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
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
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
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
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HINTS TO RAILWAY TRAVELLERS.

You will save money by purchasing your Tickets before entering the cars. **CHECK YOUR BAGGAGE** and the Company will then be responsible for it. Baggage in Passenger Cars is a source of anxiety to the owner; causes inconvenience to others, and is unsightly and altogether out of place.

Baggage can be checked through from places in Canada to the United States and vice versa; but in such cases the law requires each Passenger to print out his Baggage to the Customs Officers at the Frontier Station, in order that it may be examined.

Avoid altercations with Conductors or other Employees of the Company. Conductors have very responsible and arduous duties to perform on the journey, which require the utmost diligence on their part, and they have not time to enter into long discussions.

IT IS DANGEROUS to stand on the platform of cars or move from one car to another, or attempt to get on or off whilst the Train is in motion. Heads and arms are safest when they are inside the car windows.

that date. It was found convenient to put the first seven letters of the Alphabet successively against the days of the month, putting A to January 1, and repeating the same letters as often as may be necessary through the year. Of course all Sundays to the year, except in leap-year, will have the same letter that falls to the first one thus, the Dominical Letter enables us to find on what day in the week a given day in the year falls.

The Epoch is the moon's epoch the beginning of the year. The Solar Cycle is a period of twelve or thirteen years, so called because in the twenty-eighth year after any year which may be taken, all the days of the week fall on the same days of the month as they fall in that year. One of these cycles was finished in 1872, and 1874 is the second year in the next cycle. All the days of 1875 will correspond with those of 1847.

Nineteen years are very nearly equal to a whole number of lunar months; hence, once in 19 years the phase of the moon falls on the same days. These years are numbered up from one to nineteen, and the Golden Number marks the position of the year in the cycle of nineteen. The Roman Indiction is a cycle of fifteen years, used in the Middle Ages, but wholly chronological. The first one began



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
PLAN of the CITY of MONTREAL.

GENERAL RAILWAY INFORMATION.

THE NEW YORK AND CANADA RAILROAD.

The following description of the heavy work on this road is condensed from an article in the *Plattsburgh (N. Y.) Herald*:—

As the great work of constructing a railroad along the western rock-bound shores of Lake Champlain approaches completion, the stupendous nature of the job becomes more and more apparent. On the whole line, from Whitehall to the mouth of the Ausable River, great obstacles have been met with. Near the upper end of the lake, at a certain point near the shore, several "fills" sank successively out of sight into an apparently bottomless pit; at Putnam Point, opposite Benson Landing, were a series of very heavy rock cuttings, at Ticonderoga was a tunnel, and on the shores of Bulwagga Bay again was found heavy rock work. Then just below Port Henry there was much hard work in cutting through the rocks, and for four miles north of Port Henry is an almost continuous side cut along the solid wall of rock which forms the shore, commencing with another tunnel just north of the old furnace in the village. This four miles takes us to Mullen Brook, where the soil is again reached, and from which point for 21 miles the work is comparatively easy. But when this 21 miles is passed the line, after winding down the valley of the Boquet River, suddenly strikes the head of Willsboro Bay, from which point, for seven miles north, is found, so old railroad men say, one the hardest seven-mile sections ever encountered by a railroad company on this continent.

As the line approaches the head of the Bay from the south, a series of minor rock cuts are encountered, which, however, afford but a slight foretaste of what is to come, and then suddenly it strikes a huge mass of rock, which, however, is passed by a heavy through cut, flanked on either hand by side cuts. Then, coming north, a shelving rock is reached, from the foot of which at the water's edge a wall 150 feet long has been carried up thirty feet as a foundation for a "side fill." Then comes another side cut, then a lateral fissure into the mountain, across which is a deep fill, composed entirely of rocks from the side cut below and another heavy one just above. This brings us to the famous red rocks, so named from the stained appearance of their surface when viewed from the water. * * * Along the side of the red rocks is a cut 600 feet long, and right here has been the most difficult portion of the line to build. The first blow was struck at this point July 25th, 1873. In order to get an idea of the appearance of this place, imagine a nearly perpendicular wall of rock 600 feet long and rising sheer from the very edge of the lake to a height of about 180 feet. * * * Half way up this cliff, or about 90 feet from the edge of the water, was where the track of the New York & Canada Railroad must be laid, if it was laid at all, for back of the cliff the mountain rose to a much greater height. At the foot of this precipice came the waters of Willsboro Bay, and to give an idea of the shape of the rock below the water it is only necessary to state that 100 feet from the shore the water was found to be 210 feet deep. Well, the work was commenced a year ago last July, half way up this cliff, and continued through that season, but during the winter of 1873-4, owing to the failure of a contractor, work was suspended, to be renewed the following spring, and now this wonderful shelf is nearly completed.

In prosecuting this work, the most extraordinary difficulties have been met with and overcome. At one point the face of the cliff curved inward, and across this point it was contemplated to make a side fill for a portion of the road bed, and thus save some hard blows. So hundreds of tons of rocks were dumped off the precipice into the water until the pile emerged from the surface of the water and began to creep hopefully up the cliff, when suddenly it sank down into the water and disappeared in the mysterious depths below, probably having slid down the marine slope—nobody knows how many hundred feet. So this plan had to be abandoned, for the risk of a railroad train sliding down this steep place on an insecure road-bed could not be assumed on any consideration. Then the line was changed so as to bring the track 18 feet further into the mountain at this point. In changing this line it became necessary to go to the top of the cliff again and take off another shelf 18 feet thick, and in doing this, at one point four holes were drilled in a line 18 feet back

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from the face of the cliff, and 14 feet deep. The distance between these holes was 15 feet each, thus the whole distance spanned being 45 feet. These holes were then charged lightly with nitro-glycerine and the charges exploded simultaneously. This made a slight crack in the rock. Then it was charged several times in succession in the same manner, until finally a crack 30 feet deep and 100 feet long was made.

Into this crack, 100 feet long and 30 feet long, was then poured 30 kegs of blasting powder, and on the 5th February, 1874, the charge was fired, and when it exploded the whole face of the rock—over 2,000 cubic yards—went overboard! All Essex County shook when that charge went off, and over the water at Burlington they thought there was an earthquake. This is not the heaviest charge that has been fired on the line, but it probably did the best execution.

Passing on to the northward of the red rock cut, another lateral fissure into the mountain is reached, across which a fill is being made—the material being, of course, fragments of rocks, and just north of that we come suddenly to the tunnel.

A huge spur of the mountain projects so far forward here that in running the line there was no possibility of going round it by means of a cut, without making a shorter curve than is allowed on this road, and so there was no alternative but to make a tunnel. The southern entrance to this tunnel is very abrupt, and as you pass over the deep rock fill you are suddenly confronted by a dark opening in a cliff of almost pure feldspar 50 feet high.

Passing out at the north end of the tunnel, we soon afterward abandoned the line of the track and climbed over the hill by a foot-path to the office, which is situated near Higby's Gorge—a natural gulf almost as wonderful as the Ausable Chasm itself.

The walls of this gorge are 100 feet high by actual measurement, and the track is to cross it on an iron bridge the span of which will be 160 feet. Still further on to the northward about two miles, is another very heavy rock cut, the deepest thorough cut on the whole section, it being 68 feet deep. This seven miles is on the south end of what is known as section No. 7, the sections being numbered from Whitehall. This section No. 7 extends from near the head of Willsboro Bay to the Ausable River, No. 8 from Willsboro Bay to Mullen Brook, and No. 5 from Mullen Brook to Port Henry.

The contractors on this section No. 7 are John Cameron from near the head of Willsboro Bay $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles north, including the Red Rocks, to the south end of the tunnel; Rogers & Kelly have the next three-quarters of a mile including the tunnel, next comes Philip Eder $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles; then comes another job of Rogers & Kelly's. In this seven miles are only 25,000 yards of earth work, and over 300,000 yards of rock work, and the bed of the track will rest upon solid rock more than nine-tenths of the whole distance.

The heavy rock work on this entire section is now more than three-quarters done and the prospect is good for a through train between New York and Montreal *via* Whitehall, Willsboro Tunnel and Plattsburgh by October, 1875. The contract on section No. 8 between Ausable River and Plattsburgh has been let to Mr. Doty, who, it is understood, will push the work through with the greatest possible vigor, the stone for many of the culverts being already on the ground. But the work on this section is comparatively light; the whole amount of earth work to be done being far less than that contained in a single fill at Port Douglass. We understand that a locomotive is to be put upon the track at Port Kent for a construction train, and from this point the track will be laid both north and south. The rock work around Trembleau Mountain is all done, and it is expected that Mr. McDonnell will have his contract finished, from the southern extremity of the Trembleau Mountain rock cutting to the Wickham Marsh, north of Port Kent, by July.

The speed of trains in Germany is given in a report of the Railroad Bureau of the Empire for December last. The greatest speed per hour, including stops at stations, was, for express and fast trains, 34 miles on the Berlin, Potsdam & Magdeburg Road; for ordinary passenger trains, 25 miles per hour on the Maerchen & Posen Road. The slowest speed was for express and fast trains (21 miles per hour) on the East Prussia Southern Road; for ordinary passenger trains, 16 miles per hour on the Ermsthal and Cromberg Roads of Wurtemberg. The average speeds per hour were for express and fast trains, 28 miles; for ordinary passenger trains, 21 miles. This is for the whole Empire, except Bavaria.

NEW YORK CENTRAL AND HUDSON RIVER.

The Fourth Avenue Improvement in New York is so far completed that trains begun to run over the new tracks their whole length from the Grand Central Depot at Forty-second street to the Harlem River June 21.

The distance between the Harlem River and Forty-second street is about $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles. The work of sinking the track was begun in the Fall of 1872, the contract being awarded to Messrs. Dillon, Clyde & Co. for \$6,395,070. The undertaking was under the supervision of a Board of Engineers, consisting of I. C. Buckhout of the Harlem Railroad Company (who was also engineer of the Grand Central Depot) as Superintending Engineer, with W. L. Dearborn as Resident Engineer, and F. S. Curtiss as Principal Assistant, and four division assistants. The work has been carried on uninterruptedly until the present time, although Mr. Buckhout died some months ago.

The trains going out from the station on Forty-second street take the west track, and those arriving come in on the east track, thus making the trains pass to the left instead of to the right, as the law directs. Hence there is a necessity of the tracks crossing each other. This they do at Fifty-third street in the form of a letter X, and not by gradual approach. After leaving this place the tracks soon run into the first tunnel, which begins at Fifty-sixth street, and is of the kind known as "beam" tunnels; that is, the roof is composed of flat iron beams, filled in with brick work. South of this tunnel the tracks are crossed at the intersections of the streets with iron bridges, some of which are only for foot passengers, the majority, however, being roadways for carriages as well. The first beam tunnel extends to a point a little south of Sixty-seventh street, where the arch-roof tunnel begins. The arch-roof tunnel extends a little beyond Seventy-first street. The old rock tunnel begins at Ninety-second street and extends to Ninety-fourth street, leading direct to the viaduct crossing the Harlem flats, which is 4,563 feet long. At its greatest height, which is at One Hundred and Fourth street, it is 31 feet 1 inch above the street grade. The viaduct is built on piles, of which 198,000 were driven in the soil until a hard bottom was reached. Midway between One Hundred and Fifteenth and One Hundred and Sixteenth streets this viaduct ends and leads again into an open cut, the land adjoining rapidly rising. This cut extends through to the Harlem River.

The tracks from Forty-street to the Harlem River are—or will be when the work is completed—almost perfectly straight, but the grade through the various tunnels and cuts varies considerably. At Fifty-sixth street the tracks are 13 feet 6 inches below the avenue grade, at Sixty-seventh street 25 feet below, and at Ninety-sixth street 27 feet below.

Although at present only two tracks are laid, it is intended to have four tracks. For the additional tracks on each side of the main tunnels a smaller tunnel is built. When these tracks are completed, which, it is expected, will be in September next, local rapid transit trains are to be run, and it is anticipated that the trip between the Grand Central station and Harlem will be made in eight minutes. The local trains will be run through the side tunnels. Station houses will be constructed at Fifty-ninth street, at Seventy-second street, Eighty-sixth street, One hundred and Tenth and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets.

DETROIT & MILWAUKEE.

In the Michigan Circuit Court, at Detroit, June 30, according to adjournment, the question of the appointment of Mr. C. C. Trowbridge as permanent receiver of the Detroit & Milwaukee Railroad was argued. Sir Hugh Allan, in behalf of the Merchants' Bank, Canada, filed a petition for delay in the appointment of a permanent receiver Judge Douglas representing their case. Mr. Ashley Pond for the trustees under the second mortgage resisted this attempt. Messrs. S. D. Miller and Wm. D. Wells for the trustees under the first mortgage, T. Romeyn for the Great Western Railway, and Messrs. George Jerome and C. V. N. Lothrop for the Detroit & Milwaukee Railroad Company, also joined with the latter in opposing a postponement of the appointment. They all agreed, however, to the necessity of a receiver, and no opposition was made to Mr. Trowbridge as the best man for the position. The only question was whether the appointment should be made permanent at this time.

The decision of the Court was given the next day, making Mr. Trowbridge's appointment as Receiver permanent. The necessary order was entered.

ANNUAL REPORTS.

ALLEGHENY VALLEY.

This company operates 259 miles of road, including the Low Grade Division and Sligo Branch, which have been operated only since May 1, 1874. It is claimed that the Sligo Branch was built by the late President without authority, and the present management has declined to recognize it as the property of the company. It has, however, been operated on certain parties guaranteeing the company against loss.

The company also works the Buffalo Cory and Pittsburgh Road, from Cory Pa, to Brocton, N. Y., 43 miles, the earnings of which are stated separately. This road was purchased at foreclosure sale by the late President, Col Phillips, in his own name, and then leased to this company for 999 years. Nevertheless, the company paid out of its own funds \$317,000 purchase money, besides the sum of \$165,617 84, subsequently for improvements. There is still due on the purchase money \$132,004 29, with interest, secured by a mortgage on the property. The board was in some doubt whether the company could be legally held for the payment of these notes, but as the large amount already paid could not be recovered, and as the road was of indirect value as forming a connection with Buffalo, the board thought it best to make Mr. A. H. Barney, trustee, holding the notes, an offer of compromise. The offer was, to pay the notes with Allegheny Valley income bonds, with an agreement to apply the net earnings of the Buffalo Cory & Pittsburgh to the redemption of the bonds, and to guarantee the net earnings to the amount of \$4,000 per month. This offer has been recommended by Mr. Barney to the court having jurisdiction over the matter for its approval. The administrators of the estate of Col. Phillips have expressed a willingness to convey the road to this company whenever they can thereby be relieved from all further liability, which can be done if the proposed compromise is effected. It is then proposed to organize a new company to own the road, all the stock of which will belong to the Allegheny Valley.

The company holds 41,000 shares of Oil Creek & Allegheny River stock, brought from the Philadelphia & Erie in 1872, at \$37.50 per share. This stock was finally settled for in March, 1874, by the issue of income bonds, for the amount of the purchase money and interest due and unpaid thereon.

The floating debt includes \$5,112,099 90 suspended debt, which is to be funded in income bonds under the agreement with the creditors, and \$687,755 87 accrued interest, the balance being current accounts and bills payable. The assets in cash and available accounts amount to \$488,763 30.

LOW GRADE DIVISION.

The arching of the Summit Tunnel, 1,957 feet in length, is only partly finished and will have to be completed during the current year at an estimated cost of \$100,000. The work on this Low Grade Division is exceedingly solid and durable, and much of it, in the opinion of the present management, has been unnecessarily expensive. The report says: "For some unexplained reason, the financial transactions pertaining to the cost of construction of the Low Grade Division (or Bennett's Branch), including the sales of nearly ten millions of bonds and negotiations of several hundred thousand dollars of bills payable, were not allowed by the late President to be entered on the books of the company, and many of the transactions were not a matter of record in any form, thus involving great difficulty in procuring the information necessary to make them appear properly in the accounts of the company."

The working expenses include general expenses, which were \$30,145 77 in 1874 against \$111,383 84, in 1873. The earnings for 1873 were only from the Main Line and Plum Creek Branch; in 1874 the Low Grade Division and Sligo Branch are included from May 1, although owing to difficulties with the laborers employed in construction, they were not fairly opened until June. The earnings per mile of the Main Line show a decrease of 21 9 per cent.

The mileage is averaged for the year in calculating the earnings per mile. The operating expenses per train mile for the Main Line were \$0.924 in 1874 against \$1.095 in 1873; for the Low Grade Division they were, in 1874, \$0.91. Coal and oil are known to exist in large quantities near the line of the Low Grade Division, and will in time, it is thought, supply a large local traffic to that line. The expectation of a large through traffic has not as yet been realized.

The decrease in earnings has resulted from the general depression of business which has prevailed during the year 1874, and which has been most severely felt by

the iron, coal and oil interests, upon which the road is largely dependent for traffic, whereby there has been not only a great decrease in the volume of traffic, or of tons and passengers moved, but it has also compelled a general reduction in the rates of transportation. This reduction has been met by a reduction in expenses, which is the result of a more thorough system and supervision and a stricter personal accountability of the officers and agents of the company.

The board believes that the crisis in the affairs of the Allegheny Valley Company has been passed, and that with prudent management and a fair revival of business, the earnings of the property will be sufficient to meet all the charges upon it hereafter.

HANNIBAL & ST. JOSEPH.

The St. Joseph (Mo.) *Herald* of a recent date, says:—

As previously noticed, another change has taken place in the running management of the Hannibal & St. Joseph Railroad. Mr. L. W. Morse, who for something more than a year past has been General Manager, has retired, and Mr. H. H. Courtright has resigned the general superintendency, and is succeeded by Mr. Charles N. Lee.

These changes, it is understood, have been brought about chiefly through the instrumentality of Gen. J. W. Singleton, of Quincy, aided perhaps to some extent by Col. A. W. Lamb, of Hannibal. The reasons for them are probably not definitely known, except to the gentlemen named above, and the Executive Committee of the board of directors.

"Since Mr. Morse was placed in charge of the road many changes have been made, and, as a natural consequence, considerable opposition has been arrayed against him. It is asserted in his behalf that these changes are made in the interest of the road, and to subserve the welfare of the stockholders. According to our view, at least some of the changes were ill-advised, and calculated to have a decidedly opposite effect from which it is claimed they were intended. But conceding to Mr. Morse all sincerity of purpose, and we have no occasion whatever to do otherwise, we cannot help believing that had he been a little more thoroughly westernized, his course would have been somewhat different, and would have resulted equally as satisfactory to him as the one he has pursued, and better for the company. There is one thing certain, though: Mr. Morse has had his craft full-rigged, and has carried a high sail, bearing down all opposition until now. Presidents and superintendents have been made to yield and give way to his authority, and the responsibility for the management of the road, good or bad, has rested upon him. And in this point it is due to him to say that the most alleged against him is the dissatisfaction said to exist on account of the course he has pursued, while we hear no intimation from any quarter that the management of the road is not of the most skillful and economical character.

"Mr. H. H. Courtright, who was appointed General Superintendent to succeed Mr. Towne, very reluctantly accepted the position. As General Freight agent of the road he had all that he cared to attend to, and was therefore not anxious to assume a double responsibility. In the changes which have been made we understand that everything is perfectly satisfactory to Mr. Courtright, so far as he is affected, and that he is glad of the opportunity to devote his whole time to the freight business of the road. It is proper to say that he was consulted before any change of Superintendent was made, and he was relieved from that position at his own request.

"Mr. Chas. N. Lee was appointed to the general agency at Quincy in 1869, during Mr. C. W. Mead's administration, which position he has filled up to the present time in the most satisfactory manner. He has given the business in his charge the most careful attention, and has given the most unqualified proof of superior railroad ability. He was formerly connected with the Chicago & Alton and Chicago Burlington & Quincy roads, and he possesses all the requirements for a popular and successful railway manager."

LEVIS & KENNEBEC.

The first section of 30 miles of this road, from Point Levi, T. Q., opposite Quebec, has been completed and opened for traffic.

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APPOINTMENTS, &c.

ALLEGHENY VALLEY RAILROAD Co.—Mr. David McCargo has been appointed General Superintendent of the Allegheny Valley Railroad, the Oil Creek and Allegheny River Railway, and the Buffalo, Corry and Pittsburgh Railroad, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Col. F. F. Lawrence. Mr. McCargo assumed the duties of the position on the 23rd June. The road between Pittsburgh and Oil City will hereafter be known as the "River Division," under the charge of Thomas M. King, as Superintendent. Mr. A. A. Jackson has been appointed Superintendent of the Low Grade Division, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Mr. Wm. M. Phillips. The resignation and appointment took effect on July 1st, 1875.

LAKE SHORE & MICHIGAN SOUTHERN.—Mr. John Newell succeeded Mr. Amasa Stone as General Manager, or Managing Director, July 1. Mr. Newell has been connected with the New York Central as Superintendent, was President of the Cleveland & Toledo for a time, and for some years past and until last Fall, President of the Illinois Central. Since then he has been Vice-President of the Illinois & St. Louis Bridge Company.

POUGHKEEPSIE, HARTFORD & BOSTON RAILROAD Co.—The Corporation formerly known as "The Poughkeepsie and Eastern Railroad," has been sold, and reorganized under the above title.

GREAT WESTERN RAILWAY OF CANADA.—Mr. Fred. Broughton has been appointed General Manager of the Great Western Railway, and entered upon his duties on Monday the 5th July, 1875. All communications on the business of the Company to be addressed to him.

EUROPEAN & NORTH AMERICAN,

This company which has been known to be in embarrassed circumstances for some time past, has suspended payment. A full statement of the condition, assets and liabilities is being prepared, and will be submitted to the creditors at a meeting which will be called shortly.

The company was formed a little more than a year ago by the consolidation of the European & North American Company, of Maine, and the New Brunswick company of the same name. It owns a somewhat circuitous line from Bangor, Me., eastward to St. John, N.B., 205 miles, and it works under lease the Bangor & Piscataquis road, from Oldtown to Abbott, 54½ miles, and the Bucksport, 18½ miles. It was completed in 1871, after many difficulties and delays, and forms the connecting link between the Maine roads and the railroad system of the maritime provinces. The company has been carrying, ever since the completion of the road, a heavy floating debt, and, though no reports have been made, it is believed that the earnings have been too light to leave any surplus for its reduction. By the latest reports, which are not very recent, the bonded debt was \$5,000,000, besides \$720,000 Bangor & Piscataquis bonds assumed.




This company gave notice to the New York Stock Exchange recently that on and after July 1, it would substitute its own stock certificates for those of the Burlington and Missouri River Railroad Company and its branch stock; also, that it would issue its own certificates of stock in exchange for the convertible bonds of the Burlington & Missouri River Company. This is in conformity with a previous notice given to the Stock Exchange at the time of the virtual consolidation of the two companies.

Proposals will be received at the office in Boston until July 16, for \$400,000 5 per cent. bonds of this company, having 20 years to run. The interest and principal may be made payable either in Boston or London. Payment for the bonds to be made one-quarter July 20, and one-quarter on the 20th of each of the three following months. As security for the payment, an equal amount of the 8 per cent. bonds of the Albia, Knoxville & Des Moines Railroad Company, whose road is to be leased to the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, will be deposited with the New England Trust Company of Boston. The difference of 3 per cent. between the interest on these bonds and those to be sold will be applied as a sinking fund to the purchase and cancelling of the outstanding bonds.

—The Sultan of Zanzibar has given an enthusiastic account of the impression which Queen Victoria made upon him. Here is a portion of it: "I have now seen with my eyes what I have so long desired to see, Her Majesty the Queen of England. My Father, who has been taken to the mercy of the Merciful, used often to talk to us of the Queen Victoria; but he died without seeing her. I now tell you why I have so often said that it was the summit of my ambition to see the face of Her Majesty. It was this: I have met many Englishmen in my time, not only of the Royal Navy and Army, but also civilians, merchants, and travellers, and I wondered why they all spoke of their sovereign, not in a formal way as did the people of other nations, but with enthusiasm and affection. I was, indeed, wonderstruck, with all the sumptuousness which surrounded her; but hers is the simple majesty which captivates, not that which bewilders. Nevertheless, she was majestic in her simplicity, and my heart wept for her when I saw the two Princesses, her royal daughters, by her side, and remembered that her beloved Consort had been taken to the mercy of God."

It contains 1060 windows, 377 of which are bay windows; 926 rooms, none of less size than 16x16 feet, and 388 bath-rooms. It contains over three miles of halls; there are five passenger elevators and seven grand stairways; there are 4540 doors, 9000 gas burners, and thirty-two miles of gas and water-pipe. It requires 59,000 yards, or twenty-eight miles of carpet. It can accommodate 1200 guests, besides 300 servants and employees. And, best of all there is not a dark or windowless room in the house. It has been decided to run a length of heavy plate glass, sixteen inches high, along the top of the balusters and balustrades, as a precaution against accidents by children sliding down the balusters or climbing the balustrades. This plate glass will reflect the gas jets, and at night the interior courts will present a dazzling scene.














