CAN RAILWAY COMMISSION ADJUDICATE MONEY DISPUTE

Chairman Killam Expresses a Doubt in Duthie's Case Against C. T. R.

Ottawa, June 27.—The complaint of

J. H. Duthie of Toronto, on behalf of

Hoffman & Company of Detroit against

the Grand Trunk Railway Company,

on account of demurrage charges, was

heard by the railway commission this

morning. The charges in question

were laid against three cars of coal

sent to Belleville, but which the com-

mission refused to accept because of

being under seal, and the coal was

then disposed of to the Belleville Gas

Company, but the railway company

refused to deliver the coal until the

demurrage charges were paid. The

shippers of the coal offered to pay the

freight charges from the mines to

Belleville, and to guarantee the rail-

way company against loss in respect

of the demurrage charges. The

railway company refused to agree.

Application to the railway commis-

sion for redress met with the response

that he could not interfere, but Mr. Duthie

must deal with the Car Service Asso-

ciation. This latter would not do,

as he said he was dealing with the

railway company, not the Car Service

Association. Finally the coal was sold

by the Grand Trunk Company by private

sale. He asked the board to order

the company to return the \$267.72,

which they had received from the sale

of the coal.

We may be able to make an order

of some kind, but I don't see ability

to adjudicate in money matters,"

said the chairman.

Peking, June 27.—The correspondent of the Associated Press here is informed

on good authority that China desires to be represented in the Russo-Japanese peace conference.

St. Petersburg, June 27.—The Bourse

Gazette today prints a rumor to the effect that Admiral Alexiev will succeed Count Lamsdorf as foreign minister.

Prince Urusoff, governor of Tver, Central Russia, has been relieved of his post at his own request.

The military experts take anything but a hopeful view of Gen. Linevitch's situation.

They do not believe he can be surrounded, but apparently do not consider the possibility of a Russian victory.

Linevitch's retirement to Harbin and the isolation of Vladivostok seem to be regarded as foregone conclusions when Field Marshal Oyama strikes.

Prisoners Are All Fled.

Warsaw, June 27.—All the prisoners

of the Russian army, no less than 672

persons, mostly Jews, having been arrested during the past 24 hours, are expected

to be taken to a state of a stone bin, and proclaimed as great riots are anticipated

been struck, and it is feared that lives will be lost. The peasants in the government

NEW ASSESSMENT TO STAND**

Town of North Toronto Declines to Reduce Metropolitan Ry. Taxation. The Compromise is Sought.

Owing to the coming into effect at an early date of the local option bylaw eight members of the Metropolitan Board of Councils at Ontario Hotel were yesterday notified that they will have to find other quarters. Most of them are employees of the Metropolitan Railway, and only one of the eighteen has been able to find accommodation.

Dr. J. J. and several other ratepayers on Yonge street applied yesterday to the town council last night to try and change the proposed granolithic sidewalk to one of the same material. The work is now practically arranged, and a new bylaw will be necessary. On Tuesday night the application will present a fully signed petition.

Councillor Brown presided over the court of revision. The assessment of the Metropolitan Railway this year is \$6000 a mile, as compared with last year, under the old "strip" from 1898 to 1899 a mile. Two representatives of the company were present, and wanted to compromise, but the mayor thought the best plan was to let an appeal go before the county judge. The other members concurred and the assessment was confirmed. George Aitken was given a reduction of \$1 a foot on a 50 foot lot, and E. C. Jarvis' assessment on \$1000 on income was struck off.

ABOUT STRAWBERRIES.

Tuesday, June 27, 1905, will rank in the history of the wholesale fruit trade of this city as one of the "big" days of the year. Coming after comparatively unimportant deliveries the change was all the more marked. Not less notable was the decline in prices. From 11c to 12c per box on Saturday to 4c and 4c straight on Tuesday is not an ordinary occurrence. Leading commission merchants pronounce the shipments of fruit to the city yesterday fully equal to the best deliveries of the season of 1904. It is estimated that 1500 crates were received by the Dawson Co., McWilliam & Evans, Distributors Co., and Clemes Bros. being among the heaviest dealers. While the bulk of the sales were made at from 1c to 1c wholesale in some cases even lower rates were quoted. At White's auction rooms during the afternoon as low as 3c is said to have obtained, while a little went at 4c per box. As to the quality of the shipments general satisfaction is expressed. The Dawson Co. reported that among their shipments were a number of consignments of extra choice stock, large, well-flavored and of fine appearance. In view of the pessimistic reports which have from time to time appeared the outlook is, especially encouraging. Cherries are not as yet much in evidence, but the general range of prices is said to be in the neighborhood of 1c for sweet. The Distributors Co. will to-day inaugurate a departure in the shipment of a car of strawberries to Winnipeg. The time schedule is 65 hours from Toronto to Winnipeg, and the result of the venture will be watched with interest by commission men and growers alike. With the successful opening up of this trade a profitable season may be secured for the surplus output of Ontario.

Peddled a Van Dyke.
The London Times says that a junk dealer at Reggio Emilia, Italy, bought a dilapidated picture for half a crown and vainly exposed it on sale for months. Eventually Prof. Balletti, an amateur collector, offered five francs for it. The junk dealer accepted, but is now chagrined to learn that the picture is a Van Dyke, for which Prof. Balletti has refused an offer of 50,000 francs.

German Book Trade.
If the City of Leipzig, the headquarters of the German book publishing trade, there are 216 firms filling orders and its book publishers' exchange has 2340 members. Leipzig has not only one of the most celebrated universities in Germany, but as a city is renowned for its music schools and concerts. Many Americans of both sexes are now studying at Leipzig.
