



REFUSED TO BE MOVED UNTIL HIS INJURED MEN WERE FIRST TAKEN AWAY.

(London Mail.) A Sergeant-Major of the 2nd Royal lunster Fusiliers writes home from

The battalion had a very nasty knock on Christmas Eve. I had some parrow escapes myself; however, got through all right with the exception of a slight wound on the knuckle of the forefinger, right haud, hardly

worth speaking about. At present we do 48 hours in the trenches and 48 hours rest. The weather is very wet and the trenches are in a terrible state with water. Still one never hears a grumble. The cold is kept away with a good issue of rum and a change of clothing. Everything imaginable is done to keep us fit-no lack of anything. The officers share the same hardships as the men. and, in fact, a little more. They are absolutely splendid, every, one of them. This will just tell you the class they are.

Colonel Bent got wounded trying to save a wounded private who lay in front of his trench, and when the siretcher-bearers went for him he refused to be removed till all the wounded men were taken first. -It was the same with Major Thompson He lay outside his trench all day wounded, and still issued orders to his men till he died from exposure. 

Shipping men see there may be some additional risk, just as the Admiralty sees that with increased transporta-tion of troops and supplies and the increase in Cerman efficiency in subincrease in German efficiency in sub-marine warfare the risks to trans-ports are greater. For six months the Admiralty has been dealing with this problem with remarkable suc-cess. Large bodies of troops and sup-plies have been transported from New Zealand to the islands of the Pacific and to Egypt from Australia to plies have been transported from New Zealand to the islands of the Pacific and to Egypt, from Australia to Egypt, from India to the Persian Gulf, Egypt and France, from Canada and Newfoundland to England, from Ireland to England, from Ireland to England, from England to France, Gibraltar, Malta and Egypt, and yet not a single transport has been assailed by the enemy, even when they had quite a number of cruisers and submarines at sea. It seems to have been issued to hearten up the German people and to fill them with the idea that Germany is destroying the supremacy of the British Navy, can drive British shipping from the sea, and reduce Britain to starvation by a blockade. Britain to starvation by a blockade. These are the views at all events set forth in the German press. The German authorities must be in a bad way when they have to bolster up the hopes of the German people by such a miserably false propaganda, for the text of the notice issued to neutral countries is not a notice of a blockade, and any such notice would



only make Germany a laughing stock before neutral governments, which know that Germany has no means of making an effective blockade of the British Isles and France, with the navies of the allies riding the seas and the German Navy seeking safety in fortified ports.

The Russians appear, according to reports from Petrograd, to have crossed the Bzure near its junction with the Vistula and working Southwards, which was the point at which the Germans made their original attempt to break the Warsaw line. This new offensive on the part of the Russians explains their anxiety to clear the right bank of the Lower Vistula of Germans. Having accomplished this they are free to threaten an outflanking movement from that direction. 





VIOLENT ATTACKS BY GERMANS.

PETROGRAD, Feb. 5. Not since the battle around Lodz in Russian Poland in the early part of December have the Germans delivered such violent attacks as those of yesterday, when they attempted to drive through the Russian line near rjemow. Probably never before in the Eastern area of war have they concentrated such a force upon a sin-gle point. In a distance of six miles etween Limina and Bongmow, the ermans threw 105,000 infantrymen, cogether with heavy forces of cavalry. than six hundred guns. It is estimated that in this short line there were nearly 30,000 men to the mile, coming on in ten or twelve lines like the waves of the sea. The Russians, days in this same vicinity, have concentrated correspondingly heavy forces to resist the German advance, and so close were both sides packed in his narrow space that the artillery ecame practically useless. The batlefield was a flat plain unobstructed by either trees or houses, the latter naving already been demolished by shell fire. The Russians met the German advance with rifle fire and ayonet, the first lines struggling orward and backward from trench to rench. At some places the trenches were only a few hundred yards apart and the closeness of the line made the fighting extraordinary sanguinary, whole companies being entirely exterminated.

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

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

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
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
