## ECLIPSES IN THE YEAR 1845.

There will be four Eclipses this year: two of the Sun and two of the Moon, and a transit of the Planet Mercury across the disc or face of the Sun:

The first will be an Eclipse of the Sun on the 6th of May; on which day the Sun will rise with about five digets obscured, but the Eclipse will end in a few minutes afterwards.

On the 6th of May there will be a transit of the Planet Mercury across the Sun's Southern limb, which will be visible in America, beginning at 11h. 35m. in the morning, and ending at 6h. 4m. in the afternoon.

There will be an Eclipse of the Moon on the 21st May, at the time of her full, invisible here.

There will be an Eclipse of the Sun at the time of new Moon, on 30th October, in the evening, also invisible here.

The last will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon on the 13th November, in the evening, beginning at 6h. 26m., and ending at 9h. 44m.— Magnitude, 11,029 digets on the Northern limb.

This is deserving of attention in this country also.*

## TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS.

NEAR THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or fall ebb, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them. For a few days in the spring of last year, the height of water in the River St. John, renders the passage of the Falls extremely difficult.

### MISCELLANEOUS SELECTIONS.

**MACKLIN'S ADVICE TO HIS SON.**—I have often been told that every man must be the maker or mariner of his own fortune. I repeat the doctrine, he who depends upon his incessant industry and integrity, depends upon patrons of the noblest and most exalted kind; these are the creatures of fortune and fame, the founders of families, and can never disappoint or desert you. They controul all human dealings, and even vicissitudes of any unfortunate tendency to a contrary nature. You have a genius, you have learning, you have industry at times, but you want perseverance, without it you can do nothing. I bid you bear this motto in mind —“**PERSEVERE.**”

**LOVE OF FLOWERS.**—A love of flowers is one of the earliest of our tastes, and certainly one of the most innocent. The cultivation of flowers, while it forms an elegant amusement, is a most healthy and invigorating pursuit. Unlike hunting, fishing, shooting, or similar rural amusements, it inflicts no suffering on any of the animal creation, and merely aids nature in her efforts to make the world beautiful to the eye, as the fruits are pleasant to the taste. The flower garden, while it agreeably occupies the time, does not impose a heavy tax upon the pocket, and there are very few flowers but what may be cultivated to as great perfection in the garden of the peasant as of the peer. It is a taste, too, which

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is well adapted to the female character, and affords much rational amusement to the recluse.—[*Manual of Gardening.*]

**COMPOSITION OF THE BLOOD.**—With the end of a quill or a soft brush, take up a small drop of blood, just drawn from a vein, and spread it as thin as possible over a bit of talc. If you then apply to your microscope one of the strongest magnifiers, you will distinctly see its globules. By these means it has been found, that the red globules of the human blood are each composed of six smaller globules, united together; and when disunited by any cause whatever, they are no longer of red colour. These red globules are so exceedingly minute, that their diameter is only the 160th part of a line, so that a sphere of a line in diameter, would contain 4,096,000 of them.—[*Magazine of Science.*]

**NEW DISCOVERY.**—It has been usually considered that wetting the hair with water, hardens it and makes it coarse and harsh.—This may be true if the hair is simply wet, but if the head be thoroughly washed, the contrary effect will be produced—the hair will become softer and thicker. This I know by experiment. I have been in the habit of visiting our City Baths of late, where, after using soap freely on my head, I take the large stiff brush and scour my head, for at least five minutes, rubbing it in every direction, smartly; of course, it is made perfectly clean. This I consider, after all, the only preventative to the hair's falling off, and the only panacea to that almost universal evil. I have found that since I have practiced it, my hair is firmly rooted and of course is growing thicker and softer. I deem it important to mention it, that those who are depending on tonics may give up the delusion, and save their money and hair too.—[*N. H. Palladium.*]

**How to prevent Letters being Opened.**—Steam or hot water will soften a wafer—a hot iron or spirit lamp loosens a wax seal—after the instrument of forgery, the plaster cast, has been taken from it; but by several combinations of both, all power of opening a letter without violence is removed. Thus, let the letter be first sealed with a small wafer, well moistened, cutting a small hole, say two tenths of an inch diameter, through the upper paper, directly over the wafer; upon this spot, having pressed down the wafer, drop as much sealing wax as will completely cover the wafer, or rather more, and seal with the usual seal. Now, neither dry heat nor moisture will open this, nor will dry steam be hot enough to melt the wax.

**HOW TO KEEP BUTTER FRESH AND SWEET FOR YEARS.**—Among the mass of information furnished by the report of the commissioner of patents, which is highly interesting to farmers, is an account of a progress, hitherto a secret, by which butter may be kept for years, fresh and sweet, in any climate. Most kinds of wood contain considerable quantities of pyroligneous acid, which decomposes salt in butter kept in such tubs. The linden, or bass wood, is the only one which, it appears, by careful experiment, is free from it; others, it is stated, may be freed from it, and thus rendered suitable, by boiling three or four hours, well pressed under water. Good butter is to be well churned and worked, and

packed hard and tight in kegs of seasoned white oak; the head is then put in, leaving a small hole into which brine is poured to fill the vacant space; and of so much importance is it deemed, to prevent any bad taste, that the plugs for the hole must not be made of cedar or pine, but of cypress or bass wood, as otherwise it would be injured. After which, these kegs are placed in a boghead, well filled with brine of full solution, that will bear an egg, which is then headed up tight and close. This is the mode pursued in Orange County, New-York; and the hatter will keep at sea and in warm climates, and commands a very high price.—The appendix to the report contains a letter addressed to Mr. Ellsworth, by G. Fox, Esq. a merchant of Hartford, Connecticut, corroborating the above.

**To Make Currant Jelly.**—Reduce the berries to juice by simmering them over a fire or in an oven; and for every pint of currant juice mix three quarters of a pound of loaf sugar with half a pint of water. Let the water and sugar boil together above twenty minutes, stirring the mixture all the time, when it will have acquired the consistency of candy, which may be known by dropping a little upon a cold plate. Then put the currant juice into another pan, and when it boils mix the candy or syrup with it, and let the whole boil together as strongly as possible for twenty minutes.

**TO MAKE FRESH WATER LIKE SEA WATER, FOR DRENCHING ASPARAGUS BEDS.**—To every 100 lbs. weight of water add 2½ lbs. of common salt, and it will be about as strong as sea water; but as sea water contains the muriate and sulphate of magnesia, in notable quantity, they too are required to complete the resemblance; say ½ lb. of each to the same quantity of water. Drench the asparagus beds two or three times, when the summer growth is about to be made and is a little advanced.—[*Lon. Gar. Chron.*]

**TO MAKE WATER COLD, FOR SUMMER.**—The following is a simple mode of rendering water always as cold as ice:—Let the jar, pitcher, or vessel used for water, be surrounded with one or more folds of coarse cotton, to be constantly wet. The evaporation of the water will carry off the heat from the inside and reduce it to a freezing point. In India, and other tropical regions, where ice cannot be produced, this is common. Let every mechanic or labourer have at his place of employment two pitchers thus provided, and with lids or covers—the one to contain water for drinking, the other for evaporation—and he can always have a supply of cold water in warm weather. Any person can test this by dipping a finger in water, and holding it in the air of a warm day; after doing this three or four times, he will find his finger uncomfortably cold.

**TO PREVENT WOOD DECAYING.**—Take twelve ounces of resin and eight ounces of roll brimstone, each coarsely powdered, and three gallons of train-oil. Heat them slowly, gradually adding four ounces of bees' wax, cut in small bits. Frequently stir the liquor, which, as soon as the solid ingredients are dissolved, will be fit for use. What remains unused will become solid on cooling, and may be re-melted on subsequent occasions.

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fit for use, add as much Spanish brown, or red or yellow ochre, or any colour you want, first ground fine in some of the oil; it will give the shade you want; then lay it on with a brush, as hot and thin as you can; some days after the first coat is dried, give it a second. It will preserve plank for ages, and keep the weather from driving through brick work. Common white paint may be used on top of it, if required, for the sake of appearance. Two coats should always be given, and in compound machinery the separate parts should be so varnished before they are put together, after which it will be prudent to give a third coating to the joints or to any other part which is peculiarly exposed to the action of moisture, such as water-shoots, flood-gates, the beds of carts, the tops of posts, and all the timber which is near or within the ground. Each coat should be dry before the parts are joined or the last coat applied. The composition should be applied when the wood is perfectly dry. It is necessary to mention that compositions made of hot oil should, for the sake of security, be heated in metallic vessels, in the open air; for, when the oil is brought to the boiling point, or 600 of Fahrenheit, the vapour catches fire, and though a lower degree of temperature should be used in this process, it is not always possible to regulate the heat, or to prevent the overflowing of the materials; in either of which cases, were the melting performed in a house, fatal accidents might happen.—[*Archives of Useful Knowledge.*]

**HAY MAKING.**—We think it best to cut grass for hay, as near as possible to the time when it is in fullest bloom. Of course, if it is cut when most of it is in this state, some may be a little past, and some may not have quite reached full bloom. We know there has heretofore been some difference of opinion as to the stage grass should be in when it is cut, but we believe the experience of the best farmers is in agreement with the position above assumed. Those, who are in the habit of curing herbs, cut them when in this stage, because it is known that they contain at that time the most of that peculiar principle from which they derive their efficacy and value. The saccharine or sugar principle, which constitutes one of the chief sources of nutriment in herbage, is found in the greatest quantity at the period of bloom. It may sometimes be expedient to cut grass before it has reached this state; particularly where it falls down, and is in danger of souring or rotting. When this happens, it should be cut, whatever state it may be in, because if it remains on the ground it will spoil, and the fermentation which takes place will destroy the roots. Another great advantage in cutting grass before the seed forms, is, that the roots are not so much exhausted, and the after growth is much more vigorous.—In some parts of the country it is the practice to mow the grass and let it lie untouched on the ground, "through sunshine and shower," for several days, before it is stacked or put in the barn. It is quite common to begin Monday and continue to mow till Saturday, when with hand-rakes and horse-rakes, all turn in, take it up and stack it; and this is done, too, without much regard to the state of the weather at the time it is raked, or to what it may have been after it was cut. The appearance of the animals

which are fed on hay thus managed, is evidence enough of its worthlessness.—After grass is cut and partly dried, it ought never to be exposed to dew or wet. The best way is to spread out the mown grass evenly; as soon as the wet has dried off from the spaces between the swathes, and before the dew falls in the evening, rake it and put it in cock. Where the crop is heavy, considerable time will be gained in making, by this plan. If it is only wilted when it is put in cock, it will in a short time undergo a sweat, which will much facilitate its making when it is again opened to the sun. Many good farmers believe that it will make more in two days, if it is kept in cock twelve hours, than it will make in three days without being put in cock.

In making clover hay, we are decidedly in favour of not exposing it much to the sun after it is first wilted. We speak from experience, having practised various modes, and we are certain that it may be made with less labour, and that it is of far superior quality, when cured in cock, than in any other way. When the swathes are a little wilted, pitch them into cocks—laying it up in such a manner that it will stand the weather, which is easily done by the exercise of a little care. Examine the hay from day to day, to see how the process of curing advances, and when it seems to be so well made that with what it will dry in handling, it will do to put in the barn or stack, turn over the cocks, loosen up the bottoms a little with a fork, and proceed to load it. Clover hay thus cured, is not likely to heat in the mow or stack, and from having every leaf and head saved, will be found to be very nutritious and much relished by all animals. In fact we believe that clover hay, properly cured, will make more flesh, milk, or butter, than any other hay, pound for pound. The prejudice against clover, has arisen from the bad manner of curing it. Knocked about as it frequently is, wet and dried by turns, it loses its leaves and heads, and becomes little less than a mass of tasteless stems, which no animal will eat.—[Albany Cultivator.]

**GUANO.**—Experiments made with this powerful fertilizer of the soil, during the summer of 1844, by Mr. Andrew Shiels, an intelligent farmer, residing at Manor-Hill, near Halifax, Nova Scotia, have proved highly encouraging. On a barren-looking and hitherto unproductive field of white sand, by the use of guano, he had the promise of an abundant crop of turnips, which the grubs and grasshoppers afterwards destroyed. The guano was soaked in water twenty-four hours, in the proportion of one pound to four gallons, and the liquor sprinkled over the surface from a watering-pan. The seed was put in on the 25th July, and in three or four days after the plants made their appearance, very large and full in the leaf, and of a remarkably deep rich green.—A subsequent experiment was made upon his grass-field, after the hay was cut. He stirred thirty pounds of guano in a hoghead containing 120 gallons of water, and left it until the next evening after sundown, when he distributed it over part of his first cut grass field, and it was the only spot on a hill of six or seven acres of grass, where he could cut an after-crop.—Another experiment was made on cabbages, beets and carrots, by sprinkling the

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ground—carefully avoiding the leaves of the plants—and all of them were thriving fully equal to expectation on the 12th September.—Another opportunity of testing the invigorating principles of guano, (Mr. Shiels remarks,) was offered by a late-planted potatoe-field, the south-west quarter of which was very unprosperous, the stems being not only weak and short, but of a yellowish hue also. After a plentiful application of guano, they improved rapidly, until they became fully as luxuriant as the rest of the field, and shewed incontrovertibly that a powerful agent was at work, by the deep green leaves and rich purple blossoms they put forth—a marked alteration from their former appearance, which was perceptible at a considerable distance, and was generally noticed by passers by, who had remarked their former stunted growth, and were not aware of the cause of so great a change for the better.

**MANURE.**—Put on your land all the manure that can be scraped from your premises, or that you are entitled to from the road.—Leave not a particle in the barn-yard. It matters not how long or coarse it is, if you can plough it in. All you can get from it before another season is clear gain, for it will lose but little more under the ground with a crop over it, than exposed to the action of the sun and rains in the yard. If it cannot be used, place it in heaps and cover it two feet thick with earth, which will inhale and retain most of its enriching gases till wanted.

**MODE OF INCREASING THE POTATOE CROP.**—An English writer says, by carefully removing the buds as they appear on the potatoe vines, the crop of large ones is very much augmented. The theory is plausible, and worthy a fair trial.

**BREEDS OF SWINE.**—The best formed hog is the Berkshire.—This breed can be had of a medium, or large size, as is most desired; they weighing when full grown and fattened, from 300 to 700 lbs. They mature early; are hardy, thrifty, good breeders, and nurses; are fine in their points; will cut the best of fat pork on their sides and *clear of lean*, while their shoulders and hams have much *less fat* upon them than other breeds, and are of course more valuable for smoking; abounding, as they do, in juicy, tender, lean meat. The Berkshire will live well on grass, pumpkins, apples and roots; and fat with great avidity on corn or other grain. To all these merits they unite that of being first-rate travellers, which is a very important quality at the West, where they are obliged to drive hundreds of hogs every year a great distance to market.—*American Agriculturist.*

**FATTENING CATTLE.**—We find it common in France, and many parts of the Continent, to fat their cattle by souring the grain fed to them. They must be starved to it at first, but in a day or two they eat it freely, and afterwards, prefer it to the unfermented. They are fattened quicker and more economically by this process.

**TO PREVENT DEPREDATIONS BY HAWKS.**—One or more Guinea hens in a flock of fowls, it is said, will effectually prevent molestation from hawks.

**TO PRESERVE CORN FROM CROWS.**—Soak a few quarts of corn in whiskey, and scatter it over the field for the crows, who after partaking one such meal, and getting pretty thoroughly *corned*, will never return to it again. A crow has more sense than to get drunk a second time.

**VERMIN ON VINES.**—Charcoal is beneficial to plants in several ways—it improves the soil by attracting nitrous substances, and it raises the temperature about the plants around which it is put, since the rays of the sun are not reflected back as they are from light coloured substances. Charcoal dust is also offensive to insects and grubs, and though it may not kill them, it will drive them away. A little sifted over the plants every day or two, will prove to be as good an article as any that has been recommended for garden plants.

**TO MAKE ANTS DISAPPEAR.**—A small quantity of *green sage*, placed in the closet, will cause *red ants* to disappear.

**TO KILL LICE ON CATTLE.**—Mr. Starr, of New Jersey, informs us that scattering buckwheat flour plentifully over lousy animals, is an effectual cure for them. We presume other kinds of flour would do just as well. One of the best things we ever tried, was rubbing our stock with rancid lard, or whale, or tanner's oil. The Boston Cultivator recommends washing the animal a few times with a decoction of red-cedar bark.

**TO GUARD SHEEP FROM DOGS.**—Turn in a few active cows or young steers into the same pasture, and if dogs then approach them, they will run to the cattle for protection, who will toss the dogs and gore them to death if they persist in pursuing the sheep.

**TO PRESERVE EGGS.**—Take one bushel of quick-lime, two pounds of salt, eight ounces of cream of tartar, mix the salt with as much water as will reduce the composition to a consistency, then an egg will swim in it when put in. Eggs are said to have been thus preserved two years.—*Ellswoorth's Report.*

**TO HELP DIGESTION.**—For impaired digestion, there is nothing equal to a pudding made of potatoe starch. Make it as you would starch for clothes, using milk instead of water, and putting in eggs if you please. That is; take a spoonful and a half—less or more, as you prefer it thicker or thinner—and pour boiling milk upon it, and it is ready for use. Or, after it is thus made, add eggs and milk, and bake as you would a rice pudding, and eat with sugar and cream, or jelly, or what you like. Besides being most delicious, it is very easy of digestion, and extremely nutritious.

**TEETH.**—If you wish to preserve fine teeth, always clean them thoroughly after you have eaten your last meal at night.

**PANES OF GLASS** may be easily removed by the application of soft soap for a few hours, however hard the putty has become.

**COLD WATER** applied to a highly excited brain will have a cooling influence, and quiet the feelings. Dogs, when fighting, can thus be separated, when it is impossible for two strong men to pull them apart. A live coal of fire touched to the nose will part them very soon.

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**TO RENOVATE FEATHER BEDS.**—If feather beds smell badly, or become heavy, from want of proper preservation of the feathers, or from old age, empty them, and wash the feathers thoroughly in a tub of suds; spread them in your garret dry, and they will be as light and as good as new.

**CANDLES.**—Prepare your wicks about half the usual size, wet with spirits of turpentine, and put them into the sun until dry—then mould or dip your candles; and when thus made they will last longer and give much clearer light than when made in the old way. In fact they are nearly or quite equal to sperm in clearness of light.

**BUCKWHEAT CAKES** are less tough and not as liable to sour, when mixed with *salt-rising* instead of hop-yeast.—*Am. Almanac.*

**MAPLE SUGAR.**—Great improvements, we apprehend, might be made in the manufacture of this article. The difference in the yield of sugar from a given quantity of sap, is owing to its possessing more or less acid, which lessens the quantity of sugar and injures the quality. This acid is corrected by putting into the sap, when used, one ounce of lime water to every gallon, when it will uniformly produce half a pound of sugar to the gallon, of better quality than it would without the lime water.

**CRANBERRIES.**—Cultivated cranberries were exhibited by S. Bates, Billingham, Norfolk Co., Mass., grown on his own land. He states that "low meadow land is best for them, prepared in the first instance in the same manner as for grain. The wild cranberry is transplanted into this in rows 20 inches apart. At first they require a slight hoeing, afterwards they spread and cover the field, producing crops annually thereafter without further culture. In this condition they produce much larger and finer fruit than in their wild state, the yield being from 200 to 300 bushels per acre, worth on an average in the Boston market at least one dollar per bushel. A damp soil, or when wet predominated, has generally been considered necessary, but Mr. Bates thinks this not essential to their successful cultivation; any soil unless when inclined to bake will answer. Early in spring is the best time for transplanting."

**PHYSIOLOGICAL SIGNS OF CHARACTER.**—If the hand be broad, the feet, limbs, shoulders, and head will be broad also; in fact, the whole person will be built on the *broad* principle. This shape of body indicates *vitality*, toughness, bottom, *endurance*, like that of the Indian pony. Also length and tenacity of life. In short, a predominance of the vital apparatus, together with strong animal propensities and strong feelings, with impulsiveness and love of animal life.

A prominent nose, cheek-bones, face, &c. indicate *power*; in whatever direction it is expended. Power of muscle in those who labour. Power of intellect—the forcible, the gigantic, that carries all before it—in the professional man. *Strength* of intellect, efficiency, go with the prominent organization.

Firmness and exquisiteness of feeling, clearness and activity of intellect, and highly wrought susceptibilities go along with the

sharp organization—the sharp and prominent united capacitating their possessor for great intellectual effort, and of the harder kinds. The sharp and broad give the highest possible state of feeling.—Length of fibre, long limbs, tallness of stature, a long face, long phrenological organs, indicate great activity, of both body and mind—sprightliness and ease of motion, quickness and clearness of intellect, rapidity and correctness of perception, and generally, moral integrity and goodness; while breadth of organization oftener accompanies immorality, selfishness, sinfulness, except where this animal temperament is sanctified with the sharp, or mental.—The broad and sharp combined, indicate the highest possible order of feelings, the most acute susceptibilities, great impulsiveness, and the most exalted enjoyment, the keenest suffering. Such can become orators or actors. Their voice will be sharp and thrilling. Their eyes quick and piercing. Their speech rapid, and they are too liable to be carried away by gusts of feeling; rarely cool, and given to extremes. A sharp and prominent nose, with a long and rather spare face, indicates a love of study; a talent for authorship, a love of strong reasoning, of books, of science, of philosophy, together with *impressiveness* in everything.

So, also, given colours and qualities of the hair, accompany their respective casts and qualities of intellect and feeling. Light auburn hair always goes along with great delicacy, fineness, propriety of feeling, good taste and exquisite susceptibilities, as well as great moral purity, and intense social affections. As the hair becomes more and more red, the person's feelings become more excitable and powerful, but less contrrollable, as well as less fine and more animal. The great proportion of prisoners will be found to have very red hair, or else very black, or the two confounded in their various shades, and always coarse and stiff. Red, but fine hair indicates more softness and correctness of feelings, with, however, exceeding activity and spontaneity. Fine brown hair, with a slight inclination to curl at the end, is a most excellent sign,—indicative of highly wrought feelings, but purified and governed; great goodness, high moral feelings, virtuous predispositions, moral purity, intellectual activity and acumen; a love of literature and an excellent organization, mental and physical, but liable to overdo, and induce premature sickness and death. Coarse, stiff, black hair, indicates coarse feelings, that are powerful, but gross; together with harshness, roughness, perhaps selfishness. If the hair be a light brown, or sandy, or anywhere between a black and red hair, and also stiff and coarse, beware! The farther you keep from it the better. Fine flaxen hair, indicates a fine but good organization and mind.

Closely allied to this is the colour and texture of the skin, which coincides in character with that of the hair, and also in its various indications of character. Thus a coarse, dark skin, indicates selfishness, but power—strength, but a want of refinement. A fine, light skin is a good sign—indicating fine feelings, with purity of soul. If quite florid, its possessor may sin when strongly tempted, and if bad at all will be *most* bad.

Similar remarks appertain to the colour of the eyes. But, we

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their colour coincides with that of the hair and skin, what has been already said of them is also true of these. A quick, active, rolling, restless, piercing eye indicates great activity and penetration of intellect, a burning fervour of desire, a tendency to excess, a want of coolness and judgment. A sleepy eye indicates a dull mind.—But the eye often varies, according to the excitement labor'd under. So that it is not a certain index of character.

The motions of the body also bespeak the operations of the mind. If a man walk slowly, heavily, lazily, as though it was hard work, all up-hill, and loaded down at that, be sure that he will drag along so through life. Still, if a man walk rather slowly, but with a force and strength, as though he would walk through whatever opposed; he will be slow to rouse, but, once fully engaged, he will make a full team. If a man walk fast, light of foot, sprightly, he is a lively, stirring, wide-awake, thorough going, business man. If a man walk along limberly but forcibly, as if his joints were well oiled and limber, taking long steps and stepping fast, walking right straight along as though he would walk through a brick wall, that man is a smasher at whatever he undertakes, and will be a high pressure steam-boat, with an engine to let besides. If he move awkwardly but easily, in body, so will he in mind.—impressive, forcible, logical, conclusive, a little odd in expression, but to the point, every word in its place, and sometimes elegant. A light, mincing, dodging, affected walk, fanciful, would-be polite and pretty, indicates effeminacy of character; shallowness of brain, that may bow gracefully to the ladies, and do to cut a cotillion, but will never set the world on fire, or live after he is dead. A dandy, mincing walker, better hold fast to mother's apron strings. His upper story is down cellar. So, of other kinds of walk. So, of the way, in general, that persons move. Graceful motions of body indicate a graceful, polished, refined mind. Awkward, outlandish movements, indicate the opposite qualities.

On this principle it is, that those who eat fast, work fast; who work slowly, eat slowly; who walk slowly, feel slowly, think slowly; live half asleep, and die without knowing it; because they were so nearly dead before. A quick or slow, feeble or powerful, flurried or distinct pulse; gives similar indications of character and talents. So, in short, does the whole man. The doctrine, the law, is this: As is one part of the system, so are all the parts.—And, as they are, that is, as is the body, so is the mind. If the nose be sharp, the teeth will be sharp (and consequently liable to early decay.) all the bones and features sharp, the phrenological organs sharp, and therefore active—the feelings sharp,—the whole person built on the sharp principle. Hence it is, that a sharp nose indicates a scold. But it equally indicates tender sympathies and fine feelings. And so of all other kindred signs.—[Phrenological Almanack and Physiological Guide.

**PREVENTION OF INFECTION FROM TYPHUS FEVER.**—Dr. J. C. Smith obtained £5,000 from Parliament for the following receipt: Take six drachms of powdered nitre (salpêtre) and six drachms of sulphuric acid (oil of vitriol) mix them in a tea cup. By adding one drachm of the oil at a time, a copious discharge of nitrous

acid gas will take place. The cup to be placed, during the preparation, on a hot hearth, or plate of heated iron, and the mixture stirred with a tobacco pipe. The quantity of gas may be regulated by lessening or increasing the quantity of ingredients. The above is for a moderate-sized room; half the quantity would be sufficient for a small room. Avoid, as much as possible, breathing the gas when it first rises from the vessel. No injury to the lungs will happen when the air is impregnated with the gas, which is called nitrous acid gas, and it cannot be too widely known that it possesses the property of preventing its spread.

**USEFUL REMEDIES IN CASES OF SUSPENDED ANIMATION, FIRE, &c.**  
 —Persons apparently drowned, or in whom animation is suspended, should be laid in warm blankets, with the head raised, and hot bricks or bottles of hot water, applied to the soles of the feet, hands, stomach and armpits; the body and limbs being well rubbed with the hands or warm flannels. The lungs should be inflated by blowing into one nostril, while the other and the mouth are stopped, and action given to the stomach as in breathing; and this should be continued first through one nostril and then through the other, till animation re-appears. A glister, made of salt and some mustard, with warm water, should be administered. Harts-horn or salts may also be applied now and then to the nostrils.— On recovery, some weak cordial should be given and the person put into a warm bed.

In cases of strangulation or apoplexy, bleeding should be immediately adopted, and the legs put into warm water.

In cases of intoxication or other poisoning, vomiting should be promoted, and an emetic, or the stomach-pump, administered.

In cases of persons frozen, friction with snow or cold water is used.

When the clothes of females take fire, the effectual remedy is to lie down and smother the flames when down.—*Phillips' Facts.*

Observations. 1.—The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter are to *midnight*, the fairer will be the weather during the seven days following. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

2.—The nearer to *mid-day* or *noon* the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

3.—The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, that is, from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

4.—Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

5.—To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the wind is concerned, the observer should be within sight of a good vane, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.

## LIGHT HOUSES.

*Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.*—John Ward, senior, R. W. Crookshank, John Ward, jr., L. Donaldson, Esq'r, Hon. W. F. W. Owen, I. Woodward, Esquire, Honorable Thomas Wyer, Hon. James Allanshaw, and John Wilson, Esquire.—Isaac Woodward, Esquire, Secretary to the Board in Saint John.

Lauchlan Donaldson, Esquire, Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New-Brunswick; and also of those belonging to Nova-Scotia, which are partly supported by this Province.—Office in the Commercial Bank Building, St. John.

*Cape Sable Seal Island Light.*—The first Light on approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of Seal Island. This is a plain white Light—elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous Rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about two miles S.S.W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this Rock and the Island there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

*Brier Island Light.*—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof.—A plain white Light.

*Digby Gut Light.*—The next Light on the coast of Nova-Scotia is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The Coast is very bold, and not indented; the Light is, therefore, chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin.—A white Light.

*Gannet Rock Light.*—This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W. 21 miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about 20 miles.

*Bearings from the Gannet Rock Light House—*

- To the Old Proprietor, which dries at  $\frac{1}{2}$  ebb (very dangerous), E. by N.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N. 7 miles.
- Black Rock (always above water 25 feet), off White Head, N. E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E.
- South West Head of Grand Manan, N.W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N.
- Northernmost of the Murr Ledges (dry at  $\frac{1}{2}$  ebb), N. W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W.
- Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge (always above water), S.W. by W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W.
- Seal Island Lights (distant about thirteen miles) W. by N.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N.

*Nota.*—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous Rocks and Shoals—

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many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westward, about eight miles, lies a dangerous Breaker, called the *Roaring Bull*. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open. The red glass having been removed from the Lantern, there is now a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark, and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

*Machias Seal Island Lights.*—There are two fixed white Lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station they will be immediately distinguished from all other Lights upon the Coast, (British or American.) Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz.

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Mary's), E. S. E. easterly.

“ Gannet Rock Light, E. by S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S. 13 miles.

“ Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N.

“ Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E.

“ N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

“ Little River Head, N. by W.

“ Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing in to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights into one, as they will be then not more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

*Head Harbour Light.*—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan, and the plain white Light (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North-East extremity of Campo-Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy;—it enables vessels also at all times, to enter Head Harbour. It is a fixed white Light. The building is painted white, with a Red Cross on it.

*Point Le Preau Lights.*—Upon this projecting head land two Lights are placed, one above the other in the same House, and distant twenty-eight feet.—Both Lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

*Partridge Island Light.*—This Light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of St. John, having been established about fifty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white Light, and the Light House is painted Red and White in vertical stripes.

*Beacon Light.*—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this

Tower a Light is established, which is eminently useful to the Coasting Trade of St. John, and to all other vessels having Pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the Harbour at all hours of the night.—A fixed white Light. The House is painted white and black, in stripes vertically.

**Quaco Light.**—A revolving white Light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This Light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

**Capo Enrage Light.**—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N.S. The House is about 120 feet above the tide mark, and is painted white.—A plain white Light.

SHOAL NEAR SAMBRO LIGHT HOUSE.

A shoal was discovered on the 20th May, 1844, near Sambro Light House, (Halifax, Nova-Scotia,) by the Hon. Capt. Owen, R. N., in H. M. Surveying Steamer Columbia, which is not laid down in the charts. The C. touched on it at low water, her draught at the time being 12 feet 6 inches. The bearing and observations immediately after, then in eight fathoms water, were as follows:—Black Rock or Western Sisters  $\frac{1}{2}$  East Magnetic half a mile by calculation. Summit of light house to water line the angle is 00.46, assuming the summit to be 132 feet above the water line, (as was computed by measure,) the distance was 1.6 (or 10,000 feet) bearing South West Magnetic.

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## SIGNALS

*Made at Partridge Island, on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John.*

- One Ball, close, for one square-rigged vessel.
- One Ball, half hoisted, for two square-rigged vessels.
- Two Balls, close, for three square-rigged vessels.
- Two Balls, separated, for four square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, of any colour, for five square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, under a Ball, for six square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, over a Ball, half hoisted, for seven square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, under two Balls, close, for eight square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, between two Balls, separate, for nine square-rigged vessels.
- A Flag, of any colour, for ten or more vessels.

[The above are hoisted at the East or West yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessels first appear in, and when the rig can be made out, the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast head.]



- A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron
  - with a red Pendant over, for a two-decker.
  - with a blue Pendant over, for a frigate.
  - with a white ditto, for a small armed vessel.
- A blue pendant, for a merchant ship or barque.
- A red ditto, for a merchant brig or brigantine.
- A white and blue ditto, for a foreign square-rigged vessel.
- A white ditto, without a ball, for a topsail schooner or sloop.
- A flag, blue and white horizontally, a neutral fleet.
- A pendant, white and blue, a neutral man-of-war.
- A blue flag, a neutral merchant ship.
- A red, white and blue flag, an enemy's fleet.
- A red, white and blue pendant, an enemy's man of war.
- A Union Jack, over neutral or enemy's signals, the vessel is detained or a prize.
- A white flag over any signal, the vessel bears a flag of truce.
- A red flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Digby.
- A blue flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.
- A red flag with a white square, for a steamboat from Boston.
- A Ball at the mast-head, vessel is on shore or in distress;—should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In thick weather, a gun will be fired at Partridge Island, in answer to each gun heard at sea. There is a Fog Bell on the Island, which is rung in foggy weather, to warn vessels of their approach to the shore.



When a vessel requires a Pilot, her descriptive pendant will be shown at the yard-arm, instead of a ball.
