





THE POLICE MUST BE CAREFUL.

Court of Appeal Renders a Decision in Favor of the Kellys and Against Sergt.

Barton and Inspector Archibald.
Osgoode Hall, Nov. 28, 1895.
In Kelly v. Sergeant Barton and Inspector Archabold, the Court of Appeal unanimously affirmed the judgment of the Chancery Divisional Court directing a new trial and dismissed the defendants' appeals with costs. The judgment against the city was delivered by Chief Justice Hagarty in the following words:

"We all agree that this appeal must be rdismissed. The action of the constables and the Mayor's order (through which the Kelly family were arrested) was wholly unauthorized; it was armost a mere police regulation which prevented Kelly from driving without a license and would have been amply satisfied by the issue of a summons. This is the extremet of extreme cases and, in my experience, is without a parallel. The plaintiffs Kelly were arrested without a warrant for the breach of a regulation of the police commissioners. The action was one of trespass, and no notice of it was incessary.

"I wish." continued the Chief Justice, of Ontario, "some representation could be made to the city to induce them to prevent the wholesale waste of costs occasioned by the conduct of some of the police officers, who seem to thing that any breach of any municipal regulation justifies an arrest. This is not the only case of the kind we have had before us, and as ratepayers we cannot too strongly deprecate the course which is apparently considered proper. The appeal is dismissed."
