



bags, back to the post-office. Thought the strictest rules should be kept as regards explosives and maerials of which there is a shortage, the practice of bringing home German souvenirs seems likely to be useful in arousing interest in those at home.

### What "Australasia" Means.

The following letter, just received from the Auckland Chamber of Com-merce, gives the incorrect use of the

The attention of this chamber has been directed to the unsatisfactory position resulting from the indiscriinate use of the term "Australasia" in connection with business matters. It is stated that oversea exporting houses, in placing agencies with Australian firms, frequently use the term "Australasia" when only the Commonwealth of Australia is intended. Individual cases were quoted where, on New Zealand firms applying for agencies, it was found that their appointment was barred through "Australasia" being used in the agreement with some Australian firm, although the latter had no connection whatever with New Zealand and no intention of working it. In some instances the New Zealand appointment had actually been made before the hitch resulting from the agreement was discover

You will recognize that this is detrimental both to New Zealand business and to the oversea exporter, who in many cases is practically blocked from obtaining a connection in the Dominion. The chamber is of opinion that you may think the matter of sufficient importance to bring it to the notice of American manufacturers, "Austraiasia" is understood to cover Australia and New Zealand, the two countries are quite distinct and it is not in the interests of either that the control of agencies covering both territories should be placed with a firm doing business only in one-Commerce Reports.

### Yellow Streak.

(From the Boston Herald). The German "whine offensive" is now in full swing. Day by day the great wireless station at Nauen sends out its appeals for leniency, for a modification of the armistice terms, or for haste in relieving the wants of the German people. German agents in neutral countries and German sympathizers everywhere are protesting loudly that the Allies must not crush this nation whose running amuck cost the world so many million lives. The campaign for leniency is being carried on with all the ingenuity and brazenness which marked the course of German propaganda in this country before we entered the war. With nations as with men the brutish temperament is usually tinged with a yellow streak. Germany, during the last two or three weeks, has demonstrated that maxim to the world. It is characteristic that a nation which starved Belgium, Serbia and Poland should now set up a wail because it s own people have to go on short rations. t is characteristic that a navy which ospital ships and shelled lifeboats should now surrender its capital vessels without firing a shot. The Spaniards at Santiago were willing to put up a fight, such as it was. And the Russians, in the sea of Japan, were not afraid to face certain defeat with their barnacled ships. It has remained for the Teuton to show the world how men can take humiliation in unmeasured quantity rather than risk a fight upon unequal terms. The German Government has been warning the Allies that Bolshevism cannot be restrained in the fatherland unless the armistice terms are made more lenient. Let it be replied that the spread of anarchy in Russia did not induce the Hohenzollern empire to relax the rigorous terms imposed at Brest-Litovsk. If the returning German soldiers insist upon finding scapegoats among the militarists of their own land, why should the Allies interfere? The men who have most to fear from a Bolshevist outburst in Germany are the ones who were responsible for the war. There ic no reason why France, England or America should now intervene in their

## "Monstrtius!"

German Press on Armistice Terms. Copenhagen, Nov. 30.—The Deutsche Tageszeitung, commenting on the provisions of the armistice, says:-"The Government must recognize that these armistice terms are modelled on those dictated by Rome to Carthage, and seem to foreshadow a peace of violence. The German people must now ask their government for a clear statement of the measures which they propose to take to meet this terrible

The Vorwarts says:-"These terms are indeed heavy, but after the downfall of the old system there is no alternative for the new Government but

The Taglioche Rundschau describer the terms as "monstrous," and adds: -"The Entente's diabolical plan with regard to the continuation of the blockade will result in famine and a perpetuation of the revolution."

"The terms of the armistice are unprecedented in their inhumanity. We are ready to deliver up fortresses and give up ships, but in addition a great part of our railway material, which is bsolutely necessary for our support, is demanded. With these terms to





### **Electric Bulletins From** a Typewriter.

News bulletins, flashed in big electric letters almost simultaneously with their receipt over press wires, is made possible by a new electrical device. This invention consists of a huge bulletin board, operated by a typewriter. It is called an electro-

On either side of the board, which towers above a newspaper building in a mid-western city, are 60 monograms. arranged in three rows. Each monogram, which measures 2 by 3 feet, contains an arrangement of 21 lights, various combinations of which form any letter or numeral, the dash, question mark and dollar sign.

Selection of the groups of lights to form the various characters is done by pressing the desired keys on the typewriter. Selection of the monograms is done automatically through an extra platen on the typewriter. Thus, when the operator writes a bulletin on the typewriter, the letters anpear in quick succession on the board and remain until the bulletin is completed. The bulletin may be left on for any desired length of time and then released by pressing a single the operator to strike out a single letter without interfering with the other letters. Thus, when an error is made the correct letter may be inserted without writing the entire bulleting again.

As the keys are struck to produce the letters on the board, the same bulletins are written on paper in he usual way thus giving a complete record of everything flashed.

An interesting feature is the rapidity with which the bulletins may be flashed. An ordinary bulletin may be written in 10 seconds, the operator writing just as he would on any typewriter. 11 图 数据

As the operator cannot see the board as he works, a pilot board has been provided directly before him, consisting of 60 green light bulbs. When he strikes a key, the action throws on the corresponding letter. which in turn lights the green bulb corresponding to the number of the monogram in which the letter appears. For instance: if he strikes the "A" key, with the platen set at No. 1 position, the letter "A" will appear on the first monogram of the board and No. 1 green light will burn. If it does not burn, the operator knows that the letter did not appear and he strikes it over.

Advertising bulletins are flashed along with the news bulletins, thus proving the device practical as well as novel.—Scientific American.

On the recommendation of the Food Control Board, and under the provisions of the Food Control Act, 1917, and the War Measures Act, 1914-1916, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to approve the following Regulations:

W. W. HALFYARD, Colonial Secretary Dept. of the Colonial Secretary. November 26, 1918.

(1) From and after this date no person shall import into this Dominion any "breadstuffs" as defined in the Regulations dated the 9th July, 1918, made by the Governor in Council under the provisions of the above men-tioned Acts and published in the Royal Gazette, or any Pork, including Pigs' Heads and Jowls, Salted Beef Bacon, Tongues, smoked or cured, dry, salted or pickled, Meats dry, salted or smoked, Canned Meats, Sugar, Molasses. Butter, Cheese, Fruits, Tea, Cattle Feeds, Hay or Oats, without previously obtaining a permit from the Food Control Board, and for each and every such permit, except those required for imports of "breadstuffs" in quantities of less than ten barrels of Pork or Salted Beef in quantities of less than five barrels, he shall pay a fee to the Food Control Board at the following



Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,-In your editorial last vening, Dec. 12th, you mention in reerence to vessels that are missing, vithout actual proof of being submarined, "For these no Bill of Claim can be presented."

I bring this to your notice as these-'missing vessels" should be claimed

Proof is coming to light now from the records of German submarine commanders, giving the names of vessels that have long been missing.

The German Government gave a onus to their commanders for registers of any vessels they had submarined. The British authorities gave instructions to captains leaving England to destroy their registers when there was any likelihood of being submarined, and leaden weights were given them to attach to their register for the purpose of sinking them quickly, which makes it even harder to prove reason for loss of missing

As further proof I may mention that Lloyd's Marine Underwriters and War Rish Underwriters are each paying half the loss of all claims for missing vessels when an equal amount of insurance was carried for both these risks. Therefore, why should these claims not be presented


