

#### In the Supreme Court.

IN THE MATTER OF THE HARBOR MAIN ELECTION PETITIONS.

Setween Richard Kelly, Petitoner, and William Woodford, Respondent.

A crowded Court, comprising a large ection of the legal profession and many inquisitive citizens, greeted the proceedings in this matter this mornng. The Full Bench was present.

When the case was called by the Registrar nobody appeared on behaif of the Petitioner, Richard Kelly, but Mr. Howley, K.C., and Mr. Higgins, K.C., Counsel for Mr. Woodford, the Respondent, were both present.

Mr. Howley moved, on behalf of Mr. Woodford, that a certificate of indemnity be granted to him and, in support of his motion, addressed the Court as

He first outlined the history of the case, pointing out that the case came up for trial before the Court on the morning of the 18th of March, when Mr. Gibbs, K.C., Counsel for the Petitioner, moved to have the petition with drawn. The Court intimated that they thought that in proceedings for withdrawal the English practice should be followed: that notice should be given and affidavits by all the parties and their solicitors should be filed. showing whether or not there had been any collusion. An adjournment then took place without setting a day, but five days later, on an application in the Jones case, the Court intimated that they would sit on the following day on the Woodford case.

on this essence; AND WHEREAS it is not desirable, nor is it necessary, that persons who use this article for culinary and manufacturing purposes only should be de-

prived of their right to do so; AND WHEREAS a doubt exists in the mind of one, at least, of the Judges of the Supreme Court as expressed in his judgment in the case of Soper, appellant, vs. Byrne, respondent, as o whether any power is given the Governor-in-Council to prohibit the sale and importation of the article;

BE IT RESOLVED that this committee, appointed at a large and representative public meeting of citizens of St. John's to endeavour to secure a modification of said Prohibbtion Acts, is of opinion that the Governor-in-Council should take necessary powers or steps under any Act now in force or which may hereafter be enacted to control and regulate, but not to prohibit absolutely the importation

and sale of said Essence; BE IT FURHTER RESOLVED, that this Committee is of opinion that a rationing system be put into operation so that householders may be supplied periodically with small quantities of said Essence sufficient for ordinary household purposes and that manufacturers of cakes and confections may procure sufficient quantities of the same under stringent regulations designed to prohibit the use of same for any but bona fide flavoring purposes

#### The Young Men's League." NEW MOVEMENT ORGANIZED LAST

At 9 o'clock last evening in the

Board of Trade Rooms, there was a meeting of the Preliminary Committee appointed Sunday night at the meeting of young men for the purpose of doing the initial work of organizing a "Young Men's League." Messrs. Harold Pike, W. Learning Walter Sparkes, J. Hynes, J. S. Noseworthy. Mac Morgan, J. Osmond, Laurence Cullen and J. R. Smallwood were present. Mr. Cullen was elected to the chair, after which Mr. Smallwood tabled a draft of a constitution for the League. This was discussed section by section and accepted. It was not all gone through, the meeting adjourning at 11 o'clock. This Constitution will be submitted to the general meeting of young men which will likely take place Sunday night week. The name of the organization will be "The Young Men's League." Qualifications for membership therein are that the candidate be between 18 and 30, inclusive, and that he take the League Pledge, which is: "For Purity of Mind: Health of Body: and Cheerfulness of Spirit: I will ever strive." The League will be undenominational, nonsectarian and nonpolitical. The object shall be the educating of its members in the three ideals set forth in the Pledge-"Purity, Health, and Cheerfulness." To accomplish this, recreations, sports, debates, competitions, etc., will be arranged. Medals and other prizes will be offered for winners, and it is likely that a scholarship will be awarded annually. It is probable, also, that an annual Sports' Day will be set and the League will likely enter teams in the Hockey and Football Leagues and enter a boat in the Regatta. Branches will be formed in the Outports and a headquarters eventually held here, where a library, writing-room, gymnasium, swimming pool and other attractions will be seen. There are numerous men of influence who favor the idea and when the next general meeting is held a packed house will be in evidence. Hundreds of young men have signified their intention of joining. A President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary, and an Executive Committee will be elected at the general meeting. The Preliminary Committee meets again Monday night at 8 o'clock, when it is hoped to get through the Constitution.



"Junius" Writes.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—Please allow me space in your valuable paper to comment on the subject of Mederate prohibition, as this topic seems to be occupying so much attention in this city. Some worthy citizens claim that prohibition takes away their liberty. May I reply to that in the words of the Principal of one of our city colleges, "I do not consider my freedom interfered with because the laws of my country do not allow me to become drunk, although many people seem to think se." Neither was it a law made by a few, but the wish of the people. Surely the people knew what they were voting for!

The American Brewers' Review

"The so-called personal liberty argument in behalf of alcoholic drinks loses its force. Consideration of the public welfare continues to grow, and overshadows the right of the individual. The drink question must be fought out upon the ultimate fourdation of moral, hygienic and social order-in other words, the public welfare, for if the public welfare requires the suppression of the alcoholic drink traffic it should be suppressed."

Other people claim that the prohibition of liquor gives rise to the drinking of "moonshine," essences, etc., which are much worse than the pure drinks. By all means allow those persons, who are unworthy to be called decent citizens, to drink essences, shoe polish and whatever else their depraved tastes may lead them to, and the sooner they kill themselves the better the country will be. I should advise the importation of wood alcohol so that they may be removed from our midst a little sooner. We do not expect to reform such confirmed drinkers. Our aim is to free the next generation from the curse of drink. We want to save our young men, who might if the laws of our country allowed it, drink brandy, rum, whiskey, etc., and finally contract the taste for it, but who would never think of imbibing into their systems such stuff as is being taken by people in St. John's and in Newfoundland today, and which of itself ought to be enough to convince everyone of the

evils of strong drink. Some person, whose names passes my memory, suggests that people need spirits when exposed to the cold and storms on the Newfoundland coast. Now, anybody with any intelligence or common sense knows that spirits, instead of raising the temperature of the body, lowers it and makes the body colder than it would ordinarily be. Explorers have proved that to take spirits is the worst thing they can do in intense cold, as it lowers the temperature of the body some degrees and always ends disastrously. When Alcock and Brown made their famcus flight across the Atlantic last year, it is not recorded that they took any spirituous liquors with them. Surely if it possesses the power to produce bodily heat that some claim for it, one would feel inclined to think that these gallant gentlemen, whose valorous deeds ranks them among the world's pravest men-would have supplied themselves with it when they undertook their perilous journey, the success of which not only maintained the traditions of the Empire, but at the mention of their names our blood tin-

gles in our veins. Mr. Beresford, by his denunciation of the liquor traffic, seems to have gotten himself in bad with some of the moderates. While he has been but a short time with us, his efforts in behalf of prohibition, undoubtedly proves that he has the interest and well being of the future generations of this country at heart, and it's the wish of the writer that this city possessed more men of his type who had the courage of their convictions. The law at present in this Dominion against the sale, importation and manufacture of spirituous liquors was made possible by the united efforts of prohibitionists and with them it's going to be a case of "What we have we hold."
