Any person who is the sole lead of tamily, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitobs, for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain daughter, brother or sister of intending

and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesfelder and live with / nine utiles of his homesfeld as and occupied by him or by his fathe

good standing may pre-empt a quarte \$3.00 per acre

Duties-Must reside upon the home stead or pre-empfion six months in each of six years from date of home atend entry (including the time required a homestead patent) and cultivate fifty

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchas d hemestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.





Any person who is the sole head o tamily, or any male over 18 years o may homestead a quarter section available Dominion land in Manito Saskatchewan or Alberta. The app cant must appear in person at the I minion Lands Agency or Sub-agen for the district. Entry by proxy m be made at any agency, on certs conditions by father, mother, daughter, brother or sister of intend

and cultivation of the land in each three years. A homesteader may 1 within nine miles of his homestead a farm of at least 80 acres solely own and occupied by him or by his fath mother, son, daughter, brother or

homesteader.

In certain districts a homesteader good standing may pre-empt a quar section slongside his homestead. Pr \$3.00 per acre Duties-Must reside upon the hor stead or pre-empfion six months
