-The salmon canning trade was a profitable one in British Columbia last year, The 43 canneries operating in that province put up 576,584 cases, containing 27,-676,000 pound cans of salmon.

-The production of crude petroleum and. of refined reduced to its equivalent in crude in this country during 1893 was 1,064,855 barrels as against 1,012,73,9 barrels in 1892. This means an increase of 52,126 barrels in the year's output.

-The Patrons of Industry are commenccing to make their weight felt in the political balance. There are thirty Patron candidates already in the field for the Ontario Legislature and nineteen for the Dominion Parliament. This is not pleasant for the machine politicians.

-The American merchants and owners. interested in the Newfoundland herring fleet have held a meeting, at which an agreement to sell herring only by weight in future was presented for signature. Nearly all those present signed or announced their intention to do so.

There are licensed to sell liquor in this city 147 hotels, 331 restaurants, 473 retail shops, 104 bottlers, 11 clubs, 7. steamboats and 2 druggists. Outside the city limits are 192 hotels and 120 retails shops. No one evidently need suffer for want of liquor in Montreal.

-The Intercolonial Railway is having a hard time keeping its tracks open in New, Brunswick this winter, as more snow has fallen already than fell during the whole of the previous one. The snow, too, has mo't packed, and drifts back over the rails as soon as the enow plow is past.





ing from ten to fifteen million bushels of wheat in the Chicago market which shows an average loss of about 8 cents per bushel. It is the dread of this wheat being suddenly dumped upon the market that is rendering western operators so nervous.

The Whitney syndicate have increased the coal exports from Cape Breton by, 100,000 tons. Had it not been for the burning of the pithead of the International mine and the bursting of the boilers at the Victoria it is believed the increase would have reached nearly 250,000 tons.

—The new issue of debentures to the extent of \$2,350,660 by the city of Hamilton has been secured by the Bank of Hamilton for \$2,274,000, or a little over 96 3-4 per cent. The tender of the Bank of Commerce was \$2,262,000, and that of the Bank of Montreal \$2,261,875.

-A company is being incorporated in the Northwest to develop the Souris coal region. It is stated that an 8 foot vein of solid clean coal is in sight, and that; if the work is systematically and scientifically garried on, further deposits are certain to be discovered.

—Mr. Wm. McLaren, son of the late manuger of the Royal Insurance Co., has been appointed assistant secretary at the head office of that company at Liverpool, which makes him third officer in rank. It is believed that the position of sub-manager will be filled by one of the present officers of the London Assurance Co.

-The trial of the boy, Fred. Paquette, whose arrest for ectting fire to the barns of Adolphe Martin, at Maidstone, was chronicled in our last issue, bids fair to be sensational. The London Mutual Insurance Co., who are working up the case, say that he has made a full confession and that a number of other arrests will follow.

-Fraudilent turpentine barrels, made by unscrupulous firms expressly to deceive the gaugers, have become so common in the South that Northern buyers are concepting to purchase turpentine by weight only in future. Some of these barrels defraud the gonsumer to the extent of two or three gallons.

-David Bull, general storekeeper of Murray Harbor South, P.E.I., has assigned. He

did his best, but having no experience, did not know how to run his business properly. He owes \$3,000 and has succeeded in settling with his creditors at 30 cents in the dollar preparatory to going out of business.

The executors of the late Miss Eliza White, of Toronto, will have some difficulty in complying with the provisions of her will. She has left \$400 to the poor saints of India, or to the poor laborers of Canada, whichever may be most deserving, and \$500 to be distributed as "the Lord may direct."

-The Ontario members of the defunct People's Five Year Benefit Order have received word that they will get back 86% per cent. of what they paid in. The reremainder has gone into the pockets of the officials. After this lesson they will probably place their insurance with reliable companies and leave these benefit orders severely alone.

—An injunction has been granted against Hughlitt & McIntyre, of Victoria, B.C., forbidding them to bring any more logs down from Cowichan lake until those which have been allowed to accumulate there have been removed, and ordering them to proceed to do so at once, under supervision of a Government official.

-Mr. John Cameron, the jailer at Woodstock is credited with saying that the cost of keeping the prisoners in the Oxford county jail is only 1.32 cents per day. Our local prison authorities would like to know how he manages to do it, for in this city it costs about 19 cents per day. What is the Woodstock prisoner fed upon?

-The New York Chamber of Commerce has passed unanimously a resolution endorsing the suggestion of the Secretary of the Treasury that authority be given him by Congress to issue \$200,000,000 of short-time bonds in such small amounts as will permit all classes to invest their savings in a Government security.

—As we go to press a meeting is being held in this city of the creditors of the wholesale dry-goods firm of Daniel & Boyd, Ltd. of St. John, N.B. A trust deed has been executed and the trustee, Mr. H. B. Hampsington, will be guided by the wishes of the creditors in winding up the estate, There are no preferences.

He is believed to be now across the lines.

-Under the agreement entered into with the British civil service, the North British and Mercantile Insurance Co. has issued 12,000 life policies to civil servants, insuring \$16,600,000. The Imperial Assurance Co., which secured the fire and burglary insurance or the department, has issued policies to the extent of \$3,750,000.

The season just closed has been one of the busiest ever known at the deal shipping port of Parrsboro', N.S., the total quantity shipped being 40,792,496 superficial feet. Next year's shipments will probably fall much under this; for there are very few deals now on hand there, and lumbermen estimate that there will only be a two-thirds cut this winter.

—During the past year the New York Life Insurance Co. issued 82,000 policies, insuring over \$223,000,000, an amount of new business which exceeds by \$50,000,\(\gamma\)
000 the amount in any year of the company's history. This looks as if President McCall is even more successful in promoting the advancement of the company than his predecessor, the late Mr. Geo. Beers.

—Judge Muir of Hamilton, has granted a judgment in Canada on the basis of a judgment cittined in England by Hollander & Cremetts against F. Foulkes, of London, Ont. for \$1,300 for pictures sold to him. The judge held that the English judgment was binding until it was shown that the court there had been imposed upon

Twenty-eight deaths and over 109 cases of serious injury are reported from football in England during the past year. During the last week of the season there were recorded three broken legs, one broken shoulder, one case of concussion of the spine, and two deaths from kicks in the abdomen. -The returns of the Finance Department at Oftawa for the first six months of the present fiscal year show that the revenue has fallen \$243,315 under that of the corresponding period of 1892, while the expenditure has only decreased by \$4,847. largely to the firm stand taken by the bankers and merchants of this city against the machinations of the small but compact combinations of municipal politicians who are now dominant at the City Hall.

What the citizens have secured by the new legislation may be briefly summarized as follows. The number of aldermen is reduced to two for each ward, and the effort to have the mayor elected by the council instead of by the people is defeated. The borrowing powers of the city are restricted to 15 per cent on \$160,000,000, for the next four years, and after that to 15 per cent on the value of the taxable property only. The city is permitted to contribute towards the erection of an east end depot by the Canadian Pacific but is forbidden to raise the funds necessary to do so by means of a special loan of \$1,000,000, outside of the borrowing powers already specified. The opening of St. Lambert Hill to the river and the widening, of Guy street is allowed on condition that the city pay the whole of the cost of the first, and half the cost of the second, and some important alterations in the law of ex-, propriation are made.

These enactments represent a distinct step in the direction of better and cheaper municipal Government. The reduction in the number of aldermen will commend itself to every citizen. It means the elimination of so many more hangers on to the municipal treasury; since the first step taken by every alderman after his election is to semre positions in the civic employ for nis most prominent friends and supporters. The fate of these suddenly orphaned "heelers" is of course worthy of commiseration. Some of them may even be compelled to work. But the benefit to the honest taxpayers more than offsets this, and in dealing with municipal matters there is no room for sentiment.

The over-riding of the clause, favored by the Legislative Council, placing the election of the Mayor in the hands of the aldermen instead of in those of the people, is also a step in the right direction. Had the clause remained as it stood the dominant clique at the City Hall would have controlled the mayoralty, and the anomaly would have been presented of the chief citizen of Montreal being chosen by a few municipal politicians instead of by the suffrages of his fellow citizens over whose interests he is presumed to watch.

The restrictions upon the borrowing powers of the city will also commend themselves to every taxpayer. For the first four years the cityl is permit ted to borrow to the extent of 15 per cent upon \$160,000,000, which may be taken to represent the value of the whole of the real estate within its borders. After that, it can borrow to the same extent only upon the value of the actually taxable property of Montreal, and not upon that which is exempted from taxation. In addition to this it is refused authority to raise a special loan of \$1,000,000 for the purpose of contributing towards the cost of a new depot to be built by the Canadian Pacific at the east end. It can contribute, if it likes-but it must do so out of its ordinary loans-for the Quebec Legislgature clearly recognised the fact that the contribution was only intended to make certain aldermen sure of re-election and to furnish political capital for use in the mayoralty contest.

The amendments to the law of expropriation are also in the direction of greater economy. The city will be permitted in future to tender to proprietors of expropriated properties the amount estimated as its value. If this be refused, and the resulting award does not exceed the value offered, the

proprietor contesting must pay the cost of all proceedings. The value of this clause in deterring litigious or grasping proprietors from taking out suits, and the consequent saving in law costs to the city, can easily be calculated. Another important clause, too, is that permitting streets to be widened, block by block, on petition of the proprietors; the city paying half the cost. This will prevent large corporations from blocking the widening of a whole street in order to secure better terms from the city, and will give those who are ready to pay their share of the cost the civic improvements they need at

Altogether, then, the recent amendments to civic legislation are such as will meet the approval of the taxpayers. They are in the direction of greater economy and better municipal Government. They have been bitterly opposed throughout by what may be termed the kivic "machine," thanks to the firmness and vigilance of our bankers and merchants, they have been carried triumphantly. They will strengthen the hands of the honest men in the council and help forward the ambition of all good citizens of Montreal to make the metropolis the best governed, as well as the largest, city in the Dominion. We need more legislation of a similar character.

#### A TYPICAL CASE.

The case with which any shrewd man, with a fair amount of business tact and the reputation of being a "hustler," can secure credit in this city—no matter whether he possesses any financial responsibility or not—is strikingly exemplified in the brief careen of E. Lepage & Co, who started in the dry goods and millinery trade on St. Lawerence Main Street not quite two years ago, practically without a dol-

lar and who have just failed for \$32,000.

In the early part of 1892 a wholesale millinery house became dissatisfied at the slow progress which Mr. W. B. Craig who was conducting one of their supply accounts in this city, was making, and as they were his only creditors they offered to take over the stock and pay him \$250 in each to step down and out. They fixed upon Lepage, one of their employes, and a sharp hustling salesman, to take his place, and turned the stock (which was valued at \$10,000) over to him for \$4,000, payable in two years. Later on they also bought for him the stock of B. Harkins for \$12,-000 at 65 cents in the dollar, also payable in two years. They had no security, and ranked only as ordinary creditors, except that two-thirds of the amount of the insurance on the stock was made out in their favor.

Lepage, who registered in March 1892

as E. Lepage & Co, started in to sell with a will. In fact he sold at such low prices that the trade began to speculate as to how long he would last. Gradually he ran behind, his liabilities began to pile up, and his suppliers commenced to feel anxious. But Lepage spoke fairly, flashed his diamonds before their eyes, and assured every one that he was doing famously. Last June a fire broke out in his store, and the loss was adjusted at \$10,000. Shortly after this he called his creditors together, and in the following. September offered a composition of 50 cents in the dollar, payable in 2, 4 and 6 months, which was accepted; but with the proviso that, if the whole of it was not paid, the agreement was to become void, and the creditors were to rank again for the full amount of their claims. Had the insurance money been handed over, this composition might have been met; but it was not. One of the companies interested to the extent of \$4,000-the Phoenix of Hartford-contested the claim on the ground of gross negligence upon the part of Lepage, and the other companies refused to pay pending a settlement with them. In fact only one of the others, the Waterloo Mutual, could be relled upon to pay at all; the balance of the insurance being placed with American companies across the lime. In consequence Lepage was only able to meet one instalment of \$1,800 of the composition, and as his landlord was now commencing to make trouble about the rent, which was about \$700 behind, it was thought better that he should make an assign-

ment and Caldwell, Tait, & Wilks were put in charge of the estate. The liabilities are placed at \$32,000, and the principal creditors are:—D. McCall & Co, \$20,691, A. Racine & Co \$1,731, Liddell Lesperance & Co, 1,473 and G. Bourgouin & Co, \$1,338. The assets are not yet known, but it is hoped that the insurance money will eventually

come into the estate. An attempt at compromise is being made with the Phoenix on the basis, it is said, of 75 per cent of the claim, and probably the Waterloo Mutual will be arranged with on similar terms. This will enable the assignces to make a better showing to the creditors.

#### A TARIFF ANOMALY.

The table subjoined affords a plain exhibit of the burden imposed by provisions of the tariff on a class of goods largely imported to Canada by our clothing manufacturers, and this notwithstanding the excessive duty upon them. It is questionable if even a still heavier duty would have the effects of prohibiting the use of these goods by the masses of the people; and when we consider that there are only two mills in the Dominion in which they are manufactured and that these mills employ barely two hundred hands in all, it may be doubted whether the percentages indicated are consistent with the duties of a paternal Government-one having in view-The greatest good to the greatest number. Here surely is room for improvement, a reform which the voice of the people practically as a whole will clamor forwill endorse—a reform which removes the load from the multitude of consumers or wearers, and lightens the burden by an equitable distribution. The table speaks for itself with unmistakeable emphasis, and we commend it to the consideration of those who owe to the people whom they represent that solicitude for their welfare which has always been supposed to be their chief guide. The figures in the table are taken from an order placed by a large importing house in this city for the Fall trade of 1894:

The column-"Per cent of duty on cost"-affords a striking example of what has been urged concerning the class of goods worn by the masses of people. The man who wears the article of cloth which costs 29 cents a yard in England pays a duty of 72 per cent on cost, while he who wears the finer article, costing \$1.89 pays a duty of only 28 per cent! In the case of Naps, the article that costs 28 cents in England pays a duty of 75 per cent on cost while the finer article, costing \$1.84 pays only 33 per cent i Finally taking the articles worn by the female half of our population, it will be seen that Serge Cloaking which costs 41 cents a yard in England (the cheap-

est grade), pays a duty of 58 per cent, while the luxurious article, costing \$1.26 there pays a duty only of 38 per cent. Surely there is some room for improvement in these premises, and we commend the matter to the careful consideration of our worthy legislators at Ottawa.

One of the houses which uses the lower grades of cloth so burdensomely taxed, imports somewhere about \$150,000 to \$200,000 worth every year. This alone, at 70 per cent amounts to about \$122,500 which the masses of the people have to contirbute toward the support of the 200 employes above mentioned.

Current Season;

NEWSPAPER INDUSTRY AND ITS EF-FECTS ON TRADE.

It is related of the late Lord Reaconsfield that he was accosted one day, during a period of warlike excitement, by a high official who propounded the question, "What is the news from France, this morning, my lord?" This was going to the fountain head of knowledge, to the man who was chiefly instrumental at that time in making the news of Europe. The reply of the wily old statesman was characteristic. Said he, "I really don't know, I have not read the papers."

Just now the inspiration that comes to us from the press is more depressing cheering. Lengthy reports of failures and financial cyclones, have not contributed to the general stability and to that confidence, one with another, which is the basis of business operations. This is always a dull season of the year, but there is to be noted an increasing tendency, especially among those of an over active disposition, to fume and fret, instead of taking that relaxation, which properly belongs to midwinter. The citizen of the United States is an inveterate newspaper reader, and is wildly ridiculed on that account by other nations, by none more so than by the interesting natives of the Flowery Kingdom. In Canada, likewise, the newspaper is the sole literary bill of fare in many homes and it is not at all improbable that business is, to-day, looked upon as more uncertain and risky than it really is, because of the great industry displayed all over the continent, in gathering news. In these days, any man, or any business, over prosperous, or particularly unsuccessful, cannot escape notice in the papers, while business men who are making money moderately, or not losing it, are not noticed. Still such people constitute the majority of our population, the others are the exceptions. The escapades, trial and conviction of a criminal furnish material for columns of so-called news. Fortunately men who observe the laws are still largely in the majority and they escape notice of any kind. These reports tend to poison the moral atmosphere by making the world seem worse than it is. Certain journals appear to be in active rivalry as to which shall publish the most horrifying, misleading and sensational reports about everything that happens, without the least regard to the effect on business, or family relations. This is particularly true of some United States publica-

tions, unfortunately too largely read in Canada. The neglect of higher literature is a mistake and has long been a subject for regret with men of letters. The incessant reading of the hurriedly gathered news of the day leaves no time, and perhaps slight inplination for anything better. Without time to verify half what is printed, it is not difficult to explain the sudden cloud of depression which settled down over the United States, last year, its millions of newspaper readers being daily regaled with columns of gloomy matter detailing failures and rumors of failure-particulars which would never have been known, except to the parties immediately concerned, in olden times, before the newspaper development of to-day. Like the good ship which reaches lits haven in safety; the thousands of solid men, who hold their own, are scarcely reported, if at all, but an occasional business wreck, and it may be a "plunger" meeting his deserved fate, is given in such details as to create a false impression as to its importance. Following a period of confidence, and business activity, a feeling of anrest, and depression, selzed ' the public mind which has scarcely had a parallel in modern times, and the responsibility for this rests to a large, extent on the authors of alarmist and unguarded reports. The natural and industrial resources of North America are, in reality, unimpaired and things may be expected to speedily right themselves, so soon as the tariff changes in the United States and Canada are anmounced. Business may be quiet in the meantime but there is no occasion for despondency.

#### CONSUMPTION OF JAPAN TEA.

The opening up of direct communi. cation with Japan, by means of our transcontinental railway and lines of steamers on the Pacific ocean, has probably had little to do with the large use of Japan tea in Canada The taste was acquired beforehand and would not likely be affected by the knowledge of the fact that the tea came entirely through Canadian territory, instead of by way of the United States, except so far as the factor of cheapened cost may have acted as some stimulus. "Birds nests" and other Chinese wonders have not yet appeared on our tables, although Canadian enterprise has made China a much closer neighbor than heretofore. In the United States, coffee is the standard beverage but, in spite of a greater use of black teas in the

cities, Japan tea promises to retain its hold in the Dominion, provided always that quality is not allowed to deterlorate, as was the case some years ago with regard to certain China teas. Both Canada and Japan appear to think that reputation for quality of products is worth something, in trade, and a large extension of business between the two countries seems likely. Our imports of Japan tea for the season 1891-92 were exceptionally large, 10,269, 635 pounds, and reaching have declined since to the more normal level of about 6 1-2 pounds. On the whole. the figures show a steady growth, We append the figures of the exports from the 1st May, in each year, to a recent date, taking the season of 1887-8 as a comparision. -

#### THE EXCISE RETURNS.

If the relative prosperity of the country can be safely judged by the increase or decrease in the inland revenue returns, the year 1893 was a fairly prosperous one for Canada; for the revenue from these sources showed an increment of \$443,704. But, unfortunately, \$419,-790 of this increase was derived from the enlarged production and consumption of spirits and tobacco, which are by no means accurate standards by which to judge of the advancement of a country. Such increases often take place during depressions in other lines of manufacture and are as frequently due to the increased consumption by a number of idle men rendered desperate by want of work, as they are to an improved condition of the nation's industries. But in the present case we may fairly infer that they are due to the latter cause; for the year has been a fairly profitable one from an

many people have so many distractions on hand as to leave little time for wrangling.

A cursory examination of the list reveals some methods of business to which our readers are probably entire strangers. What shall be said of a case in which the 'defendant" has amassed nabilities of several times his actual debts, doubtless for the purpose of a settlement at a small percentage of the dollar? or of another who, in anticipation of trouble, secures as stool-pigeon some one who has managed to open a small account with a somewhat perverse branch bank manager, and by a series of shrewd manipulations "works the oracle for him? We may refer to this subject again; but it is not too much to say that there are at this moment rife in Montreal methods of obtaining money -more or less temporarily successfulthat could not have been dreamt of by the most imaginative city lawyer of a quarter of a century ago.

This side-show business must not, however, he taken as a general index to the situation. Although trade is rather quiet, our merchants and manufacturers, or rather all those among them who confined their efforts to their legitimate business-who were not carrying heavy loads-seem to have done fairly well during the year. Certainly the lamentable state of affairs reported as existing in the neighboring republic, finds no parallel in Canada at present. It behooves every business man however to take heed to his steps, for although we may not witness many serious troubles, the outlook for the next few months is not as bright as we have seen it at corresponding periods of former years.

#### THE FRUIT MARKET.

The fruit sales were poorly attended this week, most buyers being fully stocked for their holiday requirements. This table shows that during the year Bank of Montreal stock fluctuated 82 points, the other banks varying from 7 to 28 points according to the freedoms with which they were dealt in; the banks least chosen for speculative purposes showing the steadiest values. This table shows that only three stocks, and one of them the most easily mani-

pulated in the market, show higher values at the close than at the beginning of the year. Every other is in a worse position to day than it was last January, and some have lost as much as 100 points. Of course in the case of Street Railway, Reyal Electric, and Bell Telephone stocks, the issues of new stock during the year are responsible for a good deal of the decline, but the severe fall in industrial stocks shows that the depression which has rendered capital so timid of investment in the United States has not been without its effect here. Montreal Cotton Co.'s stock has fallen from 138 to 105, Colored Cotton Co.'s stock from 108 to 45, and Dominion Cotton Co.'s stock from 135 3-4 to 98. The one solitary exception is the stock of the Merchants Manufacturing Co., which close: 5 points higher than a year ago. It is little wonder that so many operators have been "wiped out" during the year. The public almost invaeiably operate for a rise. There are very few that venture to sell short in the face of a falling market, except the professional speculators of the "street." Even these did not expect the fall in values to be so severe and continuous as it eventually proved to be. As a result the expert and the tyro alike dropped money, and the year 1893 will be marked with a black stone as a year in which only an exceptionally fortunate few can congratulate themselves on making money in stocks, or on their investments being worth to day the money they paid for them.

#### WAREHOUSE RECEIPTS.

The law lords of the Privy Council have just given an important decision affirming the right of the Canadian parliament to legislate in banking transactions, upholding the validity of warehouse receipts, and deciding that the lending of money by a bank upon the security of documents representing goods, is perfectly legitimate The circumstances of the case which has resulted in this decision are as follows:

In 1888 Christie, Kerr & Co., number dealers of Brantford, Ont., entered into an agreement with Mr. Peter Christie, whereby he agreed to advance them money on receiving a lieu upon all the timber manufactured by the firm as security. The firm then granted themselves warehouse receipts, which they endorsed over to him-In return he gave them promissory notes which he discounted in the Federal Bank endorsing over the warehouse receipts, in his turn, to the bank as security. When the advances thus made by the Federal Bank had reached \$50,000, that institution went into liquidation, and in order to meet the demands of the liquidator the senior partner of the firm appealed to the Union Bank for assistance, and they granted him \$52,000 on the security of notes given and endorsed, with the warehouse receipts as collateral.

In 1889 Christie, Kerr & Co. failed, and the Union Bank promptly took possession of the timberr covered by their warehouse receipts. This the creditors, in the name of the trustee of the insolvent estate, contested on the ground that the provisions of the Bank Act rendered the

#### A RUN GN A GROCERY.

Runs upon banks one has read of only too frequently during the past year; but a run upon a grocery is a novelty that will interest business men from the curious circumstances under which it originated, and the unanticipated nature of its result.

The run in question was upon the store belonging to the Washington Red Cedar Shingle Co., of Puget Sound, and was principally due to the artfulness of a smart commercial traveller representing a grocery house of Victoria, B. C. It The was brought shout in this way. saw-filer of the mill had a row with the foreman and threw up his job in a passion. He wanted his pay right away. The foreman reirsed to give it him until the regular pay day. Thereupon the filer obtained an attachment upon the shingles of the company. This was the traveller's opportunity. He pointed out to the men that pay day was still far distant and that the best way that the employes could secure themselves from the consequences of a crash was to take their pay out in groceries at the company's store as quickly as they knew how.

Then the run begun. The clerk, who was dozing behind the counter, was suddenly awakened by a rush of employes demanding groceries. Soon it became apparent that he could not tie up packages fast enough, and he told the men to help themselves while he charged up the groceries against them. When they were through the store looked like the last act of a cyclone, and the clerk was sitting on the counter laughing long and loud.

Then came in the astute traveller and asked mildly if anything was wanted, The clerk pointed to the empty shelves and the traveller booked the largest order that he had taken on the trip with a quiet chuckly. Next day the filer's wages were paid, the mill went on as usual, and the employes realized that the traveller had been a trifle too smart for them. The company are hoping for another similar run, and the employes are hoping that they can lay their hands just once on that traveller. In the meantime they have hired a Chinaman to kick them every time they realize that instead of their wages they have a cellar full of dried apples, pickles, and canned goods, it will take them months that to get rid of. It will be some time before there is another run on that gro-

#### TWO INSURANCE WILD-CATS GONE.

Two wild-cut insurance companies have passed quietly out of existence, leaving those foolish enough to go to them for cheap indemnity in the lurch. The National Insurance Co. of Weston was one them. It pretended to keep its assets in valuable, mining lands, 80,000 acres of which it claimed to possess. Early. last month its secretary, G. S. Taylor, absconded, and it was discovered that the title deeds to the lands were forgeries, and that losses to the extent of \$60,000 were unpaid. Taylor is said to have collected \$15,000 in premiums during the brief career of the company.

The second was the Knox Mutual Fire

Insurance Co. of Indiana. In this case the president and treasurer, Geo. A. Scott, and the secretary, Andrews, are both missing, and so are \$20,000 of the company's funds. The books cannot be found either, end the extent of the frauds upon the dupes foolish enough to insure in it cannot be ascertained until they are. Of the \$20,092 in cash, and \$100,000 in available notes, which the company claimed to possess, not one dollar can be found now, and it looks as if the policy holders would lose every cent they paid into it.

#### DEATHS IN LARGE CITIES.

London, Eng. is still the healthiest city in the world, in spite of its large foreign colony. The following statistics compiled for the first half of the year 1893 by the late Secretary Carter show the mortality in various cities of this country and Europe having a population of more than one million:

#### CATTLEMEN MEET.

The annual meeting of the Dominion Live Stock Association took place in Toronto last Friday. There was a very large attendance of members. In the absence of the President, Ald. Frankland, Mr. T. O. Robson occupied the chair. After a discussion upon the sub> ject of the desirability of a change in the present form of railway shipping bills the following officers were elected for the present year : President, T. O. Robson, St. Mary's, Ont.; first vice-president, Thomas Crawford, Toronto: second vice-pre dent, C. Coughlin, Montreal; treasurer, A. J. Thompson, Toronto; secretary, A. Gilchrist, Montreal; executive committee, R. Bickerdike, Montreal; W. J. McClelland, Toronto; H. Bracken, Toronto; R. Stroud, Hamilton; W. Crealock, Tionto; J. Featherstone, Port Credit fint.; J. J. Dunn, Toronto; D. Hamilton, 1 crest, Ont.; W. W. Craig, Montreal; John Crowe, Montreal; A. Hawlings, Forest, Ont. A committee consisting of Messes. Dunn, Featherstone, Bickerdike and Coughlin was appointed to attend the coming session at Ottawa to try and persuade the Government to make some accangement whereby Canaadian cattle might be shipped for Britain from American ports.

#### RECENT ELEVATORS.

No modern business block or public building nowadays is considered complete without an elevator or hoist. Miller Brothers and Toms, of this city, who can claim to run the larest machinist establishment probably in Canada, have been kept quite busy of late years in erecting elevators of all classes in Montreal and other cities in the Dominion, for passengers and for goods. Among the elegant structures of the kind, more recently completed by

this well equipped firm, is that in the "Frontenac" the handsome new hotel of the Canadian Pacific Railway fronting on Dufferin Terrace the finest hotel site on the continent. The two new elevators in the Montreal postoffice were also erected by the firm, a convenience much needed, as will be admitted by the many of our citizens who were often compelled to mount the toilsome stairs leading to the customs. branch. Messrs. Miller Brothers and Toms are to be congratulated on the elegance and efficiency of these elevators, not to mention scores of others that testify to their thorough workmanship. Such superintendents as the brothers Barritt have few equals on any staff in Canada.

#### THE PENNY SAVINGS BANK.

. The Montreal Penny Savings Bank, in which Mr. George Hague,, general manager of the Merchants Bank, is one of the trustees and the moving spirit, is evidently fulfilling its mission successfully. Since, its establishment in January 1885, it has handled over 5,000 accounts, and it has today 1,319 depositors with balances at their credit to the amount of \$6,600. These depositors are mostly children who can deposit as little as two cents at a time and who draw 4 per cent. interest on all sums above \$3. Every Saturday night the treasurer, Mr. A. D. McLean and his. assistant attend at Welcome Hall, to receive deposits and pay checks, and - the money paid in is at once invested in the Merchants Bank for security. The value of this institution, as a factor in the inculcation of thrift is indicated by the fact that the deposits during 1893 were \$4,900, and so thoroughly is its success appreciated by the various church organizations of the city that other banks of a similar character are projected under their auspices.

#### A WOMEN'S LEAGUE.

Miss J. C Luilie, of New York, is the founder of a new insurance and benefit society to be raised the Women's Protective League in which the membership is confined to women only. Each member pays \$1 entrance fee, and an assessment based upon her age and the amount of insurance she desires to take out. At present the limit of each risk is \$3,000. A payment of 50 cents per month entitles her to \$5 per week for a period of six weeks during illuses or disablement by accident. The experiment is being watched with great interest by insurance men.

#### MR. A. F GAULT HONORED.

Mr. A. F. Gauit, of the firm of Gault Bros. & Co., was presented on last Monday afternoon with a beautifully executed portrait of himself on behalf of the clergy and laity of the Church of England in this dicese, as a small testimony of their appreciation of his unestentations generosity towards the church! The presentation was made in the Synod Hall by Rt. Revd. Bishop Bond, who gave many instances of Mr. Gault's quiet lib-

erality, and said that there was hardly a parish in the discose that did not bear evidences of his generosity. Hs donations to the Theological College, and to struggling churches in this city were also instanced, and His Lordship concluded by saying that Mr. Gault was a striking example of the text which said, "A good man leaveth an inheritance to his children's children." Very Rev. Dean Carmichael spoke of Mr. Gault's generosity towards St. George's Church, and several other prominent elergymen added their testimony,

#### THE LARGEST DIAMOND.

The largest diamond now known was found in June last in the mines of Jagersfontein, Cape Colony,, by Capt. Ed. Joganson, the inspector of the mine. In his opinion, comoborated by that of the director, Mr. Gillord, the "Excelsior" is a stone of the purest water, and is worth about a million sterling. Exceptional preeautions were taken to have it conveyed from the mine to the coast. A squadron of the Sixteenth Lancers guarded the carringe to Cape Town, from which it was brought to London in the gunboat Antetope. It is fully three jaches in height, and nearly three inches in breadth, weighing 971 carats, or about seven ounces troy, The color of the Jagersfontein diamond is white with a very stight bluish tint; and i.s lustre is matchless. At the centre is a very small black spot, which experts consider will be easily removed in the cutting The British Government, says the "Pall Mall Gazette," have offered half a million, bounds sterling for this diamond to the proprietors, Briceneyer and Bernheimer, out the offer has been refused." It is also said that the directors of the Chicago Exhibition were willing to insure the diamond for three-quarters of a million, in order to show the ninth wonder of the world. The German Emperor is reported: to be the probable purchaser of the "Exrelaior," It is at present deposited in a afe in the Bank of England.

#### A SIGN OF THE TIMES.

One of the most significant signs of the depression in the United States is the heavy fulling off in the importation of champagne by that country. In 1892 our American cousins took 350,662 cases, In 1893 the imports have fullen to 278,520 cases, or over 20 per cent. in twelve months, a popularity the leading brands stood as follows? Mumm, 71,751 cases, Pommery, 15,800; Moet & Chandon, 40,223; Piper, Il didsicek, 23,810; Monopole, 18,134; Perrier Jouet, 12,909 and Venve Clicquot 11,839 cases.

#### THE CHTZENS INSURANCE Co.

The long suffering shareholders of the Citizens Insurance Co. have at last some prespect of receiving a dividend upon their shares in the near future. The government has handed over the \$25,000 deposited at Ottawa on account of the accident branch, and it is believed that in about two months they will hand over the balance of the company's deposit. The troubles

arises out of the fact that some of the holders of life policies have become insane, or have drifted away across the lines and cannot be found. After they have been advertis I for, and the necessary formalities observed, the money will be handed over, and, when certain liabilities for re-insurance have been settled, it will be divided as a first and final dividend among the shareholders. What it will amount to is not yet known, but probably not more than a few dollars per share.

#### NO FOUNDATION FOR IT.

One needs to go abroad to hear home naws, says an old English proverb, and reidently this holds as good in Canada as it does in England, for according to despatches published in a Toronto paper, figuracial circles here are excited over—the heavy losses made—by one of our large banks in the Queen City. Considering that one of the losses mentioned was made in the middle of last summer, and the other early in the fall, it is difficult to see why financial circles in Montreal should get excited over them now. They were known, and their effect discounted long ago, so far as the bank"s standing is concerned.

As to the statement that the local manager is likely to be removed in consequence, the bank authorities are reticent. It is possible that an example may be made, but nothing official has been done in that direction as yet.

#### MADE TRACKS.

It is not lucky to steal cattle on a wet day-at least the stock thieves that have peen operating round Thamesville of late, have not found it so. They stole two fat cattle from the barn of Geo. Twigg of Camde township, but thanks to the rain their hoof prints were easily tracked in the mud to Chatham. Eng quiry led the hunters to the slaughter house of a local butcher named Bragg; where the carcasses and hides of the missing cattle were found. Bragg was placed under agrest and from him it was learned that two married men, William Graves, of the township of Howard, and Chas. Benjamin, of the township of Camden, were the guilty parties. Both admitted their guilt.

#### THE BANK OF ENGLAND.

The Bank of England is now enjoying an unpleasantly large share of public atcention, and it looks as if the veil of secrecy which has hitherto shrouded its operations would shortly be drawn aside. Public opinion demands the resumption of the publication of the statements of the bank's position which were discontinued in 1878, and further that the various joint stock and private banks, who are its principal customers, shall in future be represented on the directorate to which they have never yet had access. Parliament will probably insist on these reforms taking place, and the fact that the bank's stock fell seven points in three days may render the directors more ready to yield to pressure.

#### THE TUR SEASON.

Although the city hat and fur trade has been fairly good thus far through the season, there are sufficient recurrences of time-honored indications to prove that all is not as well as had been hoped for. There are too many in the trade suffering from the "sequelae" of former weaknesses, men whom the wholesalers had indulged from menth to month or season to season in the hope that the next season might enable them to pay a little more proporticuately on account if not fully restore it to a satisfactory business basis, but hope deferred maketh the heart sick, and the troubles noted the present week are doubtless of the class indicated; account which there is no fur-. ther hope of improving or preventing from getting worse Ite competition engendered by wear houses has worked much harm to the trace, and however laudable nursing may Le, there is a danger in this application of carrying it too fur-

A criticism of the basis in respect of these hazards led to the inacvertence. A basis must begin somewhere; but of this more anon.

#### CITY AMUSEMENTS.

The attraction at the Academy of Music, next week will be Thos. Q. Scabrooke's sparkling and successful comic opera, "The Isla of Champagne." A new prima donna soubratte, Miss Elvia Crox, undertakes the role of Diana, the belle of the Isle, and the piece abounds in effervescent dialogue and pretty music.

At the Queen's will be presented a realistic drama, "The Flag of Truce," in which there is a reproduction of a stone quarry, with genuine steam drills and derricks in operation and actual blasts put in and exploded by real quarrymen. The play, outside of this, is a strong one, and the cast comprises some well-known names.

Disquieting remers are current anent one or two unchartered discounters whose endorsements have heletofore been freely accepted by their bankers.

#### EUROPE'S WINE PRODUCTION.

A digest of the annual report of the French vintage for 1893, recently published, shows that the total crop in round figures is 1,125,000,000 gallons, or nearly double the average yield of the previous fifteen years. The quality is said to be uniformly good. The increase in the yield is common to the whole country. The most notable increase occurred in Gironde, where the production almost equals the phenomenal year of 1875, in Landes, Gers and Charente Inferieure, and in the Burgundy and Champagne districts. The total value of the crop is £50,261, 101. of which £5,900,737 represents high-class wines of the value of a florin about 40c a gallon. The average production of wine in Europe for the last. decade is as follows: France, 681,181,-000 gailons; Italy, 630,000,000; Spain 563,500,000; Austria-Hungary, 144,-200,000; Germany, 83,250,000; Portugal, 78,750,000; Russia, 72,300000; 000; Turkey, 45,000,000; Rumania, 40-Servia, 60,750,000; Bulgaria, 56,250-500,000; Greece 31,550,000; Switzerland, 22,500,000. It is to be hoped the wine figures for 1893 are more reliable than the statistics of grain sometimes given out.

The fruit cales of Paris have discovered a method of dyeing their wares. They can color ordinary oranges a deep red, making them look like mandarins, which fotch much higher prices. They also tint pined; pies to make them look more attractive, and dye common strawalovely red. Molons are now treated in a similar way, and tinted a fine orange.

The harvest of ice in Maine is expected to be a small one, and it will cost 15 to 20 cents more to cut this year than last. If the aggregate cut reaches more than 75,000 tons it will be a surprise, while in ordinary years it would be 200,000 tons. This should give a chance to Canadian ice dealers.

—The United States postal authorities have determined to put a stop to the use of the mails by investment and benefit orders of the Iron Hall type. A list of over fifty of these organizations has been prepared at Washington and sent to the prominent postmasters of the country, with justifications to notify the postmasters in

their districts of the fraudulent character of the companies named in the list, and to forbid delivery to any of them of registered letters or money orders. Directions have also been given to obtain evidence against their operators and to prosecute them under the statute which they have violated.

-An attempt will be made during the present session of Congress to secure & modification of the Inter-State Commerce law. It is believed by many eminent railroad officials and lawyers that the "antipooling' clause of the law would not hold in the courts, but the railroad companies, at least in the East, are not willing to. make a test case. The Trunk Line Association some time ago appointed General Manager Sergeant of the Grand Trunk, President Mayer of the Baltimore and Ohio, President Roberts of the Pennsylvamia, and President Depew of the New York Central a committee to take charge of the subject.

. -A plausible stranger, who seemed to take a great interest in educational matters, called upon one of the school trustees of Crosshill for the names of the other trustees and of the teacher. The information was readily given to him, and the mutter was forgotten until a letter came from their bankers saying that a note for \$267, signed by them, had been presented. Enquiries were at once made, and it was discovered that the affable stranger had forged their signatures to a note for that amount, and by representing himself, as the teacher and saying that it was for payment of his salary, had succeeded in discounting it for \$240 with a Hawksville merchant. Naturally he is not to be found

—A provisional agreement has been signed by which the capital, funds and business of the Albion Fire Insurance Association are to be transferred to the Many cheater Fire Assurance Company. The shareholders in the Albion are to receive one share in the Manchester for every tenshares of the Albion, which, at the present market price is at the rate of 15s for each share on which 10s. is paid. The whole existing organization of the Albion will be taken over by the Manchester.

The tea firm in Napance, Ont., referred to last week as being in difficulties, is that of bary, Grange & Co. They have been in homess since '83, and were doing fairly, but were too heavily interested in the Napance Paper Company, The Napance Paper Company, which went into liquidation and obtained an extension a few mouths ago, of three months, has now assigned. At that time it showed nominal assets of \$227,000 and liabilities of \$115,000.

—A correspondent at Campbellton, N.B., states that smelt fishing through the ico has sprung into prominence as a new industry in that locality. For nets along the sum of \$10,000 has been paid, and the fishing has proved very successful. Over \$7,000 has already been paid to the fishermen. If it is not overdone, the smelt fishery promises to be a profitable busi-

ness there.—Campbellton has not a single failure to record in 1893, and the local merchants report a fair year's business and a satisfactory holiday trade.

-Our correspondent at Norwood, Ont., writes as follows: The stock of John W. Clark, who assigned sometime ago, has been sold and the store closed. He is not likely to resume,-Messrs. Fleury; of Stouffville, have started a boot and shoe store here. They are the first to carry that single line in Norwood .- The price of buckwheat is unusually high, as the whole stock held here was bought by John Collins. of Hastings. Where is it wanted all are curious to know .- A great many new houses are going up at Havelock .- T. Vaucamp hardware, of Hast, ings, has moved to Lindsay. .45.

Our Shelburne, Ont., correspondents writes saying that merchants in that locality report trade good. Farmers are prosperous and no mortgage sales have been made, save in a few instances where the land was over-valued at the time the loan was made. Sales under execution and by; order of the sheriff have been exceptionally few. The interest on mortgages has been promptly met and protested notes are down to a minimum.—A new grocery and a new butcher's store have been added to the Patron's store in Shelburne.

—In Manitoba, McBain & McBain, contractors, Winnipeg, and A. C. McEown & Co., traders, Boissevain, have assigned.—Beatty & Cond, general store, Carrevale, are asking an extension. They have been in business since the spring of '92 and were doing fairly, but owing to the poor crops in their district and inability to make collections, have been compelled to seek some relief.—Greenway & Richards, hardware, Crystal City, have assigned. They have been in business together since April '90, but have not done well the past year, and have shown signs of going behind.

—The liabilities of J. T. Hurley, mfr. shoes, St. John, N.B., are \$32,000 direct and \$25,000 indirect. He is now offering \$250 on the dollar.—Another large St. John failure is that of G. H. McKny, dry goods, who owes \$39,000. He was previously of Hamilton & McKny, but started on his own account in May '90. He worked up a large trade, but profits were light and expenses too heavy.

—A despatch from Toronto announces the assignment of the Hill & Weir printing and publishing company, an event not unexpected by the trade. The total liabilities are \$60,000 with value of assets uncertain. A short time ago Hill & Weir effected a settlement of their debts by forming a joint stock company, and giving capital therein to their creditors. Some of them refused to accept this settlement, and their action has led to the present disaster.

-James L. Armson, Woodstock, Ont., has assigned, his liabilities being in the neighborhood of \$25,000. Mr. Armson was until about a year ago a partner in the firm of Armson & Stone, Toronto, now Ha

A. Stone & Co. Mr. Armson's trouble in Woodstock was caused by his putting nearly all his capital in a building and not leaving enough for the carrying on of his business.

-Another demand of assignment has been made upon Mr George Bishop, of the Bishop Engraving and Printing Co. This time it is made by Mr. Thos. C. Ham and is for the sum of \$479. It is announced that a syndiate of friends is about to come to Mr. Bishop's assistance, and that he will be tided over his difficulties safely. A meeting of his creditors will be held shortly to discuss his position.

—R. R. Rogers & Co., private bankers, Stayner, Ont., have gone into liquidation, much to the suprise of local business men and farmers interested. A. E. Maynard, representing the Bank of Commerce, to which the firm is indebted, is in charged. The manager of the Bank of Commerce at Toronto says that his institution is fully secured.

—J. W. Doelle, dry goods, Chatham, Ont., is arranging an extension in monthly payments. The liabilities are about \$30,000, but he shows a fair surplus. He bought the business from D. Blackley, of Hamilton, in the summer of '92, and prior to that had been managing it for that individual, who was conducting it under the style of J. W. Doelle & Co.

—Mrs. F. DeRoche, trader, Arichat, N.S., who started in June '92, has assigned. She invested too freely in property.—Mulcolm Morrison, Falmouth, N.S., has assigned.—P. S. McManus, in business at Moneton, N.B., as a grocer, under the style of P. McManus & Co., has assigned.

-Messrs. H. Shorey & Co., wholesale clothiers, have sent us an excellent photograph of Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen, with of our popular Governor General. The reverse contains the firm's aunount ement for the spring trade.

-J. A. Crooks, in business as a grocer at Halifux, N.S., for some years, has assigned. He was burnt out in February, '01, and has only done a limited trade since.—Ganong & Wilson, grocers, St. Stephen, N.B., are offering 50c on the dollar.

-The holiday trade did not prove the salvation of J. A. C. Julien, jeweller, city, judging from his offer of 30c on the dollar, which, however, has not yet been accepted. He commenced some three years ago and probably owes \$1,200.

-11 is stated that Mr. W. W. Ogilvic, has assented to the universally expressed, wish of the Board of Trade and will accept re-election as President at their hands on condition that Mr. Edgar Judge retains the treasurership.

-It will be see by the announcement elsewhere that Mr. John Livingstone, well known to many of our business men, has been appointed liquidator of the estate Chanteloup in this city.

-Last week 1.100 barrels of Nova Scotian applea were shipped from Kentville, N. S., to England. This week 1,200 bar-

rels more will be shipped from Middleton, N. S., to the same market.

The sale was going on to-day in Toronto of 600 boxes fancy Florida oranges. The Queen city is evidently acquiring a similar liking for this fruit to Montreal.

-During last month 48 carlonds of turnips left St. Andrews, N. B., for Boston, and 16 carloads were shipped last week to the same point. The rail freight alone footed up over \$1,570.

-J. J. & T. M. Baird, implement agents and farmers, Brandon, Man., have assigned ed; no particulars to hand.

-The "Universal," one of the best known fancy goods stores on St. James street, has felt the pressure of tight money, the decline in jourist travel last summer, etc., and a meeting of creditors has consequently been held. G. W. Clarke, at present the sole proprietor, will at once take stock and prepare a statement of affairs, which will be submitted at a further meetings The liabilities are variously estimated, but are likely to exceed \$20,000. This is Mr. Clarke's first serious mishap of the kind, although he had been in business since 1871. At one time the style was G. & W Clarke, but he has been alone since October '79. It is difficult to turn over a high class lancy goods stock in time of monetary pressure, as such is naturally the first to suffer from enforced economy. Possibly the proprietor made the mistake of carrying too heavy an assortments in view of increased competition, in this line of late years, while expenses, such as heavy rent, taxes, etc., continued to eat heavily into diminished profits. The fimancial trouble in the United States possibly reduced the volume of sales during the tourist season, as travel this way was curtailed. Mr. Clarke was burned out on the 26th December "90, and the insurance companies settled for \$2.2,500. During the past year or so he has had to finance more or less. The Hon. A. Ouimet is the landlord of the building. The elegant windows of the "Universal" are a feature on St James street, and many will hear of the present trouble with surprise

-In this province, Benjamin Campeau, general store, St. Clet, has compromised at 40c on the dollar, 3 and 6 months, with liabilities of about \$2,500. The effect of the holidays is wearing off, and there is more inclination to do business. No cae appears to look for any increase ir the volume of transactions, just yet, but judging from direct enquiries, and surly reports from travellers, there will re a fair spring trade. The result of stock taking operations must now be fully known, and most of our merchants are proparly thankful to put their books for 1893, out of sight. Price changes ar few. Cotton, Woolen and hardware men are hearly alive to possible tariff changes. The bar iron combination has come to grief and prices have consequently dropped.

Ashes,—Receive are fair, and include some small loss from Western States. Market has beer quiet at \$4.40 to \$4.50 for first sor: pots, but all offered have been readily taken at the quotation. Second \$3.86. Fearls nominal at \$5.50 for first sort. Receipte since 1st January 51 brls. pots, 3 b.ls. pearls; deliveries 18 brls. pots, 4 brls. pearls; in store 11th Jan at 8 p. m. 10 brls. pots, 39 brls. pearls.

Butter and Cheese.—Butter is selling quietly, but is firmly held, there being no surplus. A Torento buyer is said to have bought some stock here at full figures. Creamely is worth 231-2c to 241-2c for linest and possibly a fraction more could be obtained. Township dairy 22c to 23c other lines 191-2e to 21c. Liberal receipts have kept the New York market down. Best State creamery is quoted there at 23c to 24c and westerr extras 25c to 251-2c. State dairy, extras 24c seconds to firsts 19c to 23c. 

Foreign advices on rice state that the crop is safe and in good condition, and prices firm. Late advice, on colles state that the receipts at Brazilian ports were 16,000 bags, two days, including 11,000 at Rio and 5,000 at Spates. The Rio market was steady and Centes 100 reis higher. Rate of exchange at Rio was quoted at 10 7-8d. The stock of Brazil coffee in New York is 126,168 bags, in the United States 156,728 bags, with the quantity affect for this country 862,000 bags, making the American visible supply 517,-788 bags, against 628.701 bags at the same time last year. Importation of refined sugars this year into the United States aggregate even 14,000 tons in comparison with nearly 6,000 tons last year. The American Sugar Refinery Company has not got everything its own way. It is claimed that 20 per cent. of the refining capacity is now controlled by inde-pendent relinerics, and that the proposed changes in the tailff would cause 30 per cent. of the total consumption of sugar to be imported in the refined state. The estimated crop of tee in India this year compares as follows with the official returns for the previous two years—1891-92, 179,750,600 lbs; 1892-93, 113,686.888 lbs.; 1865-94, 126,779,778 lbs. Most of the crop exported goes to Great Britain. Reserving to the tea market at Yokonama, the Japan Mail says

A few bags of walnuts sold at 6c per 1b. Ten cases of ligs at 61-2c per 1b. Spanish onions 50c to 55c per case. Some peanute were withdrawn at 5c, duty paid. A quantity of canned goods were offered at auction and withdrawn.

· Hides and Pallew.—There is a fair demand for hides from tanners. Prices steady. Tallew vachanged.

Iron and Haidware.—A fair business is being done in some special lines, but general trade is quict. Travellers are preparing to stail out, and most of them will be on the road by the middle of the mouth. Exceptets for spring trade are considered good. The holiday feeling has about died out, and enquiries for goods are more numerous. There does not appear to be exceptive supplies, either in first or second hands. At the convention just over in Toronto, the combination on bar iron was broken. Merchants are now sealing at a base price of \$1.85. Foreign markets are dull. Tin, copper and lead show no improvement whatever. Scotch warrants have been as low as 42s 10d and as high as 48s 3d. They are now quited at 43s. A reduction of 20 per cent., instead of 15, is ordered on bright from wire making the as low as galvanized. An extra 5 per cent, has been taken off wire nails, the discount now being 75 and 6 per cent.

Leather and Shots -Manufacturers of boots and shoes are reported to have cooked a good many orders for the spring, but are not in a particular hurry to make ut stock. Demand for leather is only moderate. Some factories will not push things until February. The St. John, N. B. leiluie, has hit the Quebec and western trade more than Montreal, which is only moderately interested.

Meal and Feed. Catmeal is quiet at \$1.90 to \$2 for Standard in bags and at \$92 to \$2.00 for granulated. Feed is firm and higher. Bran \$16 to \$17, shorts \$17 to \$18 and moutife \$22.

Provisions and Eggs.—Pork can be bought cheaper, but the market is dull. Meats and hard are finding the average demand. Canada short cut \$17 to \$18 and new mess wittern \$16.50 to \$17. Hams 12c to 13c and bacon 11 1-2c to 121-4c. Lard in pails 11 1-4c to 121-4c and common refined \$1-4c to 81-2c. Cash pork in Chicago \$12.90 and lard \$8.05. Eggs on this market steady at 22c for boiling grocery stock. Montreal Fined 6c to 17c and wettern 15c to 16c. Fresh eggs in baskets 45c

Wook—Orders ice wool are light, at the moment, but we understand that manufacturers are getting orders quite freely for next fall. It comed possible by press reports, at writing that the Wilson bill in Congress, making wool free on entering the United States would pass. Asked how this would affect the mills working on futures orders, we were told that huyers would simply care! them. Such a practice is quite enterieve in the States, and in Canada. Mills receive instructions to cancel orders, when actually working on goods, and sometimes let the buyers have at their own price. Others have quite a stock of goods left on their hands, on account of cancelled orders. This is a serious abuse of a trade privilege which should be strictly limited in practice. The little Cape woo selling is being placed at 14c to 18c.
