But the knockout blow that finished "Tut" Jackson was delivered to none of these points. It was a "kidney blow," a blow which crashed into the fighter's back! These kidney blows, these smashes when going into a clinch that beat away at the back of an opponent, are a recognized part of boxing, and are regarded as an absolutely fair part of the game-when fairly delivered. They have been used before, thousands of times, but never before has a fighter been knocked unconscious by such a blow.

"My favorite starting point is the ribs on the left side over the heart, which is easy to get at with a right hand punch. Or if I find it handier to use the left I get him somewhere along the edge of the ribs and perhaps on the solar plexus.

Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, said: "Dempsey is ready to fight at any time and place. The only stipulation is that the permission of the authorities be obtained and that we are guaranteed from interference." It looked as if the fight would take place this year. 





### Resumption of Anglo-American Cable Letter and Week-End Letter Services.

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The Anglo-American Telegraph Co. announces the eek-End Letter Services to Great Britain and Ireland. Cable Letters may be filed at any time and are delivered the following day. Week-End Letters may be filed at any time prior to midnight on Saturday and are delivered on Monday morning.

The rate for a Cable Letter to London and Liverpool is one-third the regular cable rate, and the rate for a Week-End letter one-quarter of the regular cable rate in each case with a minimum of twenty words in

rate, in each case with a minimum of twenty words including the necessary prefix placed before the address to indicate the class of service. To places in the United Kingdom other than London and Liverpool there is an added charge of two cents per word in both lasses of service to cover the landline transmission or

Both forms of service are designed for plain language business and social communications which do not require instantaneous transmission but are still of sufficient urgency that they should not be subjected to the delay incident to the carriage by trans-ocean mail. Each has its own peculiar field of usefulness, the Cable Letter serving for such correspondence as is not of immediate urgency but should still be disposed of within a day or two and the Week-End Letter for communications of perhaps still less urgency but nevertheless sufficiently important to require their transmittal in quicker time than can be done by the overseas mail. Thus each in its own way supplies a distinct convenience of which the cable using public will no doubt be quick to take advantage.
