. P., Mr. Foster. At the time of sending he was in excellent health and the S. S. Stanley was proceeding towards Hudson Bay. Those sightless politicians who breathe an abolition against Mr. Foster and the government headed by our popular Premier are sure to get left. Better for them to attend to their personal business. They are unloved, unfeared, impotent and the laughing stock of confidants.

A Liberal journal says—'Mr. White as Minister of Finance decided last session—his first session—to retain the Fielding fiscal system virtually unchanged.' This was not very surprising in view of the fact that the Fielding tariff was virtually the old Foster tariff. In sixteen years of office the Liberal Finance Minister did not change the taxation on imports by as much as one per cent., even when the British preference is included. Mr. Fielding maintained the National Policy up to 1911, when he made the blunder of going to Washington and so put his party out of power, and naturally his successor stands by the fiscal system introduced by Sir John Macdonald, and ever since supported by the country.

Obituary.

JAMES EDWARD LOCKWOOD.

Mr. James Edward Lockwood, whose demise at the age of 80 years at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Albert E. Eaton, Lower Canard, on August 1st, was recorded in our issue of August 8th, was, in the days of his active business life, a prominent man in the commercial, industrial and social affairs of this county. He was a native of this county and was, for several years, senior partner in the firm of Lockwood and Rand at Canard, and afterwards conducted the business in his own name.

Subsequently, he went to Truro and for about fifteen years was engaged in the cultivation of fruit at that place. When the death of his wife, who was a Miss Charlotte White, of Massachusetts, broke up his home at Truro, he returned to spend the remainder of his days with his daughter, at Canard, and in a community where he was highly respected and esteemed. He leaves two sons and two daughters, Leslie, residing at Truro; Edgar, in British Columbia; Myra, in Boston; and Mrs. Albert E. Eaton, at Lower Canard. The funeral was held from the home of his daughter, on Saturday August 3rd, and in ceremony was made by Rev. F. H. Beals conducting the service.—Western Chronicle.

'No business man in any town should allow a newspaper published in it without taking the opportunity to have his name and business mentioned prominently in its columns, save an exchange. This applies to all kinds of business—general stores, dry goods, grocers, furniture dealers, manufacturing establishments, automobile dealers, mechanics, professional men and in fact all classes of business men. This does not mean that you should have a whole or half or even a quarter of a page ad, in every issue of the paper, but your name and business should be mentioned if you do not use more than a two-line space. A stranger picking up a newspaper should be able to tell just what business is represented in a town by looking at the business mentioned in the paper. This is the best possible town advertiser. The man who does not advertise his business does an injustice to himself and his town. It is the man who expends the newspaper to do the most for his town. The man who insists on seeing the business that comes to town but refuses to advertise his business is not a valuable addition to any town. The life of any town depends upon the live wide awake and liberal advertising business men.'

Kings County Sunday-Schools.

ANNUAL CONVENTION OF WORKERS HELD AT AYLESFORD ON WEDNESDAY.

The importance of efficient leadership and the appreciation of individual responsibility on the part of the workers was the keynote of the Kings County Sunday-School Convention, which held its meetings on Wednesday of this week at the pretty Baptist Church at Aylesford. Three sessions were held and although the attendance was not large the spirit of earnestness and practicality which pervaded the deliberations give promise of better work in future on the part of those who have charge of this most important service.

The first session began at 10.30 o'clock with an earnest devotional service conducted by Rev. F. Foshay, the popular young pastor of the Aylesford church. The president, Mr. W. H. Chase, then took the chair, and the minutes of last annual meeting, held at Canard, were read and confirmed. Mr. E. M. Beckwith, of Canand, was appointed secretary for the convention.

The speaker of this session was Mr. Ernest Robinson, Inspector of Schools, who gave a most interesting and practical address on the 'Adult Department.' The speaker covered the whole field of Sunday-school work, and presented his subject in such an original and lucid manner as to be most helpful. Many of the points made were emphasized in the interesting discussion which followed in which a number of speakers took part.

The devotional service which opened the afternoon session was conducted by Rev. Mr. Bell, the new pastor of the Canard Presbyterian church.

Interesting reports of the various departments of work were presented. Miss Eaton, the secretary, read Mrs. Bryant's report on the Home Department, Mr. John Donaldson's report on Adult Work and Mr. J. A. Caldwell's report on Elementary Work. Mr. H. Stairs presented an interesting report on Temperance. Mrs. J. W. Brown on the I. B. R. A., Mr. W. E. Porter on the Advanced Department and Mrs. David Ellis on Education.

A Round Table exercise was conducted by the Field Secretary, Rev. Dr. Brown, on Teacher Training and the Secondary Division, in which a number took part.

An interesting and comprehensive report was presented by the retiring secretary, Miss Pauline Raton. This will be published in full in another issue of THE ACADIAN.

Reports from the district were presented by Mr. Avery Banks for Aylesford, Mrs. Ernest Bishop for Cornwallis, Mr. J. G. Calkin for Central, Mr. Herbert Stairs for Horton, and Mr. A. S. McDonald for East Cornwallis.

The question of needed help for schools in outlying sections was taken up and spoken to by a number of the delegates. The outcome was the passing of a resolution referring this matter to the District and requesting that a levy be made upon the strong churches for workers and that the carrying on of these schools be undertaken under the direction of the District Superintendents.

Field Secretary, Rev. Dr. Brown, gave a comprehensive address on 'Vitalizing the Sunday School,' which was very helpful.

Rev. Dr. Cutten, president of Acadia University, gave a very strong and practical address on 'The Young Man and the Sabbath-school,' which was much enjoyed by the audience and should have been heard by every Sunday-school worker.

The work of Miss Pauline Raton, who for the past seven years has efficiently filled the position of secretary-treasurer and who is now leaving the Province, was fittingly referred to by several speakers and the convention signified its appreciation by a standing vote, to which Miss Raton graciously responded.

The President thanked the friends of Aylesford for their cordial hospitality, the church for the use of its edifice, the choir for its music, and all who had rendered assistance, after which the convention was brought to a close by the pronouncing of the benediction by Dr. Cutten.
