# 00 THE CONVENTIONS. 00

The American Philatelic Association.

The fifteesth unnual convention of the American Philatelic Association was called to order Tuesday morning August 23th at 11.00 o'clock with Pres. Toppen in the chair. The conventions were held in the art museum. Pres. Toppan responded to the mayor and then called Mr. William O. Stone of Springfield, Mass. to the chair while he read his annual report which was well received and heartily applauded. The committee on credentials then reported the following directors elected: Geo L. Toppau, P. M. Wolsiester, C. R. Severn, S. S. Leland, H.E. Deats, H.G.Smith, E Doeblin, M.H. Lombard, · and H. B. Phillips.

The President then appointed the various committees, after which Secy. Deats read the reports of the officers who were unable to be present. The session then adjourned at 12.80 to meet again the following morning at 10.30.

The second session was called to order by the President at 10.30 Wednesday morning. At this meeting a number of reports were made, and considerable discussion arose over some especially the library. Buffulo was chosen the convention seat for 1901. The date has not yet been set, but will probably be when the railway rates are the lowest.

The Weekly Philatelic Era was chosen efficial organ for another year. The society publishing its own official organ met with general favor, but the finances of the association would not permit it. A subscription was taken up to see if enough of the members could be gotten to each give a certain sum toward the fund for the society's publishing its own official organ, but for some reason or another the idea did not go through. This meeting adjourned at 11.45 to meet again on Thursday morning at 11.00 o'clock,

The third session was called to order at 11.00 o'clach. The first thing to be done was to receive reports of some of the committees which had not yet reported. A vote of thanks was given to those who helped to make the convention a success, and then adjourned sme die to meet again in a year hence.

Philatelic Sons of America.

The eighth annual convention of the Philatelic Sons of America was called to order at 10.00 Tuesday morning by C. W. Kissinger, who nominated W. F. Shul of Milwankee temporary chairman. Seconded. Carried. The President's address was read by the chairman. The committees were appointed and reports of various officers were approved. A nice poem from Roy Farrell Green was tead by E. R. Adrich and was greatly applauded.

Vice resident Barnum arrived in inne to ead the second session to order at two o'clock. Tuesday afternoon, There being little business before the house the meeting adjourced.

The third sossion was called to order the next day. The committee on credentials reported the following elected: President, L. T. Brodtone; V. President, W. F. Schad; See'y C. W. Kissinger; Treasurer, W. H. Barnum; International See'y, C.C. Guy. The Perforator was elected to serve as ulicial organ for another year. The convention seat for 1901 will be Buffulz, N. Y.

#### Sons of Philatelia.

The first session was held in the Plankinton House with four members present. The most important business was to try to change the constitution so that the official organ would have to be elected every year, but there were not amough proxies to make the change. Another session was held the next day but nothing of importance was transacted. The following officers were elected: Pres. J. C. Miller, V. Pres. G. W. Davis, See'y J. F. Dodge, Treas. W. H. Emmert.

The new issues which have appeared in the last twelve months have as a general thing had a good sale notwithstanding the speculative characters of many of the new issues. In my opinion pretty stamps will have a ready sale, always, whether they are speculative or not. Collectors all knew the "error" of the New Zealand see was speculative but the stamps sold well and this bears out my views deep it mos?

The Nawfoundland Cabotissue sold well and the Canada Jubiless would have sold much better if it had it not been for the manner in which they were sold to the public. Collectors are not fools and I am far from blaming them when they refused to buy the ½, 6 and 8 cent Cauada Jubilees.

The new Cuba surcharged stamps which recently appeared will no doubt have a ready sale as will the new pictorial set which it is stated will appear shortly. I collect new issues but I do not collect them to the exclusion of old issues and do not advise collectors to try speculating in the new issues if you must speculate, take the old issues they are safe at an investment.
