DRILL PAY FOR CITY CORPS

"I THINK WE WILL BE ABLE TO FIX IT," SAYS MR. FOSTER.

Military Men Wait Upon the Government -The Drill Pay Looked Upon As Assured -Kearl Militia to Go Into Annual Camp -Meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association.

Ottawa, May 8.-An invading army of military men held possession of the Parliament Buildings all day. Theirs, however, was a peaceful mission. In the morning the annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association was held, and in the afternoon an important conference took place with the Government in regard to the drill of the city corps, and although no definite announcement had been made, the impression was general that as the Militia appropriation has been cut down by a quarter of a million dollars the city battalions would suffer. As a result of the very strong representations which were made this afternoon, it is almost certain that the drill pay for the city regiments will be forthcoming. Foster's speech evoked a warm interest in the welfare of the militia, and his expression of opinion that he would see all the regiments drilled annually and less spent on the permanent corps evoked tremendous applause.

The deputation was introduced by Major Hagies. Those who spoke were: Col. Denison, Col. M. Gibson, Col. Massey, Major Dabson, Col. Prior, M.P., Col. Henshaw, Major Delamare, Col. Stacey, Major Bruce, Major Brown, Royal Grenadiers, Toronto; Major MacDonald, 48th Highlanders; Major Markham, 10th; Major Sutherland, M.P., Col. Burland and others.

Where the Drill Money Goes. The deputation strongly urged that the following be drilled this year, and mentioned among the reasons therefor the following points: That the city corps find their drill for the purpose of providing for annual review, also to purchase helmets, leggings, pay drill instructors, support regimental bands, pay an adjutant, fitting of uniforms, cost of armories, purchase of uniforms for men over the authorized number and other expenses of purely military character. For this year these expenses have already been largely incurred and it was claimed that it would be a serious blow to the efficiency of the force under these circumstances to have the annual drill pay withheld. It was pointed out also that in addition to the amount for the drill pay the officers' pay and men contribute largely out of their own pockets towards the objects named.

Two Much Spent on the Permanent Corps. Hon. Mr. Foster, in reply, said that no one sympathized more than he with the active militia. He did not pretend to be an expert in anything pertaining to the mysteries of the force, but he had given some attention to the subject generally, and had come to the conclusion that the larger part of the money which Canada should bestow on her military force should be on the active militia. He had conceived the idea that too much money was being spent upon the permanent corps, while the active militia were neglected. He sympathized with the sacrifices which the militia had made. He knew something of their work, and he knew that with what loyalty and fidelity the officers had endeavored to keep up their corps. With regard to the money spent for drill of city battalions, he must confess that he did not quite understand the modus operandi. He supposed that every dollar spent for drill, say in 1894-95, was voted for 1894-95. Did he rightly understand that the money was not to be carried over to 1895-96? Major Hagies: The money is paid, but the drill is done in advance.

Hon. Mr. Foster continued to speak with reference to the rural militia, which were to be drilled this year. The Government had had any other bill on that point, and a supplementary vote would be brought down to provide for them. (Applause.) With regard to the reduction in the militia appropriation for next year, he thought it was impossible to make the money larger than it is, but it might be possible to effect some economies in other parts of the militia service, whereby a portion of the appropriation could be devoted to paying the city corps. (Hear, hear.) For his part, he sympathized very much with all that the gentleman had said as to the force in Canada. Anything he could do, in conjunction with Mr. Dickey, to make more money for the militia, he would be glad to do. (Applause.)

Will Be Able to Fix It. Col. Denison called attention to the fact that the money for the purchase of rifles, which might be devoted to paying the city corps. Col. Tisdale said that if the Government carried out that suggestion, they could count upon the party support of the House.

Hon. Mr. Dickey said he had listened to the representations and had been made with a great deal of pleasure, and as far as his power he was willing to meet whatever the deputation in every way. (Cheers.) The discussion closed with the significant observation from Mr. Foster, "I think we will be able to fix it between us. This remark elicited a chorus of gratified "hear, hear."

Dominion Rifle Association. Hon. Lieutenant-Colonel Gibson, president of the Dominion Rifle Association, presided at the annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association, held at the Hotel Windsor, Toronto, on Monday evening, May 7. His Excellency the Governor-General, the new Minister of Militia, Hon. A. B. Dickey, besides a number of members of Parliament, were present.

The chairman moved the adoption of the annual report. After referring to the financial condition of the association, Lieut.-Col. Gibson said the negotiations were now in progress for the purchase of a new rifle range at Rockliffe, near Ottawa.

Referring to the Bisley team of 1894, Lieut.-Col. Gibson said that it made a splendid record. In the connection he paid a high tribute to Major E. B. Dickey, who had been in command of the team.

Continued for a few days, but cancelled his arrangements owing to wet weather. Mr. Costigan's bill respecting the encouragement of shipping is to confer upon fishery officers the same powers as justices of peace in the matter of bounties for shipbuilding which they have with regard to fishery matters. Mr. Costigan will call attention to the proposed construction of a ship channel from Chicago to the Mississippi and consequent diversion of water, amounting to one-fifth that which passes over Niagara Falls, since consequent lowering of the level of the lakes, and ask if the Government proposes to protect the interests of the Dominion.

The prominence which the World has given to the present slow Canadian mail service will likely lead to a speedy re-arrangement of the electric telegraph contracts with the Dominion Line. Mr. Costigan will interrogate the Government respecting the election of a third member from the subject to-day and likely pressure will be brought to bear upon the Government to amend the Franchise Act so as to legalize the vote of the third member. The third bill amends the Civil Service Act on the lines of Mr. Foster's proposition. It is a bill which will give to class clerks and substitute therefor writers temporarily employed.

The Government is about to take for the collection of revenue in the Yukon country is already having a beneficial effect, as the Alaska Commercial Company has entered into contracts with Victoria merchants for supplying gas to the value of \$200,000. These supplies have hitherto been purchased in the United States.
