LATEST APPOINTMENTS.

The resignation of Hon. R. D. WILMOT of his position as Premier of the Senate, with a view to the Cabinet, rendered some change necessary in order that no vacancy should exist at the opening of Parliament.

OPPOSITION PROSPECTS.

When the Opposition meet in caucus at the capital this week, they will, of course, first set about electing a leader; and when they by no means pleasant task of depositing their old chief and putting Mr. BLAISE in his place has been accomplished, it will then become their duty to go into Committee of Ways and Means, as it were, on their stock of political capital.

CANADIAN MANUFACTURERS FOR CANADIAN RAILWAYS.

That Canadian railways should, as far as possible, be supplied with rolling stock manufactured in Canada, was one of the hopes entertained by the present Government when they entered upon the duty of protecting and developing the industries of the country.

TENDERS FOR ROLLING STOCK.

Tenders are invited for furnishing the rolling stock, required to be delivered on the Canadian Pacific Railway within the next four years, comprising the delivery in first year of about the following:- 20 locomotives, 50 passenger cars, 10 second-class cars, 5 express and baggage cars, 5 postal and smoking cars, 100 flat cars, 200 box cars, 2 wing ploughs, 2 snow ploughs, 3 flangers, and 4 hand cars.

We do not think that we need dwell at any length upon the importance of this advertisement. It is a bold development of the policy of the Government. The reader will see that the large quantity of material to be purchased yearly, so that for several years to come one of our chief industries will be stimulated to its utmost, and all the hundreds of workmen that somewhere or other touch the orbit of a great industry, will receive a share of the benefit.

ONTARIO IMMIGRATION.

The management of immigration matters, as set forth in the discussion on the Provincial estimates, may be accepted as a fair specimen of Reform administration. Last year's expenditure was \$12,000 in excess of the appropriation. This year the Government ask \$10,500 over and above the extravagant sum which the Department expended during the previous twelve months without the authority of the Legislature having been first obtained.

THE LUMBERMAN AND THE SETTLER.

The bill amending the Free Grant Act, introduced by Mr. FABER, is not yet for third reading in a day or two, and we sincerely hope the House will throw it out. The object of the measure is simply to clothe the well-known slighthead lumberman with additional powers, and to put the settler completely at his mercy.

THE LOCAL HOUSE.

Some time ago we took the trouble to prepare a time bill of the Local Legislature, showing that the average duration of its sittings had not exceeded two hours a day, and that it costs nearly \$1,000 a day to run the machine, the country was paying a great deal for very little.

Free Grant districts is a question of great importance, and members on both sides of the House should unite to oppose a bill which will not only keep immigrants from going in, but which will drive out the struggling settlers already there.

The Saskatchewan district will leave Winnipeg as follows:- February 27th, March 1st, 5th, 12th, 19th, 26th, and 29th. Small-pox has appeared in North Sydney, N.S., and there is much excitement about it. It is reported to have been introduced by a resident physician. It is said the disease was brought from Montreal by a physician who was infected, and communicated to the residents.

A petition has been forwarded to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries by the habitants and traders of Grand Manan, asking for the grant of a licence of trade in communication with the mainland for the purposes of trade. The petitioners suggest that a licence should be granted to the most favourable point on the island to supplement that at Lepreau.
