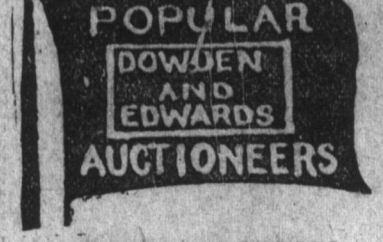

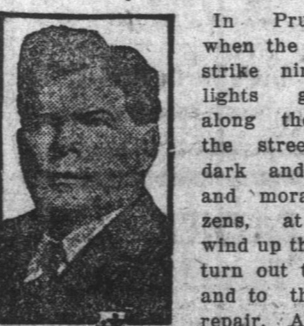

Something Like a Surplus.

Britain Has £46,000,000, Actual--Belfast's Death Toll For March Was 64--Fatal Week End in Ulster Capital--Serious Split in Irish Republican Army.

BRITAIN'S SURPLUS.
LONDON, April 1. With the close of the financial year the British Treasury, the Chancellor of the Exchequer indicates, not only balanced its budget but secured a surplus of nearly 45,000,000 pounds for reduction of the national debt. The actual revenue amounted to 1,124,000,000 pounds and expenditure to 1,079,000,000 pounds. The taxpayers created a new record of 398,000,000 pounds for the year, a most conspicuous and satisfactory feature of revenue.

BELFAST'S BLACKEST MONTH.
BELFAST, April 2. The roll of fatalities from faction fighting here during March was 64, the blackest month in the city's history. The train from Belfast to Dublin was held up Saturday by forty armed men, who removed all letters and parcels from Belfast. On Friday night Republican insurgents attacked the police station at Emuval, Donegal, with machine guns, but the police garrison escaped injury. An armoured car which went to the assistance of the besieged was subjected to a determined attack.

ANOTHER BELFAST HORROR.
BELFAST, April 2. Another grim week end for Belfast. Four men were shot and killed and three children wounded in the Sinn Fein area last night. Shooting is believed to have been in reprisal for the killing on Saturday of George Turner, a regular policeman for fourteen years. The assassin fired on Turner from a vacant house and escaped. Later there was heavy fire punctuated by shrieks of women and children and afterwards the bodies of four dead men were found and also three wounded children. The father and children, Joseph Walsh, was one of the men killed. Walsh was lying in bed with the two children, one two years and the other seven years. The bullet which killed him wounded the two children. At Waterford, Protestant Bishop Willer, speaking on the terrible events in North Ireland declared, "the names of Catholics and Protestants are being used in connection with some of the foulest deeds that ever disgraced a country."

A SERIOUS SPLIT IN IRISH ARMY.
DUBLIN, April 2. The serious extent of the split in the Irish Republican Army was revealed to-day when the five Dublin battalions were ordered out to take the new oath of allegiance to free themselves from responsibility to Dan Breen and over 2,000 men responded. Extremists to-night expressed entire satisfaction. De Valera to-day, addressing a demonstration at Dundalk said the new peace pact between Craig and Collins was already regarded as a scrap of paper in Ulster. Collins, speaking at Castlebar, said the peace pact had added immensely to the prospect of a new union between the North and South.

A FRENCH THREAT.
PARIS, April 2. Premier Poincare, told the Chamber on Saturday that if Germany remained recalcitrant regarding payment of reparations, France would reassert her entire liberty of action and that the Allies were in accord with her on this point. Three-fourths of the Deputies applauded.

B.C. TOWN WIPED OUT.
VANCOUVER, April 2. One person was burned to death and four are missing as a result of a fire which destroyed the town of Hazelton, B.C., with property loss of \$100,000.

BIG FIRE IN CHARLOTTETOWN.
CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I., April 2. Fire in a warehouse of the Imperial Oil Company, which broke out Saturday, was only extinguished to-day. Owing to a strong wind it threatened for hours to ignite the tanks containing over a million gallons of kerosene and gasoline. It also menaced the city.

NFLD. SEAMAN PASSES AWAY.
HALIFAX, April 1. Josephus Pike, aged 60, cook on the Newfoundland schooner John W. Miller, died in Hospital yesterday. He was a native of Carboneau. The body is going by the Rosalind.

MORE MINERS OUT.
CALGARY, Alberta, April 2. Eight thousand coal miners struck in Alberta and North Eastern British Columbia Saturday.

BENNET LOSES.
CALGARY, April 2. The appeal of Hon. R. B. Bennett for the unseating of J. Shaw, Independent M.P., West Calgary, has been dismissed. Shaw was declared elected on a recount over Bennett, Minister of Justice in the Meighen Government.

SLIGHT EARTHQUAKE REPORTED.
HALIFAX, N.S., April 2. Dalhousie seismographs to-day recorded a slight earthquake, the distance and direction of which was not indicated.

WILL TEST STRENGTH TO-DAY.
NEW YORK, April 2. The second day of the nation wide coal strike passed quietly with both sides preparing for a test of strength to-morrow.

NEW ENGLAND STORM SWEPT.
BOSTON, April 2. The schooner Lyle Epper was wrecked, and street car lines were blocked by a snow storm which swept over New England yesterday.

LABOUR'S POSITION IN THE COMMONS.
LONDON, April 1. The Labour party with the latest recruit in East Lothian, Alderman Hanlon, now number seventy-four, nearly twice as many as the Independent Liberals in the Commons. You will be surprised when you attend the Highlanders' Sale and see the bargains at the Jumble Table.—aprl.21

The spacious hall had been tastefully decorated, and on tables forming a hollow square the whole length of the hall, were the splendid loaves two and three tiers deep.

Miss Furneaux, D.S.T., arrived on the afternoon train and immediately began work, as the task before her was not only tedious but one requiring great science and skill, for the loaves had a similarity of appearance and quality very baffling to the untrained eye. However, by a process of elimination the various loaves in each grade were worked down until it was apparent that the much coveted honours would be confined to some thirty loaves. On these Miss Furneaux laboured most assiduously, and in the Coal and Wood section Nos. 227, 109 and 64 received first, second, and third places respectively; and in the Gas and Electric bakings, Nos. 33, 37, and 267 got the awards. Even then it was impossible to tell who the fortunate winners were, for as each loaf was received the names and addresses were removed and a number assigned to each so that it was impossible to identify any particular entry. Amid much excitement it was announced to the large audience present that the winners were as follows:—

After the judging, Mr. Frank Howell (the genial resident agent for this popular grade of flour) announced that Miss Furneaux, who by the way is the teacher of Domestic Sciences at St. John's, had very kindly consented to deliver a short treatise on the qualities and characteristics which combine to make prize winning bread. From her clever and altogether too brief remarks we learned that in recent and authoritative score of judging bread, lately revised and published in the U.S. Govt. bulletins:—

1. General Appearance—Shape and size, well rounded, not cracked at sides, evenly baked. 20
2. Baking—Crust an even brown, not more than one-eighth inch thick, centre of loaf well done 10
3. Flavour and Odour—Sweet and nutty, not sour, musty or salty 40
4. Texture—Cut surface should be fine and silky, and evenly honey-combed with small holes; must not be elastic when pressed, springing back into place leaving no mark. The colour should be creamy white not snowy white 30

Miss Furneaux's splendid information lecture was greeted with vociferous applause. Mr. P. Grace, who was present on behalf of Harvey & Co., Ltd., thanked the audience for their presence and for the interest which they evinced in the remarks of the lecturer. He availed of the opportunity to state that "Windsor Patent" is so called because it is exactly the

Produce and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.)

Codfish—The Oporto stocks have declined to 35,943 quintals, while the consumption for the week is 7,657 quintals, which is an excellent showing, and has resulted in an advance in the price to 44 shillings per quintal with a prospect of an advance soon to 50 shillings or more, owing to the scarcity of fish there and the limited amount to go forward. The Spanish markets are in even a better condition, and the highest figures for three years have been got there for fish this week. Whoever holds good fish here now is certain to make profitable sales.

Week's Exports—The total exports this week amounted to 15,050 quintals as follows:—

From Outports—By schooner E. P. Bailey 4,618 qtls. from W. J. Moores, Carbonear, to Alicante.

From St. John's—By schooner Union Jack from Monroe Export Co. to Pernambuco, 4,548 qtls.; by schooner Cape Race from Jas. Baird, Ltd., 5,554 quintals to Pernambuco; by S.S. Canadian Sapper from G. M. Barr, 130 qtls. to Barbados, and by the S.S. Stable I, 200 qtls. from A. E. Hickman Co., Ltd., to Halifax.

Cod Oil—Prices are firm on continued scarcity in the New York market, and Newfoundland oil is offered at 57 to 60 cents, according to the seller. The last issue of the New York Oil Market Journal, there seems to be an awakening to a better demand after the long period of inactivity, and there is a much better prospect of improved prices the coming season than for a long time. Since New Year 689 tons have been shipped from St. John's, as compared with 703 for corresponding date last year.

Codliver Oil—Norway's new oil, the first from the 1922 catch of fish, is now coming to the market, and they are asking a higher price than United States buyers are satisfied to respond to, except those having immediate and pressing needs, viz: \$21.00 per barrel of 25 gallons ready for the Druggist. The New Oil Journal says on March 22nd, "Norway's Codliver Oil prices for new catch oil in New York fall to take into consideration the large stocks which are held here unsold on the spot."

Flour—The imports of flour this week were 750 barrels by the S.S. Bornholm. Wheat declined during the week about six to seven cents a bushel in Chicago. There is an easier feeling amongst dealers, and buying ahead has been slackened. The Chicago quotation for May Wheat dropped down to 132 Thursday at the closing hour, which was over seven points from the highest record of last month's crop. Conditions in winter wheat have improved considerably in the South Western States, and there is a general feeling that prices will not depart much this spring from the present levels. The St. John's quotation for leading brands is \$10.25.

Beef—The week's imports were 218 tons by the S.S. Bornholm from Chicago. The market holds quiet and at last week's prices viz: \$20.00 per cwt. for Family Special, \$20.25 to \$20.75 for Boneless. There is a good movement of cattle to Great Britain again which, if it continues, may stiffen up the prices on this side, as the Western farmers say the stocks of cattle held is below the average. This report, however, is not taken seriously by dealers who feel confident that there will be no advance on present prices this spring.

Pork—The market is very quiet this week and prices are lower. May Pork declined to \$18.75 in Chicago Thursday, a drop of about \$2.00 from the early March quotation. The local market prices are \$31.00 for Mess, \$29.00 for Fat Back, \$31.00 for Ham Butt and Spare Ribs, and \$42.00 for

Grocers Family Mess, wholesale. The imports for the week were 100 barrels by the S.S. Bornholm from Boston.

Molasses—The schr. James O'Neil is now due from Barbados to W. A. Munn with the first cargo of new molasses. The quotation in Barbados is still 40 cents per wine gallon, which dealers consider too high, under all the circumstances making for lower prices this spring. Ordering in Canada is, therefore, at a low ebb, especially as there are liberal stocks of 1921 molasses still held in St. John, Halifax and Montreal to be worked off. The same applies to our own country, and no importers are rushing to purchase heavily at prevailing prices. The local quotation is still 80 cents per gallon, wholesale for old molasses.

Sugar—There is no change in refined sugar. The market is quiet and no advance is so far indicated for White American granulated sugar in the New York market, in spite of the fact that Cuban Raws advanced 3/4 cents on a big order for 20,000 tons from the United Kingdom last week for April shipment. Standard granulated is still quoted in New York at \$8.50 per 100 lbs., and the buying is from hand to mouth, as if they feared no advance. The local price this week is \$10.65. Imports this week were 750 barrels and 100 bags.

Potatoes—Mild weather permits a freer movement of potatoes, and is making the tubers more plentiful in the markets at home and abroad. The consequence is a slight weakening in price, especially for wholesale lots, in railway cars in Canada. Some small lots from the Southern Shore were brought to town this week and sold at \$3.00 to \$3.50 per barrel. The S.S. Bornholm brought in 400 barrels of George Neal, Ltd. this week. The quotations for imported is \$3.70 to \$4.50 wholesale and retail.

Oats—The price of oats is easier in Canada this week, following the general decline of all grains in the Winnipeg market. On Western oats there was a drop of three to four cents a bushel, and sales were made as low as 64 cents, or \$2.56 per sack. The St. John's quotation to-day is \$3.00 for Mixed and \$4.00 for White. None were imported this week, but there is a fair supply in the local market. With the opening of the St. Lawrence it is likely that prices will be lower.

Hay—There has been little or no change in this market since our last report. There is still a good demand which will continue till grazing time. The S.S. Bornholm brought in 834 bales from Halifax this week. The quotation at Montreal still holds at

\$28.00 to \$29.00 a ton for No. 2 Timothy, while the New York market is steady at \$26.00 for same quantity. The St. John's price is \$53.00 to \$54.00 wholesale, and at the rate of three cents per pound for small lots.

The Romance of Goodwood.

If Ascot had a Queen for its founder, the cradling of Goodwood was presided over by a Duke, one of the finest sportsmen of his or any day; for it was the third of the Richmond dual line who himself designed and constructed the course, in the days when Trafalgar was still unthought. At the beginning of April, 1801, it was announced that "the new racecourse on the Harroway, near Goodwood, the seat of His Grace of Richmond, is now completely formed for sport and is much admired by the acknowledged amateurs of the turf." Although Goodwood is the youngest of our classic race courses—ninety years younger than Ascot, and three centuries younger than Epsom and Newmarket—it has crowded a great and splendid history into its life, drawing to its Sussex retirement the world of rank and fashion, and every sportsman who has played a conspicuous part in the stage of the turf. Goodwood has witnessed many sensational races. When Favennus won the Goodwood Cup in 1872, under a heavy handicap, Joseph Hayhoe, his trainer, exclaimed in his delight, "I wouldn't take £1,000 for a hair of his tail." It was at Goodwood that Lord George Bentinck, disgusted with his failure to win the Derby, the one great ambition of his life, parted with his entire stud library "for a word" for £15,000. The meeting, maybe, is not quite what it was in its palmy days of half a century ago when no fewer than forty-three races were run, the collective value of which amounted to over £25,000, and £1, which no fewer than 242 horses started, but though the races are fewer and the stakes smaller, Goodwood has had none of its old-time fascination. It still remains the most enjoyable meeting of the year; and from whatever point of view we regard it, it well justifies its proud claim to be known as "Glorious Goodwood."

Wholesale Bribery by Germans.

Sofia, Bulgaria. (Associated Press.)—The trial of former Prime Minister Radoloff and his Ministers brings to light every day fresh details of the sinister influences that brought Bulgaria into the war on the side of the Central Empires. Witnesses state that the Germans began by systematically buying up the Bulgarian newspapers, working through a consortium German financier, among them the Mannesmann Brothers. A propaganda service was organized under a certain Captain Engelhardt, and soon only German news appeared to the exclusion of all other. Engelhardt also lavished money on the postal and telegraph employees as well as on police and Customs House officials to facilitate the passage of munitions through Bulgaria to Turkey. A witness at the trial testified that 45,000,000 marks had been set aside for this propaganda work.

Household Notes.

A magazine will serve as a lap-board and is pliable. Just slip the magazine (large or small, as required) under the spot to be patched, and you will find that it forms a perfect background just stiff enough.

If you wish to applique a design on the curtains for the nursery, a time-saving device is to glue the designs in place very carefully and daintily. The effect is very pleasing and may be changed when monotonous.

Coconut Macaroons—Mix 1 1/2 cup cocoanut with 1-3 cup condensed milk and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Beat white of one egg until stiff, add to mixture and shape into small cakes. Bake fifteen minutes in a moderate oven.

A French idea is to tie together a little bunch of sage, thyme, mint and parsley, dip it into water and then in salt and pepper and put it into the inside of the carcass of a chicken. Let it remain until the cooking is finished.

To truss a bird, force the legs back against the body, then tie a string across the bird's body, holding legs down. Set wings firmly against the breast by sticking a wooden skewer through the joint and into body part of carcass.

To make a "different" salad dressing, rub ten or twelve mint leaves in your fingers, bruising them, then soak in four tablespoonfuls of vinegar for an hour. Then drain off vinegar and use this vinegar in making the ordinary salad dressing.

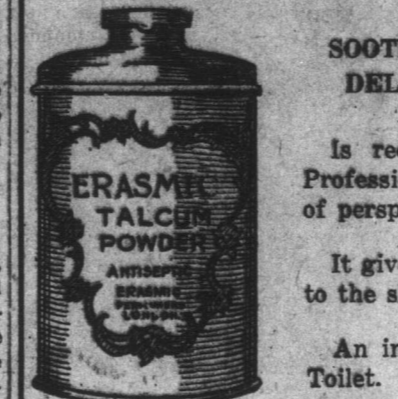

SIDE TALKS.

A HARD THING TO DO.

Is there anyone in all your list of acquaintances who you feel sure does not like you and yet whom you like, or at least respect and admire?

It seems to me that every such person whom you can point to is a star in the crown of self conquest.

Like People With Good Judgment.

It is a very easy thing to like anyone who likes you. (Do not even the publicans the same?) Nothing is a better recommendation to liking, neither wit, nor character, nor position, nor talent, nor a sweet disposition—than the fact that some person has shown the good judgment to like you.

"We are thankful for good will rather than service," says the cynical Hazlitt, "and those who esteem us or evidence a partiality for us are best friends."

And again "True friendship is self love at second hand where, as in a flattering mirror, we may see our virtues magnified and our errors softened, and where we may fancy our opinion of ourselves confirmed by an impartial or faithful witness."

Why so strong is this feeling that we extend it even to those counterfeits in friendship, flatters and sycophants, our self love rather than our self interest is the master key to our affections.

Your First Reaction!

If you doubt this, notice next time someone whom you have considered your friend and felt sure admires you shows signs of disapproving of you and see what your reaction is. See if you aren't inclined to wonder if you haven't overrated him or her, given him credit for better judgment than he really possesses?

To like a person who plainly does

not understand or appreciate oneself is an achievement in character. It means that one has been able to disentangle one's emotions and one's opinions. And anyone who can do that has passed an important milestone on the road of self conquest.

"I Can See What He Dislikes in Me."

It means also that one has achieved a certain height of tolerance. One says in effect either "This person has not had a chance to understand me, if he did he would feel differently," or "my good points are not the kind that appeal to him, but that does not prevent his being a perfectly good person" or even, "I can see what he dislikes about me. I don't blame him."

Of course it is not likely that there will be any great warmth in one's feelings toward such a person. But that is expecting too much of human nature. If we can keep ourselves from disliking one such person that's something. If we can approve and admire, that's something more; and if we can feel even a lukewarm liking, that's considerable. Maybe in our next stage of existence we shall be able to really love people who dislike us. And yet if it is an advanced stage who is going to do the disliking? Rather a poser, isn't it?

Household Notes.

To prepare salt fish for cooking, soak for twenty-four hours, changing the water several times. Place the fish, meat side down, in the water, with a rack beneath to prevent sinking to the bottom of the pan.

To clean small rugs, place right side down on dry grass or snow, beat with a flat carpet sweeper, sweep, turn over and sweep on right side. The rugs will last longer if they are cleaned in this way instead of hanging them on the line or shaking them by the corners.

Russians Gone Money Mad.

MILLIONS WORTH ONLY CENTS.

Moscow, (Associated Press).—Russia is money mad. Almost everybody from the humblest communist to the erstwhile aristocrat is thinking, dreaming, talking of money. Public events, life, death, all else go by the board. As the ruble drops dizzily, week by week, people cease to talk or do business in millions, as a few months ago. Now everyone of money consequence is not a millionaire but a billionaire and soon they will be trillionaires. A million rubles lately has been equivalent to \$2, a billion to \$2,000. Speculation has reached such pitch that the cabinet speculates on his fare. To one, he charges 50,000 rubles for a ride and to another 100,000 or 200,000, according to his wit. The man, woman or child who doesn't get rich in Russia to-day must be a fool, indeed. One has but to buy any article, a pair of shoes, a Persian rug, a lamp, a watch, a ring, a half dozen yards of cloth and hold it for a few days and sell it for twice the cost.

WOMEN SPECULATORS.

Women speculate shrewdly and shrewder than all others are former courtesans and princesses. Since the Government turned the real estate over to its occupants, the rent of apartments and rooms here has jumped from zero to large sums. The right to occupy a mere room, if the owner wishes to sell out, runs from 10,000-000 to 50,000,000 rubles and apartments 50,000,000 to 200,000,000. Legally, newcomers are required to pay nothing, but in order to obtain what they want, they must secretly subsidize the Soviet house committee. There is speculation in cloth. Most of the good cloth now in Russia is smuggled in. A little money is paid here, there, everywhere, and the cloth gets in. Then speculation takes place in its distribution. In the south of Russia cloth is cheap, hence it must be transported to the center or north, where two or three times its cost may be obtained. If sent to Siberia, the profit is immense. Speculation in food is the biggest affair. An official who controls a private car makes millions moving flour, fruit, and wine to the centers of high prices.

CHITCHERIN, THE MAN WHO SCARCELY SLEEPS.

Moscow, (Associated Press).—The fact that the human machine requires sleep is one of life's tragedies to Geo. V. Chitcherin, the Soviet Foreign Affairs Minister. Sleep is also a tragedy to those who have to do business with him. The best hour to have an interview with Chitcherin is between midnight and 8 a.m. The only hours he devotes to rest are between 8 a.m., and noon. The remainder he spends in work, with short 15-minute to half-hour rest intervals, when he goes to his bachelor room, adjoining his office, and lies down possibly to sleep for a few minutes. His clerks have a hard time of it, as they cannot adjust their hours to his. They are permitted to work 24 hours at a stretch and then have liberty for two days. Chitcherin is always on the job, except for the four hours mentioned. He has stated that as he grows older he hopes to eliminate these sleeping hours. He looks well, is round-faced and but for red eyelids, shows no signs of his sleepless existence. Food is also a material difficulty with Chitcherin. He gets so absorbed in his work that he frequently forgets to eat and when reminded that he must, he takes but a few bits of bread and butter. Sometimes, he is indisposed and his doctor invariably finds that it is through lack of eating. When asked if he has eaten anything, Chitcherin is unable to remember.

Vienna's Housing Problem.

STATE TAXING RENTS.

Vienna, (Associated Press).—The state of Vienna is attempting to solve the housing problem by putting a heavy tax on rents from which it hopes to collect 1,500,000,000 kronen a year, which sum is to be used to construct dwellings to be rented without profit. The state government is strongly Social Democratic and opponents of the measure, who are chiefly property owners, denounce it as socialization of housing. The tax is made payable by the tenant. The lowest tax rate would be 100 percent on a rent amounting to 3,000 kronen a year and it would increase until on a surtax basis the maximum tax would be 1,000 per cent. of the rent paid by the tenant. Rents are now limited by law and it is claimed that private investors would have to get 600 times the legal rate of rent in order to make it profitable for them to build homes.

Brazilian Centenary Exhibition.

PROFAGANDA STAMPS.

Mr. H. F. Shortis has received a set of interesting propaganda stamps issued by the Brazilian Government to advertise the National Exhibition, which will be held on September 7th. The stamps were forwarded by Mr. J. Fenelon, Vice-Consul for Brazil. The stamps consist of twenty different designs. With one exception they are printed in three colors. The borders are in green and yellow, and the centres in brick red. The one exception is that which has as its design, a map of South America. In this case, the sea is blue and the map is printed in various colors. All the stamps bear the date "7 September" at the top and in some part of the design, in blue "1922-1922." All the inscriptions are in French. Sixteen of the stamps depict beauty spots of Rio, "La plus belle ville du monde." One, the map, is labelled "Le plus riche pays du monde." Of the remaining three, two bear portraits of Jose Bonifacio de Andrada de Silva, the father of independence. The last is a portrait of the present President, Dr. Epitacio Pessoa. The stamps are very interesting and should be an excellent advertisement for the Exhibition. Mr. Fenelon, in his covering letter, said that he had forwarded Mr. Shortis' article in Friday's Telegram to the director of the exhibition at Rio. He congratulates Mr. Shortis on his excellent article.

A Great French Statesman.

The Soul of the National resistance against Germany in 1870, Leon Gambetta, was born at Cahors, April 2, 1838. His birthday anniversary thus falling today a day later than that of his illustrious ancestor, the Emperor, he first came into notice as an extreme Republican, but when that Empire fell, after Sedan, his influence contributed much towards averting a National upheaval. His thoughts, in fact, were centred upon expelling the invader, and he became chief director of the "People's" war from the day of escape from Paris, in October, 1870, by balloon. Nor was it any fault of his that the efforts of his country, with its capital encircled, and all the Northern departments occupied, were destined to fail. When the end visibly approached, and his colleagues entered upon peace negotiations, he resigned his functions, but the confidence felt in him resulted in his election to the Assembly by nine departments. As was necessarily to have been expected from the circumstances of the times, the remainder of his career partook of anti-climax; but his struggle against clericalism and Marshal MacMahon in 1876 showed that his fire was unquenched. It


