MAY BE MURDER.
Feed Hamore Stabs His Employer With a Pitchfork.

Barrie, Aug. 4.—Fred Hamore, alias Stratton, was brought to the county jail from Bradford last night, and over him hangs a charge of stabbing, which may yet be one of murder.
He was employed by a farmer named William Church, who lives six miles from Bradford. While at work in a mow on Friday a quarrel arose, and Hamore stabbed his employer thru the lungs with a pitchfork. The animal descended then stretched on the floor apparently lifeless from loss of blood, and was in a critical condition. Hamore acknowledges the stabbing.

MR. WILFRID DECLINES TO ACCED TO REQUEST THAT EVIDENCE BE PRINTED.
Sir Wilfrid Declines to Accede to Request That Evidence Be Printed.

Ottawa, Aug. 4.—(Special.)—F. B. Wade presented to the House to-day the report of the Committee on Privileges and Elections exonerating Mr. Loy, Liberal member for Beauharnois. The committee finds in favor of Mr. Loy.
Mr. Monk asked that the evidence taken by the committee be printed for the use of the members of the House. He pointed out that there was a majority and a minority report, and their respective merits could not be fairly pronounced upon without the evidence. Sir Wilfrid Laurier refused to accede to this request on the ground that a recommendation must first come from the Committee on Privileges and Elections. Mr. Borden characterized the government's course as most unusual. He had never known such a request to be refused before.
Mr. Monk moved that the question be referred to the Committee on Printing and the motion carried. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in an effort to make the immediate adoption of the majority report, by Mr. Monk objected. He said that insufficient notice had been given. The motion was, however, adopted and will be made again to-morrow.
Mr. Borden asked the Premier if there is any truth in the report that the British government has assented to colonial governments if they would object to the publication of proceedings of the intercolonial conference which have been regarded as confidential. Sir Wilfrid replied that he could not say whether the statement was true or not, but he had consulted with His Excellency the Governor-General.

Nor will the transportation problems in the west ever be solved by the construction of an all-Canadian route from coast to coast."

NORTHWEST HARVEST EXCURSIONS

As Great a Demand for Men This Year as Last.

The Northwest Harvest excursions on the C.P.R. will leave Toronto on Aug. 17 and 19. The rates of last year will prevail, namely, \$10 single fare or \$18 for the return trip. As to the number of harvest hands who will be required, A. H. Notman, assistant general passenger agent, said yesterday "I observe items in the papers stating that only a very few laborers will be needed to work in the harvest fields of Manitoba and the Northwest during the present season. This statement is wholly incorrect, as, although large numbers of settlers have gone into the west this year, they are entirely occupied in preparing their new homes and getting ready for a start in the country. At the present time there are no idle men in Winnipeg, and we find the greatest difficulty in obtaining workmen of any class, from Holbrook up to the mechanic. Therefore, there is no doubt that as many men will be needed this year as any previous seasons. Last year we took up 18,000, and we are satisfied that as many will be required this season to take care of the work."

If it is a question of free trade within the empire, with the imposition of a small tariff for revenue purposes, Mr. Chamberlain may succeed in carrying out his project, but if the Canadian manufacturers insist on protective duties, then Mr. Chamberlain's plans will be defeated. In London they all seem to think that the true policy of Canada is to develop her unpopulated lands, and the lower she makes the tariff the more chances she will have of coming to satisfactory terms with Great Britain.

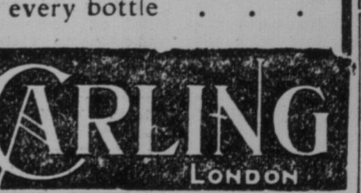

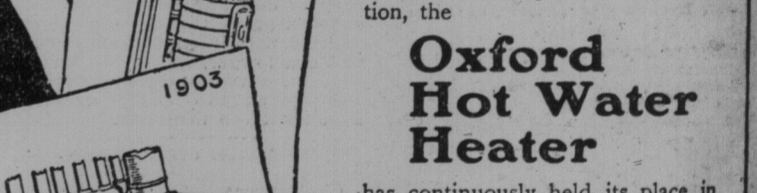
