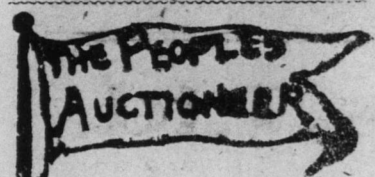

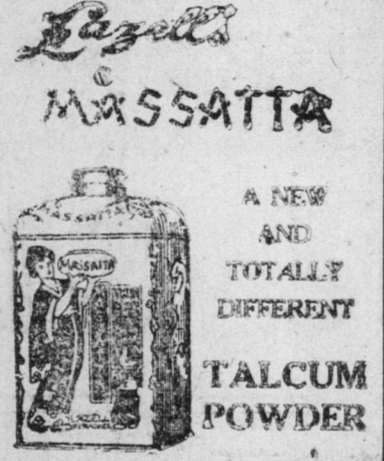

If we add to this a slight idea of the room, with its hangings of stone gray and crimson, its ten or twelve choice examples of the modern masters, and a perfect armory of weapons of the chase, together with furniture costly and rare, one may also give the owner some credit for artistic taste.

As a matter of fact, Percy Chester was no mean judge of wine, pictures, or women; and his opinion was gradually acquiring a weight in the fashionable world as the dicta of a man who had good grounds for his decision, and knew his own mind.

Look at him as he leans back in his chair of Venetian ebony, pouring a claret glass in one hand and idly turning over a small pile of letters with the other.

I looked for you every five minutes."

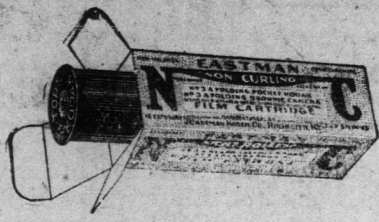

UNIONIST ELECTED.

LONDON, May 17. The coalition government has won a sweeping victory in an election today. W. F. Hicks Deach, a Unionist, who was supported by the Liberals, was elected from Tewkesbury, by a majority of 5,589 over William Boocoy, Independent.

DEBATE ON AERIAL SERVICE.

LONDON, May 17. LONDON, May 17. The Dublin correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Co. says that he understands on good authority that Asquith is to be sworn in as a member of the Irish Executive. This is possibly the first step the correspondent adds, towards re-establishment of civil administration in Ireland. Former Asquith was sworn in as a member of the Irish Privy Council in Dublin this afternoon. This is the first time an English Premier, has been a Minister of this body. It means that Asquith is likely to take a greater share in the executive government of Ireland than any of his predecessors have done, and that he will have a direct part in shaping the policy pursued in the immediate future.

AMERICANS IN IRELAND.

WASHINGTON, May 17. Senator Kern, of Indiana, introduced a resolution today directing the Secretary of State to make inquiry as to the safety and well-being of American citizens in Ireland residing in the districts affected by the recent revolution, and to take steps that will safeguard their lives and property. ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, May 17. Artillery duels on different parts of the front, especially in Champaigne and Mesall district. In Argonne, at Pille Morte, a mining struggle to our advantage. On the left bank of the

Meuse bombardment of our first lines. The enemy attempted to progress by means of grenades at Mort Homme, but completely failed. On the right bank of the Meuse, great artillery activity in the district between Haudromont West, and Vaux Pond. Northwest of Thiamont farm we repulsed a grenade attack against our advanced posts. During the night of the 16th to 17th thirteen of our bombardment aeroplanes dropped twenty-four shells on bivouacs in the Domvillers and Ville de Vauchamp district, eleven on the Brielleux and Clercy stations, fourteen on Nantillois and Romagne cantonnments, and twenty-one on Appremont and Grand Pre stations. Several fires are recorded. On the same night another of our aeroplanes dropped twenty shells on Ars and Metz stations, forty on Prescutty sheds, forty on Arnaville stations, thirty on the railroad and stations between Metz and Thionville. One of our aviators brought down a German aeroplane north of Vic-sur-Aisne. The two wings of the German plane parted during the fall.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.

PARIS, May 17. German troops made an attack with grenades last night on French positions in the vicinity of Deadman's Hill. The effort failed. An official report of today says that on the east of the Meuse along the Verdun front, there was continuous cannonading on both sides, particularly at Haudremé Wood, and Vaux Pond. French aeroplanes made several raids during the night. Bombs were thrown on the German camp at Danvillers and on the railway station at Metz, Frescati and Brielleux.

ENCOUNTER OFF BELGIAN COAST.

LONDON, May 17. (Official.) An encounter took place yesterday evening off the Belgian coast between a force composed of British destroyers and monitors, and some German destroyers. After a short engagement the enemy withdrew to their ports. Our force sustained no casualties.

SAYS BRITISH CRUISER WAS HIT.

AMSTERDAM, May 17. According to the German version of the sea fight off the Belgian coast yesterday afternoon, a British cruiser was hit by a bomb from a German aeroplane.

BRITISH MONITOR DESTROYED.

LONDON, May 17. A British official this evening admits the loss of a small monitor, as the result of fire by Turkish batteries. The monitor was reported as having been sunk, fire and sunk, in a Turkish official statement on Tuesday. The British Admiralty denied the statement, but says that later advices confirm the Turkish report. The British statement says: A delayed telegram received from Vice-Admiral De Roock, states that on the night of May 12-14 one of our small monitors, M-39, commanded by Lieut.-Commander Lockyer, was struck by the enemy's artillery, taking fire, and was subsequently destroyed. Two men were killed and two wounded.

A PASSENGER'S EXPERIENCE.

LONDON, May 17. Samuel Howard Comstock, of Santa Monica, California, who was on the Batavier V., gave the following account of his experience: "I was in the saloon talking when a terrific explosion occurred. My hat was smashed against the ceiling of the saloon. I think the vessel must have been blown up by a mine explosion, apparently directly underneath the ship aft. The hatch was blown off and

much cargo hurled into the air. Within three minutes the ship's decks were awash. I had a life belt, but being a good swimmer, gave it to my fellow American, Mancini, who could not swim. I kicked off my shoes, dived, and swam to a boat, which had been launched. I assisted the stewardess and an injured officer of the ship into a boat. I was so busy I did not see what happened to Mancini. The ship sank in twenty minutes. We were picked up by a trawler patrol and arrived at Yarmouth."

GERMANS REPORTED DESERTING.

GENEVA, May 17. German soldiers along the Swiss-Alsatian frontier, chiefly elderly men of the Landstrum, have begun to ask for food from the Swiss soldiers. The Germans say they have not eaten meat for weeks. Five German soldiers, in uniform, although fired on, escaped across the Swiss frontier at Rodersdorf near Basel, yesterday. They were interned at Berne. The Neue Stuttgarter Zeitung says that the food situation in the Rhine towns is becoming intolerable. The newspaper advises the Government to take drastic measures to change the mode of living of the people. It suggests that cooking in private families be prohibited, and that the population be ordered to eat at common restaurants, where meat would be served once daily, at noon only, and vegetables in the evening. Eighteen German cattle dealers arrived at Basel yesterday, hoping to buy cattle, which are becoming scarce.

PROBABLE LOSS OF EIGHT MEN.

BOSTON, May 17. The probable loss of eight men from the cruiser San Francisco, after the cruiser ran aground on the great round shoal in Vineyard Sound today is reported by wireless here. The San Francisco has been officially reported only slightly damaged.

Parliamentary Association.



A meeting took place of members of the Legislature last night in the Legislative Council Chamber. Mr. Warren, the Secretary of the Newfoundland branch of the Association was present and explained the objects of the Association and the reason for calling the meeting. He explained that at the time of the Coronation the Association had been formed, and branches had subsequently been formed in Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Newfoundland. Little interest had been shown by the Newfoundland branch and what interest had developed had been mainly among the members of the House of Assembly. The branch formed in 1912 had elected as officers: Sir Edward Morris, as President; Mr. J. A. Clift, Vice-President; Mr. W. R. Warren, Secretary. No meetings had been held here since the General elections in 1913, but he, Mr. Warren, had been in correspondence with the Home Parliament Association. The membership has meant to include sitting members of both branches of the Legislature and also ex-members. The object was to promote closer association between the members of the home and overseas parliament, the opening of a bureau of information in London, the offering of facilities for visiting parties of interest at home and in the dominions. The immediate object of reviving the branch here was to deal with an invitation which had been sent to the Newfoundland branch, and among the overseas branches, to select delegates to visit the old country and see what was being done in regard to the War. It was explained that parliamentary delegates from our Allies had already visited Britain with this object, and the idea had been taken up of extending similar facilities to a delegation from the overseas dominions. The Chairman, Sir Edward Morris, read cable messages and letters he had received in connection with the matter. The invitation to the delegates was to be present in Great Britain during July, and a strictly business programme had been arranged. It was to be in no sense a picnic, nor was there to be anything in the way of junketing, as being out of place during the great struggle, although there might be one or two public functions with speech-making. An itinerary was being arranged which would include visits to centres of training for soldiers, munition factories, aeroplane factories, naval ports, visit to the Great Fleet, and to the Front in France. The visit would be a strictly business one, and no facilities could be afforded for including in the itinerary the wives of delegates. The Canadian and White Star line were offering free transportation on their ships to and from New York, and the Home Association would defray hotel and railway travelling in the British Isles. Other expenses would be borne by the delegates themselves. After some discussion, it was resolved to re-organize the Newfoundland branch and it was decided that a committee of twelve should be appointed to nominate officers executive and delegates, the Legislative Council selecting six members and the House of Assembly six, three by Government members and three by Opposition members. Monday night was set for the meeting of the Committee.

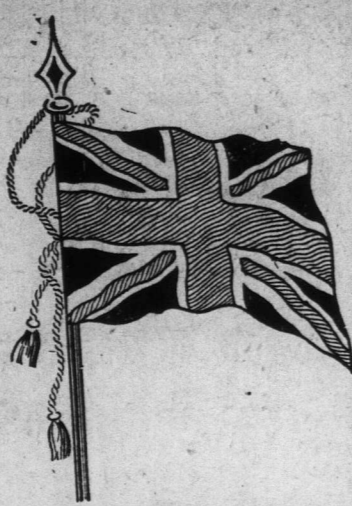

America Stands By Her Treaty With Great Britain.

Terms Provide for Two Years' Delay Before Settlement of Disputed Issues—This Ends Idea of Placating Germany—Note to Berlin Needs No Answer and Kaiser Must Take Consequences of Action.

It was stated in official quarters today that the United States will proceed in the settlement of its issue with Great Britain in accordance with the terms of the so-called Bryan peace treaty signed with the British Government a short while before the beginning of the war.

This is what was meant, it was said, in the words of the statement of Mr. Lansing, Secretary of State, that "in our dealings with the British Government we are acting as we are unquestionably bound to act in view of the explicit treaty engagements with that government."

The terms of this treaty provide that whenever any issue shall arise between the two Powers, signatory to the treaty shall endeavor during a year to seek a settlement of the issue through diplomatic negotiations. If this effort fail, then the Powers shall submit the issue to a joint commission which shall investigate and report. This commission does not have any powers, similar to those of a court of arbitration, to declare a form of settlement and require its acceptance by the Powers, but it is merely to investigate the matter and report the facts and suggestions regarding settlement. Another year is allowed for this investigation. If any trouble comes it must come after this procedure has been followed for the two years.

Thus it was made clear to-day that Germany cannot hope for "pressure" by the United States against Great Britain, even if the United States were disposed to do this, for at least another year. That finally ends, if it were not already ended, the idea that the United States would seek to placate Germany by twisting the lion's tail and attempting to destroy the blockade.

Germany must now do as she pleases in the submarine issue without hope of action against Great Britain. In her reply Germany said that if the United States did not take such action and the blockade remained effective in the future, then a situation would be created in which Germany would have to reserve "liberty of decision."

The note sent to Germany yesterday, in accordance with the interpretation placed on it in official quarters today, gives Germany an immediate opportunity to use that "liberty of decision." In short, it looks as though in its note the United States has thrown down the gauntlet to Germany in a more defiant manner than was realized, telling Germany to adhere to the law or take the consequences without reference to any other matter.

Naturally news of the reception of this note in Germany is awaited here with much interest and anxiety, since the United States does not want a break in friendly relations. The American note does not call for an answer, it was said to-day. If Germany desires to send one she may. But probably this will not be done if Germany decides against a break.—New York Herald, May 10.

"He's Queer."

"Yes, he's good looking, but he's queer. M a b e I think he doesn't think he's—quite all there," a woman said to me the other day in reference to a young man who has recently come into the neighbourhood.

"What makes you think that?" "Oh, I don't know exactly. She says he's been at her house with his sister, and he acts funny, talks in fits and starts, and doesn't always answer when he's spoken to."

That conversation took place a few days ago. To-day I discovered that the young man in question is not only "all there" but is an unusually well-educated and brilliant person. He is doubtless at least as much "there" as his critic. The trouble is that he is slightly deaf. This makes him nervous in his manner and easily accounts for his not always answering when spoken to.

It seems to me that people are altogether too quick to decide that this person or that is not quite all there. Whenever I hear that sentence pronounced, I challenge it with "What makes you think so?"

The answers I get are interesting. Sometimes I get no concrete evidence at all. "She says queer things," is my only satisfaction.

Again I am told, "I've seen him sit in the front window with his hands in his lap doing absolutely nothing for an hour or more." People do sit and think sometimes. Are thoughts—the power that changes and molds the world—nothing?

If a person outrages conventions he is always in danger of being called

"queer." And the step from that to "He isn't all there" is very short.

Not to be wholly governed by conventions may be the sign of a brain above instead of below the average. Some conventions are based on right, others on expediency, others on habit, many are utterly foolish and futile. Such a man might call his censor "not all there" with quite as much reason as they have to apply that stricture to him. He is different from them—well, so are they different from him.

Conventionality, some one has said, is that which decrees a man shall not wear a rose behind his ear. A man might wear a rose behind his ear and be perfectly sane, but his chances of being thought so would be small. To the attention of the persons who are inclined to call everyone who varies from their pattern, insane, I wish to call the definition of the word: "Such a mental condition as, either from the existence of delusion or from incapacity to distinguish between right and wrong with regard to any matter under action, does away with individual responsibility."

Suppose you consider whether you could prove that of a man before you start a rumor so seriously affecting his standing in the community.

"NO PEACE UNTIL GERMANY YIELDS."

London, May 10.—Mr. Herbert Samuel, the Home Secretary, in the course of an address at the National Liberal Club, referred to recent suggestions said to have emanated from Germany in regard to the initiation of peace negotiations. He declared that until Germany was beaten there would be no thoughts of peace, and continuing:

"It is for us in this generation to settle this issue, and not leave to later years or to the generations of children who come after us the heritage of finishing the struggle. Whether by military means or by economic means or by a combination of both, we must win complete and decisive victory."

Manifesto to the People of Ireland.

London, May 10.—The Irish Parliamentary party has issued a manifesto to the people of Ireland, calling upon them to support the constitutional movement as the only one by which their aspirations for self-government can possibly be realized.

"Another tragedy," says the manifesto, "has been added to the long tale of tragedies of Irish history. The capital of Ireland has been the scene of a mad and unsuccessful attempt at revolution. Blood has been shed freely. It is true that Ireland has been bitterly provoked by the growth of a similar revolutionary and illegal movement in another part of Ireland backed by an army in revolt. It is true that the grave responsibility for these events in Dublin rests upon the leaders of that movement. These things will have to be discussed at the proper time.

"It is true that Ireland has been shocked and horrified by a series of military executions by the military tribunals in Dublin. These things have been done in the face of incessant and vehement protests of the Irish leaders, and these protests will be pressed continually and strongly until the unchecked control of the military authorities in Ireland is abolished. But it is also true that, in spite of bitter provocations, the people of Ireland have had no hesitation in condemning the rising in Dublin as a dangerous blow at the heart and hopes of Ireland.

"On the morrow of this tragedy we feel called upon to make a solemn appeal to the people of Ireland to draw the conclusions which these events force upon them. We must leave no misunderstanding in their minds as to our convictions and our resolves. Either Ireland is to be given over to unsuccessful revolutionary movement or have the full support of the Irish people and go until it has completed its work.

Fearn & Son, we understand, contemplate building this summer a two hundred ton vessel, the greater part of the material for which will be obtained at Great Barrow, a few miles from here, thus giving employment to a large number of men. It is said that the famous builder, Thos. Palfrey, will have charge of the work. In the past Placentia was noted for its shipbuilding industry, and we trust that this will be only the nucleus of that industry with which this firm will identify itself in the near future.

The schr. Maddonna, Capt. Joseph Wyse, arrived here yesterday on his way to Argentina with a full load of goods for the new firm of Wyse & Co., now opening business at that place. Messrs. Murphy are extending their business. They have taken over the premises on the Jersey Side, lately occupied by Mr. W. R. Goobie.

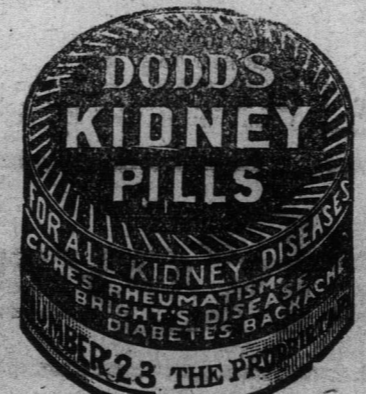

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.

LONDON, To-day. Sir Roger Casement and Bailey were committed for trial for high treason, yesterday.

SEIZED MAIL.

BERLIN, To-day. A despatch from the Hague Overseas News Agency, says all first class mail on board the Dutch steamer Bandenz, bound from Rotterdam for Bolivia, was taken off by the British authorities.

DUE TO A MISUNDERSTANDING.

WASHINGTON, To-day. Sir John Chancellor, British Governor of Trinidad, cabled President Wilson to-day and explained the failure officially to receive Secretary Treasurer McAdoo, when the latter visited the island, on his recent trip to South America. Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, British Ambassador, had previously expressed regret to the President for the incident which was due to a misunderstanding as to McAdoo's arrival.

HARDINGE BACK TO FOREIGN OFFICE.

LONDON, To-day. Baron Hardinge, former Viceroy of India from 1906 to 1910 and Permanent Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, will temporarily resume the latter post in succession to Sir Arthur Nicholson, who is retiring on account of ill health. An announcement to this effect was made last evening by the Foreign Office.

CHURCHILL ATTACKS GOVERNMENT.

LONDON, To-day. The debate in the Commons yesterday on the British aerial service, was of no interest except for the statement of Harold J. Tennant, Parliamentary Under Secretary of War, of the appointment of a new Board of which Earl Carson is to be President and Col. Winston Churchill and William

Johnson Hicks, among others, vigorously attacked the Government, repeating the old accusations of inadequacy. Andrew Bonar Law, Secretary of the Colonies, defending the Government, told how the British air service was constantly improving. Finally the debate collapsed amid laughter, owing to the absence of a quorum.

ACTIVITY ON BRITISH FRONT.

LONDON, To-day. The British official on the campaign in France and Belgium reads: There have been considerable artillery and trench actions to-day about Auchonvillers, Cabaret Rouge, Souchez, Calonne, Culchy, Hohenzollern Redoubt and Ypres. There has been intermittent shelling at other points along the front. Last night raiding parties of Seaforth Highlanders entered the German trenches, north of Roelincourt. Five Germans were killed in their trenches. Three dugouts full of Germans were bombed, one being blown up. Our casualties were slight. The whole raiding party got back to our trenches. Fighting continued among the craters of the front, which blew up on the 15th on Vinzy Ridge. Yesterday fine weather favored aerial activity: 27 combats in the air took place. The Albatross was attacked, driven down and wrecked near Lille. Another was driven down north of Vitry in a damaged condition. The third was attacked by one of our scouts and was seen to turn upside down near the ground. One of our reconnaissance machines failed to return and was seen to land under control in hostile territory. One of our scout aeroplanes is also missing. A great deal of successful aerial photographic work was accomplished.

GERMAN TORPEDO BOAT SUNK.

COPENHAGEN, To-day. A German torpedo boat was sunk by a German mine off Falsterbo, Sweden, according to the Berlingske Tidende Mallo correspondent. All but one man of the crew were saved.

LONDON, To-day.

Until Premier Asquith's return to London at the end of the week, nothing definite is likely to be known as the result of his activities in Ireland. He is still consulting with various authorities with a view to obtaining all possible views. He is expected to visit Cork to-morrow, where he will become acquainted with Nationalist views. In the meantime no step towards filling the vacancies in the Irish administration is being taken. It is assumed the main reason for the Premier's being sworn in as a member of the Irish Privy Council, is that he may become the responsible Minister in Parliament for Irish affairs temporarily. The Nationalist members attach the greatest significance to this step, because it will give the Premier an actual voice in shaping the administration in Ireland.

TALK OF EXCLUDING ULSTER.

LONDON, To-day. The papers teem with suggestions of the possible settlement of the Irish problem. They favor for the most part the idea of granting an executive government for the south and west of Ireland, leaving Ulster under the Imperial Government. It is pointed out that should the experience show successful results south and west under a Dublin Parliament, Ulster might eventually be included to come in under that Parliament.

RADICAL CHANGES IN GOVERNMENT OF IRELAND.

DUBLIN, To-day. Premier Asquith reached the conclusion from impressions gathered during his Irish visit that the old form of Government of Ireland has had its day. The Associated Press learns from sources in closest touch with Premier Asquith, that conversations and conferences have convinced him that the future government must be conducted on an entirely different system. The Prime Minister has taken on care to learn the ideas and views of many persons, other than those in purely official circles. These persons offered greatly varied suggestions. Some of these, it is believed, could be adopted in its entirety, but might be welded together to form a proposal lay before the Cabinet. The Premier, himself, does not know what form his proposal will eventually take. The fact will probably be fully developed only at a Cabinet meeting. His Belfast visit gave a good hint to the Premier that the Ulsterers would not accept a direct proposal implying Home Rule, but it is believed they might be induced to enter into a concerted plan which could possibly be arranged to meet their most serious objections. Asquith will visit Cork to-morrow and gather further opinions. He has, however, not arranged to see politicians. Most of those with whom he will confer are of the literary and educational classes.

BUDGET OF WAR NEWS.

LONDON, To-day. From Tenale Pass region in the Western Trentine, at Monfalcone, a short distance from the head of the Gulf of Trieste, the Austrians are vigorously on the offensive against the Italians. In Tyrol, south of Trent, heavy infantry attacks to the east of Adige River have forced the Italians again to abandon some of their advanced positions, and resulted in the capture by Austrians of 141 officers and 6,200 men. In addition 13 guns and seventeen machine guns were captured. Vienna says: South of Rovere the Austrians stormed Zeegnotorta, but Rome asserts the five attacks launched here were put down with heavy casualties. The bodies of numerous dead Austrians are floating away in the swift current of the Adige River. The repulse of another Austrian attack in the Sugana Valley is also reported by Rome. Along the remainder of the front there were heavy artillery bombardments with here and there infantry attacks and bombing operations by aviators on both sides have taken place against opposing positions. On the line in France and Belgium, fighting consisted mainly of artillery duels, most severe northwest of Verdun. The Entente Allied aircraft have been particularly active against German positions in combats of the air with German fliers. In these latter combats, several German

aircraft were brought down by British and French aviators. In one of the raids, American aviators fighting with the French army, under the title of the Franco-American flying corps, took part in their first Foray as an individual unit. Flights of minor importance with advantage in favor of the Russians have taken place on the northern end of the Russian front in Asiatic Turkey. Around Diarbekr, the Turks again assumed the offensive against the Russians, but again met with repulse. The French are showing activity along Lake Doiran and other sectors of the Serb-Greek frontier, having occupied Devetepie and pushed their forces eastward toward Monastir infantry on both sides along this front continue to make preparations for a position for encounters. Of three Americans on board the Dutch steamer Batavier V., which was sunk by an explosion in the North Sea, one was drowned. One American expresses the belief that the steamer struck a mine.

SWEDEN TO REMAIN NEUTRAL.

STOCKHOLM, To-day. The Swedish crisis has passed. The activist attempt to force the situation which would plunge the country into war has failed. Sweden will remain firmly impartially neutral. The Government feels no alarm concerning Russia's activity in foraging Aland Island. Reassuring statements to this effect were made today in both chambers of the Riksdag.

PEMBERTON BILLING SNUBBED.

LONDON, To-day. An adjournment of the Commons occurred yesterday during a speech by Noel Pemberton Billing, recently elected a member of the House on an improved air service reform. According to morning papers adjournment was deliberately engineered as a snub to the young air man who was formerly connected with the Royal Air Service. The Daily News lobby correspondent in this connection says in order to show less than a quorum, some fifty members fled out of the chamber. The members remaining cheered and laughed while the count was going on, for they had designated the affair as a deliberate snub to Pemberton Billing, who generally is regarded as having made himself ridiculous by his failure to substantiate before an inquiry committee his charges against the air service.

ASQUITH LEFT FOR CORK.

DUBLIN, To-day. Asquith left here this morning for Cork. He is expected to hold several conferences with the Nationalist leaders in the south of Ireland, after which he will return to Dublin.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS IN ITALY.

ROME, To-day. The vast region in Central Italy, extending from Anxquilla through Abruzzi provinces to Perugia, Pesaro, Forli and Ferrara in the north, and including the Republic of San Marino, have been shaken by earthquake shocks, being repeated many times Tuesday night and throughout yesterday. So far as present known, no casualties occurred, but details reaching here are still meagre.

1.45 P.M.

ON THE VERDUN FRONT.

PARIS, To-day. Several attacks were made by German troops on the Verdun front last night in an effort to capture the redoubt at Avocourt. The official statement to-day says the Germans were repulsed each time and that they lost heavily. French troops, after severe fighting, captured a German fort on the northeast slope of Hill 304. The German trenches north of Hill 287 were raided by French forces which killed or captured the occupants of these positions. On the Verdun front, east of the Meuse, artillery on both sides were active during the night. Two French aeroplanes dropped 50 more shells on the railway station at Metz on the night of May 16.

WAR PENSIONS.

LONDON, To-day. The scheme of war pensions announced in the Commons yesterday, by the Parliamentary Under Secretary for the Government Board, provides for grants of 250 yearly to married and unmarried men called to the colors, where financial hardship result. This is irrespective of allowances already given to soldiers' wives. It was announced that assistance would be extended to include rents, insurance premiums, taxes, loans and interest instalments.

Your Boys and Girls.

If going on a short journey with the baby it is better to prepare the feedings for the whole trip at home. You can sterilize the milk for this purpose as follows: Stand the filled bottles in a kettle over the fire and let the water boil for about an hour and a half. After boiling, the bottles should be gradually cooled and then made as cold as possible by standing them in a pail of cracked ice. A good portable ice box for such a journey may be made at home as follows: Use two covered tin pails, one an inch or two smaller than the other, so it may stand inside the larger pail. Fill the space between the two with sawdust, put the bottles with cracked ice in the inner pail and cover both tightly, making a canvas or flannel cover for the whole. To warm the bottle for baby you should carry an enameled ware pitcher which the porter will fill with warm water and you can set the bottle in that until warm enough for feeding.

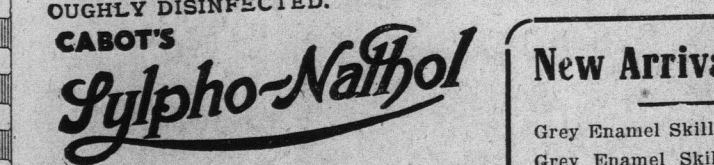

The Oldest Commons Member.

(From the Ottawa Journal.) Sir Wilfrid Laurier, although not the oldest member of Parliament—Sir Mackenzie Bowell having been a member since Confederation—is the oldest member of the Commons. He was elected for Drummond-Arthabaska in 1874. He is in his 75th year. He became a Cabinet Minister when he was 29 years of age, being appointed Minister of Inland Revenue by Alexander Mackenzie in 1887. Ten years later he became the leader of his party. Nine years after that he was Prime Minister. After fifteen years of office he was defeated on the reciprocity issue of 1911, and he remained in the House as leader of the Opposition. Last fall he underwent an operation for the removal of a tooth that had been giving him constant pain for a long time, and since then he has shown an ability and capacity for work that had not been apparent for several sessions. Some of his speeches he made in the House this session are amongst the best of his career.

"An Act respecting the Refining of Cod Liver Oil,"

(Passed May 4th, 1916.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:—

1. From and after the first day of June, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, no person in Newfoundland shall engage in the business of refining Cod Liver Oil without having first obtained a License from the Department of Marine and Fisheries, under a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, to be recovered in a summary manner before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice by any person who shall sue for same.

2. Such Licenses shall be issued by the said Department subject to such rules and regulations as may be made by the Governor in Council in that behalf.

3. Any person who after the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, shall export from Newfoundland any refined Cod Liver Oil without having the same first inspected and branded in accordance with the provisions of Chapter one hundred and four of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Second Series) shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars to be recovered in a summary manner before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice by any person who shall sue for same.

4. One-half of all penalties recovered under the provisions of this Act shall be paid to the party giving the information, and the other half to the Minister of Finance and Customs for the use of the Colony.

The foregoing is published for the information and guidance of those interested, and they are required to govern themselves accordingly and apply for a License to the Department of Marine and Fisheries immediately.
