ST. JOHN'S MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

The following is published for the mation of the public:-

St. John's Municipal Act, 1902. Section 36. No person shall built erect in any place in the town of or erect in any place in the town of St. John's, whether on the site of a former building or not, any house, stable or other building, unless he shall have first submitted a plan of such house, stable or other building, to the Council, and such plan shall have been approved of, and consent to the erection of such house, stable or other building shall have been given by the Council; and any house, stable or other building erected without such plan having been submitted ut such plan having been submitted and approved of, and consent given a foresaid, and any house erected therwise than in accordance with the lian so submitted and approved of as foresaid, shall be a public nuisance, aforesaid, shall be a public nuisance, and the like proceedings shall be had in respect of the same as are provided with respect to other public nuisances: Provided that the Council may, whenever they may think fit, decline to approve of any plan submitted to them, and may refuse their consent to the erection of any house, stable or other building unless and until other building, unless and until y shall be satisfied that the lines such house, stable or other build-entirely coincide with the lines street upon which the said house, table or other building, may front or ut, that such house, stable or other ilding will not from any cause natever be a source of danger to e neighbouring houses or buildings, at such house, stable or other buildwill not be prejudical to the any of them, and also that style and manner of construction of such house, stable or other building, shall conform as nearly as possible to other buildings either erected or about to be erected on the same
