## Cable News.

OTTAWA, To-day. in the Commons last ght when the first division on naval solutions will take its place in hisory. The order to call members was given by Speaker Sproule at ter ninutes after ten and the Verville sub-amendment to Government naval resolutions demanding a referendun on naval proposal, was put to vote It was defeated, division 75 yea to 122 nays. The Conservative ranks remained unbroken. While the Liberals saw Colonel McLean voting with the Government. The Laurier amendment calling for an expenditure thirty-five million on two Canadian fleet units was beaten on exactly the same vote at 12.30 in the morn ing. The main resolution was passed on division by a majority of 32. Government and with Sir Wilfred Laurier ' Premier Borden then introluced the Bill founded on the resolution just passed, which provides for an emergency contribution o three Dreadnoughts to the Imperia Navy to cost \$35,000,000.

MEXICO, To-day. At five last evening it was reported General Diaz demanded the surrender of the National Palace. All through the day the rebel batteries of heavy guns were throwing a flerce fire of shrapnell around the Palace. Many of these dropped into Zocalo which fronts the building. Federal soldiers were compelled to move to cover be fore dark. The fire on both sides was intermittent, apparently less vigorous from Federals, the Government troop signments. It was said they were running short. The fifth day's battle began at eight o'clock. The Federal artillery opened fire on the Arsena but although the bombardment was more it had no appreciable effect or rebel defense. General Huerta, com manding Federals, promised to rush fortifications of rebels but he elected instead to employ artillery from vari ing the early part of the day did the intantry come into action. Rebel fire towards the Palace is intended not only to bring about its surrender but had for the purpose also the clearing of the intervening high buildings of machine guns and riflemen and silend ng the Federal battery operating a Letram Street, a point midway be tween the Arsenal and Palace. The shelling wrought havoc among the buildings of that section of the city The American club was riddled. The interior of this building on second and third floors was completely wrecked. ## Cable News.

There has been much enquiry and peculation as to fuel shortage in Capt. Scott's party. Numerous guesses and stories have been circulated, but the matter, so far, remains a mystery. The Christchurch correspondent of the Daily Chronicle cables an account of his futile attempt to get information on this point from the survivors. He had been chatting with Lieut. Evans and other officers in the ward room of the Terra Nova. All he introduced the question of fuel, and Capt. Scott's statement in regard to the astonishing failure of petty of-ficer Edgar Evans, who was regarded as the strongest man in the party, but who died from concussion of the brain a month before the others perished Then all the officers became suddenly very reticent. Lieut. Evans said that the fuel shortage was hardly of sufficeint importance for the newspapers to deal with, adding, "I think you had better not touch upon it." The correspondent urged the importance, as Scott had mentioned it as a contribut ory cause to the failure of the party to get back to One Ton Depot. Lieut Evans admitted this was true, but re peated his previous statement that the Scott party had fuel enough for a menth beyond the time at which the were expected to return. "Then, the suggestion is," said the corresponden "that they ought to have been independent of the supplies at the depot."
"Yes, that is it," replied Lieut Evans adding that of the four parties who returned after supporting the Polar Party, hardly one reached the base with more than one day's fuel. The correspondent asked them what short age did Capt. Scott refer to. Lieut Evans replied, "I do not want to discuss that further," and repeated his opinion that it was not necessary o deal with this subject at present The correspondent adds that impres sion received from the conversation was that some explanation would be forthcoming in due course. Grea surprise is expressed at Christchurch at Capt. Scott's references to seaman Evans. He accompanied Scott on his first attempt to reach the Pole tell years ago. His leader then praised him highly. There was no one more commended on that occasion. His wife received a letter from Capt. Scot since the expedition started, which gave hearty praise to her husband whom he referred to as "my old friend, who has done so well on thi expedition that he deserves all tha I can do for him."


