Mr. Stevenson favoured the proposal of the Committee. They had duly considered the matter and were of opinion that the course recommended was the best, both for the recipients of the Town's charity and for the interests of the Town's charity and for the interests of the Town.

Mr. Robertson adverted to the growing expense for relief. He referred to the offer of a Poor Honse made to the Townsome years ago by Mr. Elliott, and said that at that time the expense of aiding the poor was only \$700, and the calculation made then by the Council was that to maintain indigent persons in a house, such as that offered by Mr. Elliott, would cost \$1,500. That was the reason why the Council did not at that time accept Mr. Elliott's offer.

Mr. Bell moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Howard, that the report be referred back to the committee with power to make suitable arrangements with the ladies of St. Joseph's Hospital, or elisewhere, for the maintenance of the said committee. The amendment was carried.


