MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING.

The Twenty-fourth Annual General Meeting of the Protestant Infants' Home was held in the Lecture Hall of Emmanuel Church, on Wednesday, April 11th, 1894, at 3.30 p.m.

Amongst those present were the Hon. F. E. Gilman, His Lordship Bishop Bond, Rev. W. H. Warriner, Rev. Dr. Rose, Rev. G. Osborne Troope, Rev. J. B. Silcox, Rev. James Patterson, Rev. Dr. Williams, Rev. I. R. Barnabas, Dr. W. Grant Stewart, Dr. A. Proudfoot, Dr. David J. Evans, J. H. Isaacson, Esq., H. Sanders, Esq., and a large number of ladies.

Letters of regret for inability to be present were received from Rev. Dr. Norton, Rev. T. S. McWilliams, Rev. W. B. Hinson and Rev. W. S. Barnes.

The President, the Hon. F. E. Gilman, occupied the chair.

The opening devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. W. H. Warriner.

The Secretary's Annual Report was read by His Lordship Bishop Bond.

The Treasurer's Annual Statements were read by Rev. Dr. Rose.

The Medical Board Report was read by W. Grant Stewart, M.D.

Moved by Rev. G. Osborne Troope, seconded by Rev. J. B. Silcox, and carried:—"Resolved: That the Secretary's, Treasurer's, and Medical Board Reports which have been read be adopted, printed and circulated."

The election of the officers for the ensuing year was moved by Rev. Dr. Williams, seconded by Rev. W. H. Warriner, and carried. (The list of names will be found upon another page.)

The different speakers referred to the high aim and character of the work being done, and commended it to the sympathy and benevolence of the general public. They also paid a well merited tribute of praise to the medical staff for their valuable services.

Dr. Stewart proposed, seconded by Mr. H. Sanders: "A vote of thanks to the Pastor and trustees of Emmanuel Church for so kindly and willingly granting the use of the Lecture Hall in which to hold the Annual Meeting. Carried unanimously.

Before closing the meeting the chairman announced that the ladies had provided light refreshments, and on behalf of the lady managers extended an invitation to all present to remain and partake of them.

The meeting closed with the Benediction by the Bishop.

THE TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
Lady Managers of the Protestant Infants' Home.

"Do thy duty; that is best;
Leave unto thy Lord the rest!"
"Whatsoever thing thou doest
To the least of Mine and lowest,
That thou doest unto Me!"

A glance over the past year does not present any special feature to mark the work from other years, but though uneventful, it has been on the whole a bright and prosperous one. Under the Divine blessing none of the diseases incidental to childhood have prevailed in the Home, a great cause for thankfulness, more especially when scarlet fever has been epidemic in the city for some months. The general health of the inmates has been good. One of the objects of the Home is to endeavor to lessen the death rate of children under four years of age. Many of the children from neglect, improper food, and other causes are very weak and frail when received into the Home, but by giving them good care and plenty of nourishing food we try to counteract the weakness thus entailed, and if possible, to save from premature death. Frequently they are the children of parents who are degraded by the use of intoxicants until all tenderness and love for their offspring have been effaced and the little children, too young to care for themselves, are neglected and left to suffer from hunger and cold while the mother is indulging her appetite for strong drink.

The following facts and figures will show in what measure our efforts to save life have been successful. During the year 19 have died, making a death rate of a little over eleven per cent. Details will be found in the report of the Medical Board.

Hearty thanks are due and are hereby tendered to the many kind friends and supporters of the institution, who by their generous and willing response to the appeals of the collectors have enabled us to carry on the work and to provide, without worry and anxiety, as to ways and means, for the large family in the Home, numbering one hundred and four, namely, seventy-five infants and twenty-nine adults.

The Treasurer reports a balance on hand sufficient to meet all expenses until the fall, when the collections will be made for 1894-95. Now that we have plenty of room we shall have throughout the year a large family, and in consequence, an increased expenditure, a fact which we hope the friends and supporters of the institution will bear in mind.

The lady managers have collected \$1,281 98 for current expenses. The city collections from merchants and others amount to the sum of \$978 also for current expenses.

During the year the sum of ninety dollars was received (in full of a legacy of one hundred dollars, less government duty of ten per cent.) from the executors of the estate of the late Hollis Shorey.

"Whosoever shall give to drink unto one of these little ones, a cup of cold water, only in the name of a disciple, verily I say unto you, he shall in no wise lose his reward."

At the beginning of the year, April 1st, 1893, there were 71 children in the Home, and since then 97 have been admitted, making a total of 168. Of this number 58 have been removed by parents or friends, 10 have been transferred to the "Ladies' Benevolent" (they having attained the age of five years), 6 have been adopted, 19 have died, and 75 remain in the Home.

Have not these little helpless ones a special claim upon our sympathy and benevolence? Many of them with fathers or mothers or both parents drunkards; others foundlings, who know neither father nor mother; children of widowers, some whose wives have left an infant a few days or weeks old, with no relatives or friends to care for the little one, oftentimes strangers in a strange land, the home of their adoption; children of widows; of deserted wives; of mothers or fathers who are sick in the hospital or lunatic asylum, and the children of unmarried mothers. Of the total number in the Home during the year 16 were the children of widowers, 14 of widows, 15 with mothers sick, 3 with fathers sick, 1 with father in the lunatic asylum, 7 with mothers in the lunatic asylum, 4 foundlings, 56 of deserted wives or one or both parents drunkards, and 52 illegitimate. The largest daily number of infants in the Home has been 75 and the smallest 57.

By providing a comfortable home for the unmarried mother where she is able to nurse and care for her infant until it can be weaned with safety, the benefit is twofold, a strong mother's love is created or fostered and the child's innocent trusting love keeps the mother's heart warm and gives her courage and strength to take up the battle of life, a better and happier woman for not having abandoned her infant at its birth, leaving it to the mercy of strangers and probably sending it to an early grave, or if strong enough to live, to a life of sorrow and abandonment.

At the beginning of the year, April 1st, 1893, there were 14 women with their infants in the Home. Since then 33 women with their infants have entered the Home, 10 married and 23 unmarried.

When the baby is weaned the mother generally leaves her infant in the Home and goes to a situation, coming every week to see her child and giving half her wages each month for the child's board, clothing, etc. This arrangement is usually faithfully carried out. Sometimes, rather than be separated from her infant, the mother will take a situation, accepting very small wages, if allowed to take her baby with her. More's the pity, that in a few instances, our toil and trouble seem not to have benefited the mother. All the days are not bright and sunny, there are some dark and sad ones, but we think of our Master's commendation, "She hath done what she could," and we go on with renewed courage casting our "bread upon the waters."

Our aim is only to assist and not to relieve the parent from the duty of supporting his or her family, consequently, when the parent is earning wages, a payment of from one to six dollars per month is required for the child's board, clothing, etc. The amount is decided upon in accordance with the number of children the parent has to support and other circumstances connected with the case. It can be readily seen that the sum asked for the board and clothing does not cover the cost, yet, even this small amount some find very great difficulty in paying, while others, from sickness or other causes, are unable to pay anything.

Of the number of children remaining in the Home 26 are with their mothers, 28 are paying board, and 21 are not paying board.

Many lonely homes have been brightened with the joy and pleasure which the presence of a child brings into a home. During the year six children have been adopted, making a total of one hundred and twenty-one since the Home was founded. Where loving hearts have given these little ones a warm welcome, they have brought a blessing. The following extracts are taken from some of the letters received during the year: "The little fellow is just now having a game of romps with his father and sister, and I think if you could hear his merry laughter you would agree with me in thinking that there is not a happier little boy in Canada. He is a constant source of pleasure to us and we love him dearly. I feel sure that my coming across him was providential and in answer to prayer, and we trust altogether to the same kind Father for guidance and wisdom in training him aright."

"— is quite well, she has had no sickness since I got her. She is growing big, and is a smart, intelligent child. I am very well pleased with her."

"— seems quite contented, and you would think from her appearance that she had been here all her lifetime. She is not a bit shy *now*, she will shake hands with almost anyone and is liked by all the family."

"We have had no regrets that we took baby from your Home. She is such a happy, sweet child, her papa's pride and joy, while she is a great comfort to me. Not an hour's sickness has the child had since she came to us."

We are greatly indebted to several clergymen of different denominations for having conducted in the Home a short service, usually on Thursday evenings in each week. Their ministrations in spiritual things has been very acceptable and we trust profitable to the adult inmates. Our thanks are also due to Mr. Peter Wood for giving Bible readings on Saturday evenings, and to Miss Boxall for religious instruction on Sunday evenings. The daily family prayer is conducted by the Matron. Ladies from the "West End Methodist Church" have visited the Home on Saturday afternoons to teach the elder children to sing and to march, etc. "The singing ladies" are looked for and warmly welcomed by the little ones. Members of the "Junior Christian Endeavor Society of Calvary Congregational Church" have visited the Home and brought their less favored brothers and sisters five pounds of candy and twenty-five cents to pay for hand-organ music, at different times.

Members of the "Dorchester Street Methodist Church Junior Christian Endeavor Society" have also visited the Home and brought oranges, candies,

knitted balls, etc. These gifts represent "self-denial," as they are the individual savings of the junior members.

Two of the lady managers, Mrs. G. D. Ross and Mrs. James A. Wright, have again, with thoughtful kindness and liberality, presented the Home with two Christmas trees laden down with presents for all the inmates. A very pleasant and happy time was spent in distributing the gifts.

Two fire-escapes have been erected, one on the south-east side of the building, and the other on the south-west end, leading to the galleries.

The remainder of the lots owned by the institution on Sussex Street have been sold to Mr. C. O. Lapierre for a cash payment of \$1,506.70, leaving a balance of \$4,520.10 on mortgage at six per cent. interest.

The following changes have been made on the Board of Management. Mrs. James Saxe, having felt compelled to send in her resignation as first directress, it was reluctantly and with very great regret, accepted. Mrs. Saxe has occupied the offices of first directress and third directress for two and five years respectively. The Home and the ladies associated with her on the Board will miss her kind, gentle and wise guidance as one of the officers. Mrs. Benjamin T. Davis was unanimously elected to fill the vacant office.

The resignation as a lady manager of Mrs. (Dr.) Godfrey, one of the charter members, was also received and accepted with very great regret, coupled with thanks for her long and faithful services on behalf of the Home. Her name has been placed amongst the Honorary Members.

During the year 2 special meetings and 52 regular business meetings have been held and the Home has been visited almost daily by one or more of its managers.

Mrs. Van Allen, Mrs. Tinker, and Mrs. Campbell are filling the same positions as they did last year, namely, matron, head nurse in the upper nurseries, and head nurse in the lower nursery, respectively. A few extracts from the visitors' book will speak for themselves, as to the care of the children and the efficient management of the Home.

"We have visited the Infants' Home and found it an admirably adapted Home for the purpose. The children are healthy and happy, the matrons affable and kind. We can recommend it to the sympathy of the general public."

"The evidences of good care and thoughtful attention are abundant. The inmates appear happy and contented in this excellent refuge."

"A charming home for the little ones, well ordered, and evidently conducted on the principles of humanity."

The special thanks of the managers are due and are hereby tendered to the "Good Samaritan Society" of the Church of the Messiah, "Mission Circle" of the American Presbyterian Church, "Willing Workers" of the Stanley Street Presbyterian Church, "Young Ladies" of Crescent Street Presbyterian Church, the Ladies' Aid Societies of St. Paul's and Erskine Presbyterian Churches, "Brockville Home," per Mr. Burgess, and the "Earnest Workers" of St. Hyacinthe, P.Q., for valuable donations of clothing, etc., received for the inmates.

To Mrs. W. Henry Jackson and the ladies and gentlemen who assisted, for the

proceeds of a concert held in the Fraser Hall, on Tuesday evening, April 18th, 1893.

To the Rev. I. R. Barnabas for a stereopticon exhibition in the Home, on Friday evening, February 9th, 1894. The views were thoroughly enjoyed by the inmates and his kindness in showing them fully appreciated.

To the Medical Staff who have so cheerfully given their valuable time and advice to promote the health and comfort of the inmates.

To several of the Clergy who have attended at the Home to administer the rite of baptism and conduct the burial service.

MEDICAL REPORT.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CORPORATION OF THE INFANTS' HOME.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:—The members of the Medical Board have much pleasure in presenting their Annual Report for 1893-94.

At the beginning of the year there were 71 children in the Home, 97 have been received since that time, making a total of 168.

It is with a great deal of satisfaction that the Board are able to say that the death rate is considerably lower than last year, being only a little over 11 per cent. Last year it was nearly 14 per cent. Such statistics will stand favorable comparison with any similar institution.

The daily numbers have been larger this year, 75 the largest and 57 the lowest, the corresponding numbers for last year being 72 and 47.

The general health of the Institution has been fairly good. There have been no epidemics during the year. Most of the disease is due to hereditary influence, making it difficult to build up the already run down constitutions. Many of the cases we have brought under our care all the skill and nursing in the world will not save.

For twenty-four years this good and noble work has been going on. During that time it has done an untold amount of good. It never has done a better or greater amount of work than it is doing to-day and, judging from the past and from the present, it is certainly going to have a glorious future.

Who could turn a deaf ear to the cry of the helpless infant! It strikes the most sensitive chords of our nature. They come, most of them, into a cold, friendless, unfeeling world, and it is to help such that these good ladies are doing so much. All honor to these noble women. Such noble women as these bear out the truth so aptly put by the poet—

"Earth's noblest work,
A woman perfected."

Not only do they spend their time and energy in watching the tender babe and guiding it safely through the rocks and shoals of infancy and childhood, but they help the unfortunate mother. "Let him that is without sin among you cast the first stone." They take her under their protecting wing and give her a chance to make a fresh start in life and lend her in all ways they can a helping hand. They want the sympathy and generous support of a kind public—give them this and the ladies will certainly do the rest.

"To none were His g'fts so rich and free
As to those where he said, "Ye did it to Me,"
Ye gave to the poor, ye clothed them and fed;
In the Master's house, for thee, there is bread.

"Ye've given to Me, My pain ye have eased,
My tears ye have dried, and My courage raised,
For inasmuch as ye've done it to one
Of the least of these, to Me it was done."

The Medical Board acknowledge the kindness of the Committee in being ever ready to follow out any of their suggestions or get what may be required. Nor would they forget the untiring efforts of the excellent matron, Mrs. Van Allen, and her assistants, Mrs. Tinker and Mrs. Campbell, to make the children healthy and happy.

CONSTITUTION.

STATUTES OF QUEBEC : 34 VICTORIA, CAP. 56, 1870.

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE PROTESTANT INFANTS' HOME OF MONTREAL.

[Assented to 24th of December, 1870.]

WHEREAS the persons hereinafter mentioned have by petition, represented that they and others, for some years past, have maintained by voluntary contributions, a certain institution in the city of Montreal, known as "The Protestant Infants' Home," for the purpose of furnishing a home for children who may be deprived of their natural protectors, either by death, abandonment or otherwise, and for the purpose of protecting such children from the effects of want and exposure to crime, and have prayed that for the better attainment of the objects of the said institution, the same may be vested with corporate powers: Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec, enacts as follows :

1. Mesdames Anna E. Workman, Marie Louisa Henshaw, Elizabeth Scott, Louisa B. Ferrier, Mary A. Godfrey, Annie Muir, A. L. Shaw, and L. M. Baylis and such other persons as may hereafter be associated with them in conformity with this act, and their successors, are hereby constituted and created a body corporate and politic, with all the rights incident to corporations, by the name of "The Protestant Infants' Home of Montreal."

2. The said Corporation shall have perpetual succession, and may have a common seal, with the power to change, alter, break or renew the same, when and as often as they may think proper, and may, under the said name, contract and be contracted with, sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded, prosecute and be prosecuted, in all courts and places whatsoever in this province, and by the same name they and their successors, from time to time, and at all times hereafter, shall be able and capable to have, take, receive, purchase and acquire, hold, possess, enjoy and maintain to and for the use of the said corporation, all lands and property movable and immovable, which may hereafter be sold, ceded, exchanged, given, bequeathed or granted to the said Corporation, or to sell, hypothecate, alienate, convey, let or lease the same if need be ; provided always that such real estate shall not exceed the annual value of five thousand dollars beyond that actually required for the use of the said Corporation, provided also, that if the said Corporation shall become possessed of real estate exceeding the annual value of five thousand dollars, apart from that actually used by the said Corporation, it shall be bound to sell such surplus property within five years from the acquisition of the same and invest the proceeds thereof in public securities of

the Dominion stocks of chartered banks, mortgages, and other approved securities, for the use of the said Corporation.

3. The officers of the said Corporation shall consist of a President, Secretary, Treasurer, and a Committee of Management of not less than ten members, and such other officers as shall, from time to time, seem necessary to the Corporation. The foregoing officers shall be chosen from among the members of the Institution, and the President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be *ex-officio* members of the said Committee.

4. The said Corporation shall have power to form a code of by-laws, not inconsistent with the laws of this Province or of the Dominion, for fixing the terms of admission of its members, for the government of the same, for the election, changing and altering the officers above named, and for the general regulation and management of its officers, which code when formed and adopted at a regular meeting shall, until modified or rescinded, be equally binding as this act upon the Institution, its officers and members.

5. The by-laws of the said Institution, not being contrary to law, shall be the by-laws of the Corporation hereby constituted, until they shall be repealed or altered as aforesaid.

6. Until others shall be elected according to the by-laws of the Corporation the present officers of the Institution shall be those of the Corporation.

7. The said Corporation may send out to service or bind or apprentice thereto, or to any healthy trade or business, until the age of sixteen, all children, and may send out to be nursed, supported, educated or adopted, all children having the protection of the said Corporation to, by, or with such person or persons and upon such terms as to the officers may seem fit and proper, and for such purposes and on behalf of and for such children and themselves, may enter into and make with any person or persons with whom such children may be placed, articles of apprenticeship or agreement, and such articles or agreement may be enforced by action at law.

8. The said Corporation shall be bound to make annual reports to the legislature, containing a general statement of the affairs of the Corporation, which said reports shall be presented within the first twenty days of every session of the Legislature.

BY-LAWS OF THE CORPORATION.

PREAMBLE:—The aim and object of the "Protestant Infants' Home of Montreal" are to receive the children of Protestant parentage who, in consequence of sickness, poverty or intemperance, are unable to provide suitable nourishment and care for their offspring in their own homes, homeless, motherless,

fatherless, destitute infants, and foundlings under four years of age and by giving them proper food, good care and attention, endeavour to save, if possible, their lives.

Also to receive Protestant mothers with their new-born infants, and by providing a refuge and place of safety, the mothers may, by nursing and caring for their innocent babies (disowned and abandoned by their inhuman fathers), give their offspring "a good chance for life."

ARTICLE I.

The Board of Management shall consist of not less than twenty ladies, who shall annually contribute three or more dollars to the funds of this Institution. The officers shall be a President, 1st Directress, 2nd Directress, 3rd Directress, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall discharge the duties usually pertaining to their respective offices and shall be annually elected.

ARTICLE II.

The Managers' Business Meeting shall be held on Wednesday of each week. The Managers' Annual Meeting shall be held on the first Wednesday in April. The Annual General Meeting shall be held on the second Wednesday in April. Special meetings may be called at the request of two officers or any five Managers.

ARTICLE III.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer.

ARTICLE IV.

The financial year shall close on the 31st of March.

ARTICLE V.

Seven members, including one officer, shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VI.

The Managers shall appoint a Medical Board, which shall consist of two consulting and four attending physicians, and one oculist and aurist. The Medical Staff shall make rules for themselves and department not inconsistent with the rules of the Board of Management.

ARTICLE VII.

Legal Counsel and a Notary shall also be elected at the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE VIII.

These By-laws may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at a meeting, provided two weeks' notice be given of any contemplated amendment.

The By-laws were amended and altered and the foregoing adopted at a meeting held on March 7th, 1894.

RULES RELATING TO THE ADMISSION OF CHILDREN TO THE
PROTESTANT INFANTS' HOME.

1st. No child admitted under ten days old or over four years old.

2nd. No child admitted with contagious, incurable or other diseases.

3rd. Each child must bring a medical certificate from one of the attending physicians, and in the case of a new-born infant, the mother must also bring one.

4th. Clothing will be provided by the Institution.

5th. The charge for children's board shall be in proportion to the parents' wages; when entirely dependent on charity, and not visited by parents or friends, shall be held for adoption.

6th. Persons wishing to place children in the Home must bring written testimonials, from a clergyman or some responsible person, that the parents are Protestants.

7th. Infants will not be admitted without their mothers, except in special cases, to be decided by the committee, and the nursing mother must remain as long as the committee deem necessary.

8th. No woman will be admitted, when it is known, who is a mother for the second time of an illegitimate child.
