BUSINESS TACTICS-II.

NDER this heading we have already referred to Diligence, and we now come to the second point on which we wish to speak, viz., Self-dependence in Business. Without this,—we have no hesitation in saying it,-no man should be doing business on his own account. The child may have the strength of limb to walk; but just let him attempt it before he has gained the necessary confidence, and the result is as certain as he tries it, he has scarcely commenced ere he becomes unbalanced and falls. This is a homely illustration of what we mean; but homely though it be, we have no scruple in calling it into requisition, as it suits our purpose. As it is with the child, so it is with the man of business,-self-dependence, or confidence, is absolutely necessary if he would carry on trade successfully.

The evils arising from the lack of this quality are numerous and extensive. Without it there can be no promptness of action, and this is a daily requirement in every business; it matters not whether we refer it to the buying or selling of goods with a fluctuating market, the following up a doubtful debtor with the best means of collecting the debt, or the arrangement of matters with clerks and servants of all kinds. It is at once inconvenient and dangerous when delay takes place that some friend may be consulted, or the advice of some one "more experienced" received. Hence we believe that the losses made by the self-dependent business man at his start are less than those made by him who, from being necessitated, by his want of confidence in himself, to apply to others, forfeits that promptitude which is absolutely necessary in the majority of transactions: besides, while the one is becoming more and more unfit for his position, the other is advancing in the right direction, and is becoming better qualified every day to take his place as a smart business man. In trade as in everything else, experience is the best teacher; and while advice is very good, it is only so when kept in its proper place, and used as an aid to one's own judgment, not admitted as a substitute for it. Did the want of selfconfidence possess no other disadvantage than the giving other people an insight into one's business, this were sufficient to show that the possession of that quality is necessary for the merchant; but when we consider the danger of our opponent's being posted as to his operations, it is at once seen that it is indispensable. We might cite numerous instances to make good our position here, but we look upon our proposition as so self-evident that we forbear.

The next point we would touch on is one which might be thought, at first sight, to be too trivial to be noticed here; but which, on reflection, turns out to be more important, and to wield a greater influence on a business than our first impressions would indicate.

Manufactories on Lachine Canal.

We refer to Courtesy in Business. Some men sell you as if you were obliged to buy from them, and as if their till were the only receptacle for your cash; while others take the opposite extreme, and would almost give you the idea that the existence of their business depended on your buying from them. Nor are two different courses only, or always, adopted by two different individuals, but we occasionally find them made use of by the same party at different stages of his business,—the last mentioned at his starting, and the first when success seems to be certain. But we mark them both as "extremes," which are "dangerous," and would consider either bad policy. We believe a happy medium is the business man's true course, and do so advisedly. "Civility is cheap," and it yields a handsome return. For the want of it, many establishments have had to put up their shutters; while younger houses starting with the proper idea, -that they had to serve the public, -have taken the wind out of the sails" of their seniors.

Even when money is most plentiful,—but especially when it is scarce,—it will command competition; and he who possesses it will spend it where he can do so most pleasantly, while at the same time as profitably as elsewhere. It is a fact that our moneyed men, who have become wealthy in business, are noted for their courtesy; the reasons being found in the fact that the same motto which carried them successfully through business, is still adhered to after they have retired from it.

A Very Bad Precedent.

The Montreal Telegraph of Monday published a list of the creditors of Mr. John Dougall, with the amounts of their several claims attached. We consider this a very bad precedent for a public journalist to establish, and we sincerely hope it may not be followed by any other paper in the Province. If this course were generally adopted during such times as we are just emerging from, there can be little doubt of its resulting in a general trade crisis. Apart from a consideration of the effect which it would have upon the public morals, or upon the feelings of the unfortunate men who cannot pay their debts, we regard such a course as a grievous wrong to creditors. If every loss sustained by merchants, in bad times, was chronicled in the newspapers, confidence would be completely destroyed, and many of our business men would be seriously embarrassed, if not brought to the ground. Most men find it difficult enough to obtain discounts as it is, during tight times; but fancy what it would be under such a regime as has been inaugurated by the Telegraph, when a man might figure in the public prints as a creditor, under the Insolvency Act, to one-fourth his entire capital, which would, of course, have the effect of ruining his credit, and that at a time when accommodation was most required, and most difficult to obtain.

Bank Dividends.

The transfer books of the Bank of Montreal, Ontario Bank, and La Banque Jacques Cartier, will be closed from the 16th to the 81st inst.

WOOLLEN MANUFACTURES.

T is impossible to feel indifferent regarding the success of our manufactures, since agriculture alone, according to political economists, forms too parrow a basis upon which to build up a great and wealthy By purchasing in a foreign market what may to made in the country to advantage, is plainly a ruinous policy. Our trade has hitherto been of that character. We send abroad for goods which cost shout ten per cent, to lay down here, and we pay for our imports by the rude bulky produce of the land which is expensive to move at all, but which expense is very greatly enhanced by a distance of thousands of miles carriage. The cost, it must be remembered, of laying it down in the foreign market comes off the producer. To speak plainly, the difference in price letween a bushel of Wheat or barrel of Flour in this market and the price it rates at in England, is from thirty to fifty per cent.; and the ability of Canada to pay her purchases is lessened to that extent. Under the present circumstances, and pursuing the present policy, the Largain is against us to the extent of at least fifty per cent, in the value of the produce we export.

It would undoubtedly be anwise in this country pretending to manufacture many of the goods that are imported but on the other hand it is clearly an impoverishing policy to purchase what this country affords every facility to manufacture upon our own seil As it is with the farmer, the more of the bulky produce he can consume or manufacture into beef. pork mutton, wool, eggs, butter, &c., the more is he enriching his land, and if he could go wen further, and make his leather and cloth, without infringing upon the law of the division of labour, he would thereby contribute even more to increase his own wealth and the value of his farm. Just so it is with a true national economy, the more that can be made in the country-the more of the bulky raw produce of the ground that can be condensed and manufactured into useful and valuable commodities, such as we are now importing, the more will we undoubtedly be increasing the wealth of the country, provided we do not infringe upon the law of the division of labour by attempting to make what could be both better and cheaper supplied from elsowhere. And to carry out such an economy, it would not require so much protection as one might at first imagine. The nearer we approach to a free trade policy, the better it would be for the country at large. Every locality has its peculiar advantages in climate, soil, water-power, &c., and the people or nations so situated have but to turn their favourable circumstances to advantage, to the exclusion of similar productions brought from a distance. In fact it is not unreasonable to affirm that freight and insurance alone ought of themselves to afford a sufficient protection to any industrious community manufacturing what their peculiar advantages enable them to do. Were such conditions faithfully observed, neither time nor labour would be thrown away, and something like a harmonious result might be educed.

In illustration of these principles we have only to refer to our Woollen manufactures, and particularly to coarse Cloths and Tweeds. Not many years ago there was not a single set of machinery in the country, and we were of course dependent upon the British market for the supply of the commonest cloths Now, however, it is different, a large number of mills containing from 2 to 6 set of machinery each are now at work in the manufacture of Tweeds, Blankets, Flannels, &c At a rough calculation we might safely ay that fully a million and a half yards of Tweeds are annually turned out at a value of over a million dol-The manufacture of Tweeds has been gone into with great spirit, and the result so far is a success. It in colour Canadian goods are slightly inferior to British dyes,-and we do not see how such should be the case,-the styles and patterns are at least equal, and the fabric decidedly superior, for the same money, to any imported. Canada manufactured Tweeds are fast excluding foreign goods from the market, as the wearer begins to learn that he is getting better value for his money. And it must be remembered that this result has been attained not altogether by protection, since our manufacturers are, after all, but nominally protected by the high tariff. Under the Reciprocity Treaty there is free trade in Wool; but in consequence of the high duty upon Wool entering the United States from other countries, the American manufacturer is enabled to pay a higher price for that staple in this market than he would otherwise do. The American tariff is 10 cents per lb, and 10 per cent, ad. val. so that the Canadian manufacturer pays at present 43 cents a pound for what, under other circumstances, he would be getting for 30 cents. And although the country, that is the farmer, reaps the benefit, it novertheless tells to that extent against the manufacturer, and reduces very much the protection which the tariff is supposed to afford. Another disadvantage is the limited extent of the market. In fact we are assured that if we had, out and out, free trade, the Canadian Woollon manufacturer could compete in quality and price with any goods that could be brought into the market of an equal quality of Wool. It is true that in regard to the finer fabrics since the productions of the finer qualities of this staple in this country is limited, England would have the advantage, inasmuch as the freight of imported Wool would, in consequence of dirt and refuse, amount to double the freight of the manufactured goods.

It is gratifying to know that this branch is so little dependent upon a protective policy; and there can be little doubt the same energy and capital employed in other branches of industry would be followed by an equal success.

FISH INSPECTION.

THE Fish trade is becoming a very important part of the business of Montreal. With proper regulations it would probably assume oven larger proportions than hitherto. Under a proper system of inspection consignments could be disposed of to the greater estisfaction both of the shipper and the consignee, and with fower disputes between the wholesale merchant and his country customer.

The average annual value of the fish brought to market here may be estimated at about \$316,000. There are about \$40,000 barrels of Herrings, 20,000 barrels of Green Cod, 3,500 of Salmon, and probably 10,000 cwt. of loose Cod, besides small quantities of other fish not necessary to enumerate. In our estimate of value and quantity we have purposely kept rather under than over the mark, but we believe that both are fair statements, and will show the importance of the trade.

At present there is no inspection, and the consequence is that a loss is sustained by the fisherman and by the merchant at the fishing station; there is no inducement for careful packing, so that the character of the Provincial cured fish suffers, no benefitarises to the merchant, and the consumer receives often an article inferior to what he has bargained for, and suffers loss. Now, while inspection would not, perhaps, do away with all the evils existing in this trade, we yet believe that it would, to a very great extent, relieve them. The loss sustained by the fisherman, arising from there being no inspection, is due to the fact that one price is given on the coast for all fish, whatever their quality. No encouragement is, therefore, held out for careful selection and packing. The price is, therefore, regulated by the lowest quality brought in. Nor is the merchant there very much to be blamed for this, although he certainly might exercise a little more judgment than he does, seeing the loss he so often sustains by tish turning out worse than he expected. But were the parties on the coast, both fishermen and merchants, to know that there was a rigid inspection here, the one would take care in packing and the other in dividing, the catches of the respective dishermen, so that full justice would be done to all. At present the process of selling is something like this. When the vessel arrives a number of barrels are landed and opened. It may happen that the best barrels may be stowed in such a way that they will be certainly landed first, and the purchaser, trusting to them as a fair sample of the whole cargo, will, probably, give a larger price than the average of the whole cargo would warrant. He is therefore disappointed, and consequently disputes a rise. Others may be stowed just as they come to hand, and a lower quality be landed than really represents the worth of the cargo. But the result of the whole business is that one year with another a loss is sustained, and tho agent here for the shippers is unjustly accused of sacrificing his principal. Then, tracing the transaction to its conclusion, we find that the wholesale dealer who executes his country orders is accused of making falso representations to the consumer, while, in fact, he merely supplies what he has bought in good faith, and sent on to his customer without having had an opportunity of examining. The consumer, finding it to be a mero lottery, and that he more frequently gets bad than good fish, does not care to buy, and so the trade is restricted.

It is not our intention to discuss the policy of inspection. That principle has been affirmed, and is now being carried into operation in many important articles of consumption with the very best effects. The question is rather, in what place should this inspection be conducted? To this we unhesitatingly answer, in Montreal. Even if inspected on the coast there are many chances that if packed in good order much damage might be sustained before the fish reached a market. Then as to the limited time in which the inspection could be made; herrings, for instance, being all brought to market in about a month, we see no great difficulty, were a compotent Inspector appointed, with a deputy at Quebec, and a proper staff or men at each place. The whole business could be done within the time.

As to the effect upon the trade of the port, as to which some people express doubts, we confess we think it would be beneficial. At first, it is true, some of the fishermen would be averse to send fish to a port at which they would be inspected, but consumers would prefer coming to where they would be sure of getting a good article, and would in all cases rather pay a little higher price if they had the certainty of knowing they were getting a quality on which they could depend. The better qualities would be sent here where they would meet with fair play, and only the Inferior fish would, as a general rule, go to markets where there was no distinction between good, had, or indifferent.

THE COLONIAL EMPIRE OF GREAT BRITAIN.

THE Colonial Empire of Great Britain is divided by the financial and commedial authorities of the Imperial Bureaux into m. geographical parts:—1st, the North American Colonies: 2nd, the Australian possessions; 3rd, the South African Settlements; 4th, the Mediterranean Fortresses; 5th, the Islands in the North and South Atlantic; 6th, the West Indies; 7th, the Eastern dependencies; 8th, the West coast of Africa; 9th, India. The Board of Trade, which is a separate branch of the Civil Service in England, has lately been collecting statistics from all these ports of the Empire, and we have before us the results of the investigation for 1863. They are as follows:—

These united possessions extend over an area of 4,317,000 square miles, upon which dwells a population of 152,775,000 persons owning allegiance to the sway of Her Majesty. The grand total of their imports and exports, given above, and adding £500,000 for gold from British Columbia not therein contained, amounted in 1863 to no less than \$1,121,323,800, of which \$469,433,800 was direct trade with the mother country, and a great proportion of the balance indirect trade with British ports. The tonnage of shipping employed in this vast trade was 22,000,000, of which 7,000,000 was British. The debt accumulated by the mother country, owing to wars, rebellions, public works, harhours, railroads, and other exigencies of such a vast Empire, is stated at £142,701,000 or \$694,478,200. With the exception of Victoria, and, of course, India, Canada is the colony which has the greatest import and export trade, revenue and expenditure.

seven per cent. on its capital, it follows that \$85,792 was sent out of the country, and \$194,208 retained in the hands of its Canadian shareholders.

BANK OF UPPER CANADA.

We are convinced that our readers will sit down with us to the examination of the shareholders' list of the Bank of Upper Canada with more than ordinary interest; for the position of no Bank has been more canvassed of late, and none has had a more eventful history. So intimately, moreover, has this Bank been identified with the progress of Canada and with the operations of the Provincial Government, that even those who own no shares feel a sort of personal interest in it.

Since the passage of the Act reducing the nominal amount of its capital, the Bank of Upper Canada boasts of but \$4,000,000 of authorized capital, and, according to the return under investigation, it owned on the 3rd March last:

The details, as given in the statement, however, sum up to 64,727 shares, equal to \$1,934,672 paid in; so that the Bank or the transcriber is in error to the amount of 8 shares, equal to \$148,-a mere bagatelle. It appears that there are 1,070 different shareholders, each of whom thus owns a nominal average capital of \$1,808; very much less than the Banks previously noticed.

The residences of the shareholders are not marked with suffi nt diearness: it is, therefore, possible that some shares, set down Canadian, may really be held in England.

In view of the depreciation in the market value of the stock of this Bank, it becomes particularly interesting not only to know who are the chief stockholders. but also to observe whether they and other people likely to know the true state of the Bank's affairs are buying in or selling out. For this purpose we have procured one of the lists published in 1861, and are thus enabled to make our tables comparative. Carrying out our plan of giving the names of all stockholders owning \$20,000 worth of stock (nominal), or, in this case, 666 shares, we have the annexed statement:

The list, since the reduction of the share from \$50 to \$30, is but small, yet it should give some confidence to the holders of stock. Mr. Burstall of Quebec is a man who has means of knowing the prospects of the Bank; so, surely, has the City and District Savings Bank, with whose management Mr. Simpson and Mr. Starnes are, we believe, connected; and so certainly has Mr. Street, himself the President of a Bank which has successfully emerged from an ordeal like that through which the Bank of Upper Canada is now passing. Mr. Cassels, the new Manager of the Bank, of course holds a number of shares as trustee, but he also owns 70 in his own name, bought since 1861. To carry out our idea a little further, we proceed to give a few other names of leading shareholders:

The inference appears to follow from the above facts that the persons who have been selling are not the large capitalists, but the small holders, whose fears have got the better of their judgment. The estate of Mr. Heath (late of Rednall, Staffordshire, England), which has reduced its shares, has done so in pursuance of a policy now being carried out with reference to other Canadian bank-stock held by that gentleman, and not from any greater distrust of B. U. C. shares than of shares in the other Banks of the Province. When the Glyns, the Bosanquets, the Gzowskis, and the Streets hold or buy in, the shareholders at large ought, we think, to avoid sacrificing their property.

We calculate that the Bank of Upper Canada, which divided 6 per cent., sent \$31,800 away to foreign parts last year; returning to its Canadian shareholders

QUEBEC BANK.

The Quebec Bank next comes under review. Here we find there are 487 shareholders, owning \$1,462,400 of paid-up capital, or, on an average, \$3,847 each. The distribution of the shares is:

URING the past week business has been steady, and considerable later of the con considerable lots of Teas and Sugars have changed hands, although we cannot report a marked increase in activity of the market for General Groceries. The spring fleet is now rapidly arriving in our harbour, and the shipments of foreign and English groceries will soon thoroughly sort up stocks. Importations this spring, we advisedly state, will be light, and we do not anticipate any excess of stocks in the various staples of the Trade; this circumstance will tend to make prices firm, and enable importers to realize a paying profit. The excess of some classes of goods in the market, and the general indisposition of jobbers to hold large stocks during the season past, caused a pressure upon the market, with a desire to realize, even at prices without profit to the seller, and frequently at a loss. We do not look forward to a heavy business this spring, but with imports not in excess of requirements, a good healthy trade may be anticipated.

TEAS.—The market has been pretty well cleared of all fine and green teas in bond, for the New York market (which still shows activity), leaving this grade of Teas in very limited supply. Holders are stiffer in their views, and lines of fine Young Hysons purchased a fortnight ago, could not be duplicated at old figures, further arrivals of Teas in English order of low and medium grades Young Hyson, enable us to report the market amply supplied for present wants. Uncoloured Japans are in fair demand for home consumption, and the market is liberally supplied. Coloured Japans of really desirable styles and quality, with fragrance, are scarce. The lower grades of this class of Tea, are in fair supply, and demand limited. Blacks in moderate demand, and stocks ample for requirements. We hear of a purchase by a city house, of 500 hf-chests of Green Teas, the property of a Halifax firm; prices have not transpired.

Our China advices, dated Shanghai, March 8th, report a moderate business doing in Green Teas. At the declined rates mentioned in our last issue 9.500 pkgs Moyune and Fychow have been settled; common Fychow kinds at from tls. 221 to tls. 26 being more in demand than the other classes. Fine Movunes are evidently in short supply, and buyers are endeavouring to secure the best chops on offer at current rates. American buyers have commenced to offer, but to date of our advices had made but few settlements. It was expected, however, that within the fortnight, a good business would be done for that market, and it was assumed that so soon as it was known that the Americans were in the market, prices would stiffen. The stock on the market was 44,810 hf-chests, against 11,623 hf-chests at same period of last year. The total export from all China and Japan was then reported as 112,734,000 lbs., against 107,596,000 lbs. to same dates last year.

Our English advices, dated to 24th April, report the advance in Teas mentioned in our last, fully maintained; and Green Teas are firmer, with a considerable demand for export to New York and Canada. Japan Teas, both Coloured and Uncoloured, are in good demand for export, and rather improved prices obtained. Hysons are firm; Congous, the low and dusty kinds, now neglected. Black Leaf of Common to Fair qualities are firm. Sales in Good and Medium have been made to moderate extent at private rates, and in finest at 2s. 3d. per lb. Souchongs were neglected. United Kingdom stock was 119,496,800 lbs. against 106,500,000 lbs., same date last year. Amount then on the water, and not included in stock, was 19,056,100 lbs., against 22,610,000 lbs. at same time in 1864.

SUGARS.—Several lots of the new crop Sugars have been placed in the City during last week, and sales will probably foot up 400 hhds. Arrivals have been meagre, and stocks are still very light in first hands. To date, there is not much demand for Western Canada. We quote Cuba \$8.50 to \$9.00; Porto Rico \$9.00 to \$9.25. We notice an improvement in the English markets, and an advance of 1s. per cwt. Much firmness prevails with some speculative operations in anticipation of demand from America. A reported

sale of one cargo Cuba at 21s. per cwt. Stock held in London in excess of last year same time, was 20,250 tons. Stock in Liverpool, in excess of last year same time, 58,000 tons. Latest advices from Matanzas report the demand for Muscovados increasing; the market closing active at advanced quotations. Grocery Sugars are very scarce; quotations are for Muscovado Inferior to Common Refinery 51. to 61 reals. Fair to Good 6 to 61 reals. Fair to Good Grocery 7. to 71 reals.

COFFEE.—Stock light; very limited parcels have yet arrived in market; demand, however, is small, and with little enquiry we report the market dull-quotations are unchanged. We notice an advance in the London market of 1s to 1s 6d with increased demand for plantation sorts of Cevlon.

TOBACCO.-Dull, and the week closes with very meagre transactions to report on duty paid stock. Stocks of good sound tobaccos are becoming much curtailed, as moderate lots are daily going into consumption. The feature of the week exhibits a desire to push off all undesirable and doubtful lots at slightly easier rates. Several round parcels in bond have been placed at 14 to 14 c. Sales of about 250 Hhds. Upper Canada leaf at 3 to 33 cts.

Molasses.-Some shipments are in market, and we hear about 200 hhds. having been placed among City houses at 33c. Enquiry is limited to small parcels for mmediate requirements. We quote Muscovado at 35c. to 38c; claved, 31c to 34c.

RICE.-Not much demand for consumption. Stock is light in the market. Some 700 bags have been purchased to arrive for United States. We note an advance in England, and considerable enquiry for export

FRUIT.—Raisins.—Supply very much curtailed, and demand only for retail wants. Stocks are very light Currants dull.

SALT .- Some five cargoes have arrived at Quebec, and we report this article in full supply. The old stock, it is probable, will now require to be held over. We hear of one cargo having been sold in this market; at 851c in Quebec.

WINES AND LIQUORS.—A better demand has arisen for these goods, and considerable lots are going forward and in hand for execution, which have been awaiting opening of navigation. We hear of sales of about 70 Puns. High Wines at 804c. nett.

THE HARDWARE TRADE.

WITH opening of navigation much larger demand for heavy goods has taken for heavy goods has taken place than was anticipated; and in consequence, stocks which were left over from winter supply have found ready sale, at prices fully up to the rates of last fall and winter, and in many goods an advance has been freely given. At the present time stocks are not by any means well assorted, and many orders are only partially executed till new stocks come in. The only vessel so far discharged is the Shandon, from Glasgow, with Bar and Pig Iron. This has partially assorted the market in these articles. There are now several other vessels in port with general cargoes, which, when opened up, will fully complete stocks.

PIG IRON.—We alter our quotations of this article. The low rates quoted are caused by several lots just arrived, partly on ships' account and on consignment, which must be sold from ship's side, and of course are just now forced on the market. The moment these lots are sold, the price will again advance, as the advices from Glasgow of an advance of 4s. to 6s. stg. per ton will make regular holders keep up fully to the rates quoted last winter, and which are not higher than they should be with last Scotch quotations. Nearly all the Gartsherrie and some of other Brands have been secured on arrival for the Western States; for these rates as high as \$22 net cash have been paid. and there is still a demand as fast as freight can be found for Chicago and Milwaukie. This trade will give up freights to several of our large propellers for the whole season.

BAR IRON.—The late arrivals from Glasgow and Liverpool fully assorts up. Prices, in consequence of late advices of the stoppage of the Scotch Iron Works, are much firmer than they were, and all the holders are inclined to ask 6d. to ls. more, unless in very large We do not know of a single consignment of Bar this Spring, so that there will be no lots forced off as usual under cost.

HOOP AND BAND IRON.-In these there is no altcration, except that prices are very firm for all lots now in hand, as the importations will be very light. many orders not having been executed in consequence of the strike in England. We do not know of any lots of nail sheets to arrive as vet.

CUT NAILS AND SPIKES .- In these the makers have altered the list to \$4 for small lots, and to the trade the prices remain as before. The outside holders are now entirely sold out, and with exception of two or three in the trade, who are selling small lots (to induce purchases of other goods) at a trifle under our quotations, none can be got at lower rates, and it is not unlikely that a further advance will take place within the month, in consequence of the enhanced value of all material used in the manufacture, particularly Pig Iron and Coal, both of which are much higher than they were last year.

Tin.-There are several lots arrived and selling at our quotations, but one or two of the holders prefer retaining their stock in face of recent advices of an advance of Is. to 2s. stg. per box.

BOILER PLATES.-None have as yet arrived, consequently the market is only supplied with the thicker sizes. Some lots are expected next week.

BOILER TUBES.—None yet to hand. A lot to arrive has been all booked, and several lots could be at once disposed of to American buyers; prices in consequence are a trifle higher than last year, and orders for both these and Boiler Plates should be given in advance.

WINDOW GLASS.—Is still in full supply, and large ots can be had at 6d. under quotations, but for first quality prices are firm.

FREIGHTS on heavy goods are lower to the West this season than they have been. The competition between the Mail Line and the other Freight Lines has driven freights so low, that there is little chance of any profit out of it. The Railroads are also carrying at very low rates wherever they come in competion either with Steamers or with each other.

The arrivals from Ireland and Coastwise since this day week have been very insignificant; and from foreign ports we have only received 770 quarters Beans, 1,600 sacks and 1,850 barrels Flour. The exports in the same time comprise 6,317 quarters Wheat, 1,410 quarters Indian Corn, 1,729 sacks and 860 barrels Flour. In the absence of supplies, and with small farmers' deliveries, the fine weather has ceased to affect our market, and prices of all articles have of late-been tending strongly upwards, and appear likely to continue to do so for some time to come, particularly now that the approaching termination of the struggle in America has given such a stimulus to the cotton-spinning interest.

At to-day's Market there was a good inquiry for Wheat, but the high prices demanded by holders checked business, and we have only to report a moderate trade at 2d. to 3d. over the rates current on Tuesday last. Flour must be quoted 6d, per sack and barrel dearer, with more doing. Oats and Oatmeal, being scarce, brought more money, and a fair sale was experienced for each at our quotations. Beans and Pease ls. per quarter higher, and Barley improved 2d. to 3d. per 60 lbs. Indian Corn met a fair sale at 80s. for prime Danubian, being an advance of about 1s. per quarter on the week."

THE PRODUCE MARKET.

AVIGATION being now fairly begun, and several ocean vessels arrived at the wharves, there has been alittle more animation than of late. The stocks of most of our leading products have been gradually working down, and the Spring trade opens with unusually slender supplies of both Flour and Pork, so that, with limited receipts, the quantity on hand will be kept down, and instead of awaiting a demand, as has been the case in former years, arrivals will, unless they be materially in excess of what is at present calculated on, pass at once into consumption at remunerative prices, leaving little if any surplus to seek a foreign market. Receipts have been greatly below what has come forward in previous years at this season; and from all accounts the supply of Wheat in Canada will barely suffice for the requirements of the country till the next harvest is available. Advices from all parts concur in reporting the crop of Fall Wheat as very promising, and the weather as most favorable for getting in the Spring Wheat.

**FLOUR.—Arrivals have been small for the season, and with a steady demand for city use, and some enquiry for Quebee and Lower ports, as well as on speculation, prices have been well maintained. Several transactions in the higher grades may be noted atsome advance on former prices. Latest sales have been of superior Extra \$5.50 to \$5.65; Extra \$5.30 to \$5.35, and Fancy \$5.10 to \$5.124. Superfine has met a healthy demand, and all destrable parcels move freely at \$4.90 to \$5, strictly choice, especially broken parcels bringing some advance on these rates. Western wheat, have been less sought for in the absence of export enquiry, but their superior keeping properties make them desirable for holding, and some round lots have changed hands at \$4.80 to \$4.00. No. 2 and lower grades find ready sale at extreme rates. We quote No. 2 \$4.55 to \$4.70; Fine, \$4.80 to \$4.70; finding however that the general tone of the market improved, and that deficient supplies from abroad threw the demand almost w

\$2.75.

WHEAT.—A cargo of U. C. Spring has been sold to arrive, but at a price not permitted to transpire.

PORK.—The arrivals of Mess being considerably within the requirements of shippers and consumers, prices continue to tend upwards—stocks are very light, and the market closes firm at \$22 for small parcels. Prime and Prime Mess would bring an advance on former quotations, but these grades are out of stock.

BUTTER.—After a long period of almost unparalleled dulness, caused in a great measure by holders refusing to submit to prices at which operators could afford to invest in the article with a chance, if not of profit, at any rate of avoiding losses, which at any approach to former rates they could not fail to incur, we have to note a better feeling in the market. The clearing of already noticed of several large parcels, accumulations of many months, at rates ranging from 10 to 11 cents, relieved the market, which had been oppressed by the quantity seeking an outlet; and the few parcels retained in first hands have this week been mostly placed within the range of 11½ to 12½ cents, according to quality, being an advance of near a cent per pound on the rates current for the last few weeks. Strictly choice parcels are worth a little more. The quantity now on hand is materially reduced, and it is anticipated that the whole will be worked into consumption before any quantity of new Butter comes into this market. Advices from Britain still continue most discouraging; while choice Butter is still in demand, and full rates are freely paid, secondary qualities remain quite unsaleable, and holders, despite their anxiety to quit them of their old stocks, are compelled to see the price daily falling before their eyes without being able to effect sales. New Irish Butter is now becoming plentiful in the Liverpool market, where it is preferred to Canadian and United States, even at a considerable advance in price. The weather in Britain is fine, and there seems at present every probability of prices of New opening at a low figure.

Abeles.—Arrivals are moderate for the season, and there being now some vessels on the berth loading for Britain, there has been more activity in both Pots and

Since the fall of the price of gold in the United States, we have been looking for a demand to spring up from that quarter; and indeed a considerable parcel of Spanish Sole is being forwarded this week to Boston, and another to Chicago, both markets being firm.

We have to report a sale of 1000 Sides Upper at 23 cents, at which low figure it might pay to ship to Liverpool or the United States; it may be safely stated, however, that it is a losing price to the farmer.

Boots and Shoes.

From what has transpired during the last few months, it is but fair to admit that this branch of business has not suffered more than any other, perhaps not as much as some manufactures; and when there had been an excess of stocks, sales have pretty well reduced them, so much so, that when all is told a fair Spring's business will have been accounted for.
