

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THE FOURTEENTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

(From the Montreal Gazette of December 13th, 1884.)

The Fourteenth Annual General Meeting of the Mackay Institution for Protestant Deaf-Mutes and Blind, was held on Saturday afternoon at three o'clock in the Synod Hall, and was very largely attended, the hall being filled with many of the most prominent ladies and gentlemen in the city. Mr. Thos. Workman occupied the chair, and among those present were Rev. J. G. Norton, Rev. Dr. Potts, Rev. Principal MacVicar, Messrs. P. S. Ross, Chas. Alexander, Thomas Cramp, Jonathan Hodgson, F. Wolferstan Thomas, and others.

After the proceedings had been opened with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Norton.

Mr. P. S. Ross, the Secretary-Treasurer, presented and read the annual report of the Board of Managers for the past year.

The report of the Superintendent, Miss Harriet E. McGann, was also submitted.

The CHAIRMAN in moving the adoption of reports made a few remarks in which he referred to the encouraging nature of the reports that had just been presented and the praiseworthy objects for which the Institution existed. He spoke in high terms of praise of its founder, the late Mr. Mackay, with whom he had been acquainted for many years, and who had been always ready to aid any deserving charity. He also alluded in graceful terms to the efforts the ladies had made in behalf of the Institution, and expressed the hope that they would continue to show this interest by frequently visiting it.

The reports were unanimously adopted.

Hon. Justice MACKAY, in moving the resolution, said he was glad to attend this meeting, both on account of the merits of the Institution and the recollections he bore of their lamented friend, the late Joseph Mackay. Mr. Mackay had come to this country many years ago, and the speaker had had the privilege of knowing him intimately for a number of years. He had been a man of integrity and sound principles, and God had prospered him. With the increase in his wealth, however, he had recognized the duty of richness and had given liberally to charities. The Mackay Institution owed its present existence to his efforts. For many years its act had remained a dead letter, but he had given it vitality and made it a reality. The objects of the Institution had not always been understood aright, it was not an asylum in the ordinary sense of the term but a school for the teaching and training of the deaf, dumb and blind, so that they might be able to earn their livelihood in after life. The condition of the deaf and dumb had formerly been most miserable, but now hundreds of boys and girls were being trained up to usefuln The re excelle year. suppor of Que that it future.

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usefulness, and the results were most extraordinary. The reports showed that the Institution was doing an excellent work, and its importance was increasing every year. The Institution demanded and deserved the support of all the Protestant population of the Province of Quebec, and he concluded by expressing the hope that it would receive even greater assistance in the future.

Rev. Dr. Potts, in seconding the resolution, said this meeting carried him back to the days of his early boyhood when he was engaged in work among the deaf and dumb in Belfast. He spoke in high terms of praise of the indefatigable labours of Miss McGann, the Superintendent, whom he remarked was following in the footsteps of her father who had devoted his life to this cause, and concluded by paying a high tribute to the memory of the late Mr. Joseph Mackay.

Rev. Principal MacVicar, in a few words said he was extremely glad to be present to add his testimony to the worth of this most deserving and successful charity.

The motion was then carried unanimously.

One of the most interesting features of the meeting was next proceeded with, the pupils being put through a number of exercises by Miss McGann, the Superintendent, The exercises comprised the recitation of the 23rd psalm in signs, dialogues from "Mother Goose," articulation and speech-reading, reading and recitation by the two blind pupils in the Institution, etc. Several of the advanced pupils also drew maps on the blackboard which would have done credit to the graduates of any of our city schools, and the blind pupils who were examined in history showed a proficiency in that subject that was really wonderful. A number of specimens of drawing and printing executed by the pupils were exhibited which evinced remarkable taste and excellence. On the whole, Miss McGann showed the large audience that the work of the Institution had borne the most striking results, and that it was in every way worthy of the support of all the Protestant community. At the conclusion of the exercises the meeting was brought to a close with the benediction.

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REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS.

The Managers of the Mackay Institution for Protestant Deaf-Mutes meet with their friends on this the fourteenth annual session under favourable circumstances.

The year 1883-84 has passed without anything of special importance to bring before you in connection with the working of the Institution.

A new shed has been built. The flooring of certain parts of the basements has been relaid and the gallery finished. These conveniences were much needed, and will be duly appreciated. Death has been busy among our friends, and several ladies, whose advice often guided our counsels, and whose presence cheered our labours, have been called away. We mention with regret the decease of Miss H. Mackay Gordon and Mrs. Dr. Scott.

Owing to the resignation of Mr. Widd, who so long and successfully acted as Principal of the Institution, it was found necessary to make a change in the staff, and Mr. Ashcroft, a gentleman who comes well recommended, has been selected as teacher and supervisor of the boys' department. We believe that he will justify our expectations and maintain the past efficiency of the school.

Since the opening of the session, Mr. Macnaughton, the teacher of drawing, has also resigned. He was brought up and educated in the Institution, and has now entered on a business career with good prospects of

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success. He is succeeded by Mr. Charles G. Meech, also trained up in the Institution, who is making excellent progress with his pupils.

The other officers of the Institution exhibit efficiency and zeal in their respective spheres of operation, and have earned the thanks and approbation of the Managers.

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The Superintendent's report will detail the system and progress of the pupils, and the working of the educational and administrative departments. It is therefore unnecessary to enlarge upon these questions. Only two blind pupils have applied for admission to the Institution in answer to advertisement and enquiries. The Managers would be glad to hear of more. There is room both for deaf-mutes and blind pupils, and the Managers would feel obliged to their friends if they would make this fact known with the view of extending the influence of the Institution.

Since the opening of the session a considerable enlargement has been made to the grounds of the Institution in the acquisition of an adjoining piece of land. This addition is a gift from our President, Mr. Hugh Mackay, for which we are sure he has your hearty thanks. We have also thankfully received from the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association, a donation of some gymnastic apparatus which has been carefully set up for use at the Institution.

A lady in Scotland, who desires to remain unknown placed at our disposal the means to purchase a horse, carriage and sleigh. These have proved and will prove a great convenience.

The scholars of Mrs. Lay's educational establishment have also borne the Institution in mind, and this year as heretofore, have made the following acceptable donations of money, viz.: The Union Society, \$10; the Victoria Society, \$9.20, and the Juvenile Class, \$4.

To the many friends who have given evidence of their interest in the Institution by gifts, and donations in kind, the Managers return their sincere thanks. It is hoped that these friends will not lose sight of the very important work in which we are engaged for the unfortunate class gathered under our care.

To the subscribers and collectors the Managers express their deep indebtedness, and while thanking them for their subscriptions and labours in the past, they solicit the continuance thereof in the future.

The Annual Examinations were held at the closing of the session in June last, conducted as usual by the Rev. Canon Norman, assisted by the Rev. James

Barclay and the Rev. J. E. Hill.

Your Managers cannot conclude their report, without expressing the satisfaction they have derived, from the manner in which their Superintendent, Miss McGann, has discharged the duties of a position embracing not only the direction of the education of the children; but also the internal administration of the household in all its details.

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SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Board of Managers of the Mackay Institution.

In presenting my annual report of the working of the Institution under your management, I have much pleasure in stating that its affairs have progressed most favourably during the year that is past. The number of pupils in attendance exceeded that of any previous year, there having been forty-three present at the close of the session in June, viz., 25 boys and 18 girls.

Immediately after the re-opening of school in September, 1883, the late Principal, Mr. Thomas Widd, was obliged to ask your Board for leave of absence for six months to recruit his health. He was subsequently compelled to resign his position for the same cause, when the Board of Managers did me the honor to appoint me as his successor. Realizing as I do the responsibility of my work I have endeavored to perform my duties to your satisfaction and to place the Mackay Institution on an equal footing with the first schools in the country. The health of the pupils has been remarkably good, the few childish ailments that did occur were treated successfully by our kind physician, Dr. Molson. The resignation of Mr. Widd rendered the appointment of another male teacher desirable; accordingly the services of Mr. John Ashcroft, Principal of the Valleyfield High School, were secured, and he assumed his duties just before the close of the session in June. Mr. Ashcroft's experience in teaching and his high Christian character render him well adapted to the The instruction of the blind has been attended to by Miss Terrill, who has also had charge of a class in the deaf and dumb department, and assisted by Miss Macfarlane, a semi-mute trained in the Institution, she supervises the girls out of school hours. Instruction in articulation and speech-reading continues to be a prominent feature in the education of our deaf and dumb pupils. A knowledge of spoken language is of

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paramount importance, and every pupil possessing a talent for acquiring speech is given a place in this class. Bell's system of visible speech is closely followed, and the results conclusively prove its completeness. At the Convention of Articulation Teachers held in New York City in July last, when over 200 engaged in the work were present, I heard several systems discussed, but no argument brought forward induced me to suppose any other preferable to the cae we have now in use.

THE TRADES.

Carpentry work under the instruction of Mr. John Stavely has progressed favourably. Some of the boys have shown a decided talent for it. The pupils in the Printing office, supervised by Mr. McClelland, are making rapid advancement. Several of the girls also are acquiring a good knowledge of this art, which may in the future prove the means of their earning a respectable livelihood. Dressing and plain sewing are taught to all the girls by Mrs. Collins, an experienced dressmaker. The specimens of needlework exhibited at the time of the closing exercises in June were very creditable to both teacher and pupils.

THE DRAWING CLASS

This class is composed of eighteen pupils, who were instructed last year by Mr. John Macnaughton. His abilities as a teacher were clearly attested by the marked proficiency attained by the members of his class. He has, however, resigned and will be replaced this year by another master.

THE RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

Through the kindness of the students of the Presbyterian Theological College, a regular service is held on Sunday afternoons, when one of the students officiates, the superintendent or a teacher acting as interpreter; also such of our pupils as are members of the Episcopal Church attend the morning service at St. Matthias, accompanied by one of the staff, who translates the sermon. In connection with the religious and moral training of those under my charge, I am glad of this opportunity of expressing my high appreciation of the valuable aid rendered by the Rev. 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Rev. Dr. Norman. His weekly lessons are most beneficial, and it is owing chiefly to his influence that not one case of insubordination has occurred during the year. In December, 1883, the Institution suffered a severe loss in the death of Miss Mackay Gordon. Her familiarity with each pupil combined with her genuine sympathy for the deaf and dumb, made the loss of their generous friend keenly felt by all the pupils. The Montreal Daily Witness of January 2nd, contained the following.

CHRISTMAS AT THE MACKAY INSTITUTION.

"One of the last kind actions of the late Miss Mackay Gordon was to prepare a present for each pupil in the above Institution, which she designed to have placed on a Christmas tree. After her death her niece, Miss Macdonald, declared her intention of carrying out her late aunt's generous intentions, and, accordingly, on the evening before the pupils left for their holidays, they were treated to a beautiful Christmas tree, brilliantly illuminated, and loaded with handsome gifts prepared by the hands now cold in death. Previous to the distribution of the gifts a blind boy recited the Christmas carol, and at the request of the ladies present, relatives of the late Miss Gordon, the deaf children gave the Lord's Prayer in signs, after which short addresses were made by Mrs. Macdonald, Miss Gordon and Mrs. Clark. They alluded to the deep interest their beloved sister had always taken in the Mackay Institution, hoped her name would ever be remembered by each one present, and trusted the Lord would raise them up some other friend in her place. They spoke warmly of what was being done for their welfare by the present managers, and congratulated the Superintendent on her success. After their departure a series of tableaux, in which the pupils took part,, were presented, and reflected credit on the untiring efforts of the teachers to make the evening an enjoyable one for their silent charge."

During the summer vacation the building was put in excellent repair. A new floor was laid in the basement hall, and the stairs leading to it were renewed also painting, kalsomining, and other minor improve-

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ments were carried out. The cleanliness and perfect neatness everywhere apparent about the building reflect much credit on the housekeeper, Mrs. Clark. The schoolroom work has been faithfully performed by the teachers. No marked change in our system of instruction has taken place. The combined method is used as heretofore, our aim being to impart to our pupils a thorough knowledge of written and spoken language; and thus to enable them to become self-sustaining

members of society.

The pupils' annual picnic was held in June on St. Helen's Island. It proved more than usually enjoyable in consequence of all sorts of games having been provided for our boys by Messrs. Edward Major and James Macfarlane, who devoted the day to their amusement. Several good friends presented prizes for races, which were entered into with zest by both boys and girls. Through the kindness of Captain Filgate of the steamer "Filgate," and Mr Sharpe of the City Express, no expense was incurred in the conveyance of the pupils to the island. The Institution continues to receive daily and weekly papers from this city and from other parts of the provinces, also from various Institutions in the United States. We hope by next year to be able to return the compliment, as with a trifling outlay, we can issue a little paper of our own, published by the pupils, who would make good compositors. The managers of the different railways are entitled to our sincere thanks for having granted reduced travelling rates to the pupils, and special thanks are due to the Grand Trunk and South Eastern railways for their liberality in having given free passes to our collector, Mr. McClelland. In conclusion, I desire to acknowledge with gratitude the assistance, kind, encouragement, and ready advice in any difficulty extended to me by your board of managers. I cannot but feel gratified at your approval of the manner in which I have conducted the affairs of the Institution during the time that it has been placed under my charge.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

On Sabbath afternoons one of the students of the Presbyterian College preaches to the pupils from 3 to 4 o'clock, also on Mondays the Rev. Dr. Norman delivers a short address, and Rev. Mr. Knowles (Methodist) occasionally during the session, interests the children in Bible stories.

I am glad to know that the Institution is in all respects doing well, and that there is an increase in the numbers.

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THE ANNUAL EXAMINATION.

ANNUAL EXAMINATION—SATISFACTORY RESULTS OF THE SYSTEM ADOPTED—THE PROGRESS OF ARTICULATION EXHIBITED.

(From the Montreal Gazette, June 17th, 1884.)

Yesterday morning the annual examination of the pupils of the Mackay Deaf and Dumb Institution was held in the large hall of that building. A large number of ladies and gentlemen were present and took a lively interest in the proceedings. The Rev. Canon Norman presided, assisted by the Rev. Messrs. Barclay, Barnes and J. Edgar Hill. The examination commenced with the infant class, composed of three pupils, who showed a very good knowledge of nouns and adjectives. The junior class then underwent a most creditable examination in writing, arithmetic and composition. In the second class, composed of thirteen pupils, the examination was in arithmetic, Bible history and Latham's 1st and 2nd Reader, as well as in composition. In all these subjects the pupils acquitted themselves in such a manner as to do honour to themselves and reflect credit on their tutors. The caligraphy, it may be said, was on the whole excellent, and in the majority of cases would compare favourably with the performances in that line, of the pupils of any school in the city. Two little blind boys, brothers, then gave short recitations, while the elder one read with great fluency a composition from a raised letter book. The third class was the next called. The points on which the pupils were examined were Bible history, arithmetic, grammar, geography, and composition, and in all these they exhibited a thorough knowledge of their subjects. 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English history, grammar, analysis, reading, geography, Bible history, composition, and arithmetic, the pupils acquitted themselves in a most satisfactory manner. The most important feature in the proceedings was an exhibition of articulation by some of the pupils, which really astonished all present, so natural was their pronunciation of certain words and sentences, written on the blackboard by Miss McGann, the superintendent. Two of the young lady pupils not only pronounced in a clear manner several sentences, but they also could read from the motion of Miss McGann's lips the words which that lady uttered. As a proof of this, the superintendent, without making any motion whatever, requested one of the young ladies, Miss Macfarlane, to take a crayon, break it in two, give one half to the Rev. Canon Norman, and place the other half on the window sill, which she at once did. The system of articulation adopted in the Institute is Bell's, and the progress made by the pupils must be encouraging to the devoted teacher, whose duties must have been most onerous in thus bringing about such happy results.

The Rev. Canon NORMAN said he was glad to see such a large number present. Owing to ill health Mr. Widd, the Principal, was obliged to resign during the year, but the speaker trusted that Mr. Widd's name would be always remembered by the friends and pupils of the Institute. Since his resignation, Miss McGann had held the position of superintendent, and well and faithfully had she performed the duties of that position. The examination had been most satisfactory, and went to show that Miss McGann and her assistants had been most successful in their aim towards perfecting the education of the pupils. Although Mr. Mackay had handed over the Institution, means were still always necessary to defray the expenses of the Institution, which had, up to the present, been largely supported by private subscriptions. He trusted that before long some generous soul would endow the Institution. In concluding he wished it to be understood that the Institute was non-denominational, in so far as Christian churches were concerned; in fact, it was, in the true sense of the word, catholic. For the coming year Mr. Ashcroft would be the head male teacher.

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The Rev. James Barclay said he knew from experience that no position required more patience than that of a teacher of deaf-mutes. The teachers, however, had the satisfaction of knowing that deaf and dumb pupils, as a rule, were more studious than others who were not afflicted either with the loss of speech or

This brought the proceedings to a close, after which the visitors were shown through the building, where everything depicted perfect comfort and cleanliness. A number of samples of drawing printing, plain and fancy work by the pupils were exhibited and attracted quite a number of the lady visitors, who expressed themselves as highly pleased with the articles submitted to inspection. On the whole the proceedings of the day were most satisfactory and gave proof that the Mackay Institute, which now numbers on its list 45 pupils, is on the onward march towards assured and permanent success.

TERMS OF ADMISSION.

The Mackay Institution for Protestant Deafmutes is a BOARDING SCHOOL for the Education and moral and industrial training of Protestant Deaf-mutes. It is not an asylum.

I. Every child admitted shall be deaf and dumb; shall not be deficient in intellect; not subject to fits; not labouring under any infectious disorder; shall have been vaccinated, or have had the small-pox, and must be of good moral character.

II. The fees to be charged to paying pupils will be learned on application to the Secretary or the Superintendent. These fees are to be paid quarterly in advance. In poor or special cases the managers, on presentation of the facts, may reduce their regular rates for tuition and board, and are prepared to receive destitute pupils free on a recommendation to that effect from reliable parties.

III. Pupils will be admitted into the Institution between the ages of five and eighteen; special cases being younger or older will be taken into consideration.

IV. The duties of the school will commence on the Second Wednesday in September annually.

V. The annual vacation will commence on the Third Wednesday in June, when all the pupils are expected to go home for the holidays.

VI. The pupils are allowed two weeks' vacation at Christmas but are specially requested to return promptly.

VII. The following questions must be answered and attested by the Minister of the Church to which the child or its parents belong, and by a Medical Practitioner:—

- 1. What is the name of the child?
- 2. When and where was the child born?
- 3. What are the names and occupation of its parents?
- 4. Of what nationality are the latter?
- 5. State the full address of the child's parents and nearest Post-office.
- 6. Was the child born deaf, or at what age or by what disease did it become deaf?
- 7. Has the child ever been afflicted with fits, or any other nervous affection?

- 8. Has the child had the small-pox or been vaccinated?
- 9. Has it had the measles or scarlet fever?
- 10. Is the child generally healthy?
- 11. Can the child dress and wait on itself, and are its personal habits cleanly?
 - 12. Does the child make intelligible signs and give proof of memory?
 - 13. How many brothers and sisters are there in the family?
 - 14. Are there any other members of the family deaf and dumb?
 - 15. Were the parents of the child in any way related?
 - 16. What are the parents able to pay for board and tuition?

CLOTHING OF PUPILS.

FOR A BOY.—Two suits complete; four shirts; four handkerchiefs; four neckerchiefs; four pairs of knitted worsted stockings; two pairs of good boots or shoes; overshoes; two hats or caps; a warm overcoat; two pairs of wollen gloves; a pair of slippers; tooth-comb; comb and hair-brush in a bag, also a tooth-brush.

One of the suits must be plain and strong for every-day wear, and the other should be of dark cloth.

FOR A GIRL.—Four chemises; four pairs of stockings; two flannel petticoats; two dark skirts; two pairs of corsets; two dark stuff frocks; eight pinafores or aprons; twelve handerkchiefs; a pair of slippers; two pairs of boots or shoes; overshoes; a warm cloak or shawl; two bonnets or hats; two pairs of gloves; tooth-comb; comb and hair-brush in a bag, also a tooth-brush.

It is expected that all children shall have their clothing of good quality and in good condition, and that deficiencies shall be supplied every midsummer. All the clothes shall be marked with the FULL NAME of the boy or girl.

FREE PUPILS.

All candidates for free admission must be the children of poor Protestant parents in the Province of Quebec, and their application shall be considered by the Board of Managers.

Child:en elected for free admission shall receive their board and education gratuitously—the only expense to the parents being that of clothing.

An engagement must be entered into by two responsible housekeepers to provide such children with proper clothing, and in case of sickness, death or any other cause which may be found to render children ineligible, to remove them from the Institution upon receiving due notice.

Persons knowing of any uneducated Protestant Blind in the Province, will confer a favour on them by communicating with the Secretary or the Superintendent.

Letters intended for this Institution should always have the name "Mackay" on the address, in order to distinguish it from the two Roman Catholic schools for deaf-mutes in Montreal.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

I.

The male and female pupils while in the Institution are to be kept separate, and to remain in their respective departments, meeting together only in the school-room for instruction and worship, and in the dining-room for meals, and then they are to be in charge of a teacher, or of such other persons as the Managers may approve.

II.

The girls, when out of school hours, to be in charge of the Housekeeper or an assistant-teacher, and when out of doors to be in charge of some responsible person appointed by the Superintendent. Non paying pupils to be made useful about the Institution out of school hours.

III.

The boys out of school hours, and in the worshops, to be in charge of a teacher or the supervisor.

IV

The boys and girls under 12 years of age, to retire at 8 p.m., punctually, and all the rest of the pupils at 9 p.m.

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The pupils are not to leave the Institution without the permission of the Superintendent.

VI

None of the pupils are to leave, or be kept from their regular studies, without the permission of their teachers. Hours for study to be fixed by Managers. The pupils are to be present from 9 to 12 and 1.30 to 3 p.m.

VII.

No person, not connected with the Institution, is allowed to stay or take any meal, or sleep in it without the special permission of the Superintendent. Parents of pupils cannot be accommodated with a night's lodging.

VIII.

Sunday School to be held in the morning, and service in the afternoon at 3 p.m., at which deaf-mutes from the city may attend, but the non-pupils are not to be allowed to go through the building without the permission of the Superintendent.

IX.

The Caretaker is to see that the lights are extinguished at 10 p.m., and the premises properly secured. He is also forbidden to keep more than 20 (twenty) gallons of coal oil in the building, and he must use the greatest care with the lamps. He is also to take entire charge of the furnace and to see that water tanks are kept well filled. The lighting of the range, removal of ashes, and the cleaning of the water closets, are to be the Caretaker's duties. To see that two pails of water are kept standing in each bathroom for use in case of fire, and perform all other duties assigned him by the Superintendent.

X.

The pupils are not to have access to their bed-rooms from the morning until the time for retiring, unless with permission.

XI.

The children are to proceed to and from their meals in line.

XII.

At the end of each table, nominated by the Superintendent, some one should be placed to superintend the pupils at their meals.

XIII.

The bed rooms of the girls are to be visited by the Superintendent, and those of the boys by the supervisor before 10 o'clock every night, to see that the lights are extinguished, and all things in order.

XIV.

It is imperative for each pupil of suitable age to devote the allotted time to whichever of the three trades, taught in the Institution, he exhibits the most tal at for.

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Each parent or guardian should deposit with the Superintendent a sum of not less than five dollars, to defray incidental expenses, repairs of boots, etc., any part of which remaining unexpended at the close of the session will be returned.
