JOHN CATTO & SON CAN RAILWAY COMMISSION ADJUDICATE MONEY DISPUTE

Chairman, Killam Expresses a Doubt in Bulthie's Case Against G. T. R.

Ottawa, June 27.-The complaint of J. H. Duthie of Toronto, on behalf of Hoffman & Company of Detroit against the Grand Trunk Railway Company, on account of demurrage charges, was heard by the railway commission this morning. The charges in question were laid against three cars of coal sent to Belleville, but which the consignees refused to accept because of being under seizure. The coal was then disposed of to the Belleville Gas Company, but the railway company refused to deliver the coal until the demurrage charges were paid. The shippers of the coal offered to pay the freight charges from the mines to Belleville, and to guarantee the railway company against loss in respect Believille, and to guarantee the rall-way company against loss in respect of the demurage charges, but the rallway company refused to agree. Application to the local freight agent for redress met with the response that he could not interfere, but Mr. Duthle must deal with the Car Service Association. This latter would not do, as he said he was dealing with the railway company, not the Car Service Association. Finally the coal was sold by the Grand Trunk Company by private sale. He asked the board to order the company to return the \$250.72, which they had received from the sale of the coal.

"We may be able to make an order

"We may be able to make an order of some kind, but I doubt our ability to adjudicate in money matters," said the chairman.

To Settle in a Month. Judgment on special complaint reserved, and Duthie then made argument that the car service, or de-murrage, charges collected by the Grand Trunk were unjustifiable, and in the nature of extortion. He said the Car Service Association was a com-bination in restraint of trade. It owed its existence to the fact that the agents of the railway companies were unable of the railway companies were unable to collect unreasonable charges.

In repy to Mr. Duthie, M. K. Cowan, for the Grand Trunk, said that the whole matter of the car service was a subject of discussion at present between the Manufacturers' Association and the railway companies, and they hoped within the month to arrive at an amicable arrangement.


